Planning has begun for the next academy session which will start in mid-January.

# **Food Insecurity**

Food insecurity is a continuing issue with many Steele Creek families. Central is helping to address this issue:


1. Supplying food items for the Loaves and Fishes panties has been a community out-reach project of our church for many years. And each year, our donations accumulate to total several hundred pounds. Each month we are asked to provide different foodstuffs: boxed pasta and potatoes for November; canned soup, vegetables and meat for December. Please contribute by placing the items in the cart in the narthex.

The donated food is used in the Loaves & Fishes 'network of 30 emergency food pantries located throughout Mecklenburg County. They are able to provide a week's worth of groceries to individuals and families experiencing a short-term crisis. In 2022, close to 120,000 people were served. It is funded through donations of groceries through many sources (churches, businesses, Boy Scout Drive, and St. Andrews' gleaning program) and financial donations, which helps buy perishable foods such as eggs, cheese, meat, and bread.

2.Week-end Food Bags. Thank you for your help each month in assembling the week-end food bags. This is truly an all-church effort! Each week during the school year, these are provided to children whose families have no permanent home and attend Steele Creek Elementary and South Pine Academy. The food bag items are chosen to be kid-friendly, able to be used with a minimum of preparation and only a microwave to heat. This school year, Mike Brown and George Bostic deliver the food bags to the counselors at each school – so that the children go home with a bag at the end of every school week.

### Past and current church workers:

It honors the faithfulness of current and retired church workers and their families in need. ### SANCTUARY RENOVATION TASK FORCE UPDATE #2

At our last sanctuary renovation update October 1st (see link below), we announced that the architect's plans were approved by Mecklenburg County. Since then several general contractors have made site visits, and we expect to receive bids this week so a hire can be made as we head into November.


On October 20, we met with our lead architect, Lisa Anderson to select carpeting for the sanctuary and hallways, and plan to select paint colors in the coming week.

Please see below the final rendering of the sanctuary. In this rendering the wood around the organ will be painted a lighter shade to coordinate with the contemporary, open design of the sanctuary. By removing the screen concealing the organ as depicted in earlier renderings, the organ and pipes now will be the focal point when entering the sanctuary. In addition, by removing the screen this will ensure the sound quality of the organ is not compromised.

The hanging light fixtures currently in the sanctuary will be removed during construction at the beginning of 2024. If you would like one or more of the fixtures please contact a member of the task force and your name will be added to our list.
