### **Director of Music Ministries:**



# SANCTUARY RENOVATION TASK FORCE UPDATE #1 TO THE CONGREGATON BY JEANNE SIKES MCGRATH SUNDAY, AUGUST 6, 2023

Thank you Central for your pledges to support the sanctuary renovation project.

- In May following Johnny and Russell's announcement about our successful pledge campaign, a Sanctuary Renovation Task force was formed, at the request of Session. Herman Canipe, Jim Cook, Becky Helms, Lynn Snuggs and I were asked to serve and accepted the call. This task force will see renovation through to completion.
- On May 30th, a little over two months ago we held our first meeting with the architect to learn where we are on various aspects of the design phase.
  - -That meeting involved reviewing options for sur rounds for the front doors and lighting in the sanctuary.
  - -The structural engineer came and inspected the stage area and crawl spaces where the ADA compliant lift will go and looked at crawl spaces.
- Beginning mid-June, the production team held meetings with three audio visual design firms for proposals for sound equipment and fixed areas for cameras for live streaming.
  - -The production team decided July 25th to hire an AV firm and are now working with the architect and electrical engineer.
- The architect is creating the working, technical drawings and will be submitted to Mecklenburg County
  Building Code Department by the deadline at the end of
  August.
- The task force continues to collaborate with the architect through the design phase and after approved and permitted by the Building Code Department, begin seeking bids for a general contractor in September.
- Once the general contractor is selected and meetings take place, the goal is to have all construction materials ordered by the end of the year for construction to begin in January 2024 ...which is about five months from now.
- We will continue worshipping in the sanctuary through the holidays and year end.

We will keep you updated as we go along.

- It is because of you, our members, the project planning for Sanctuary Renovation, which began several years ago is finally becoming a reality.
- If you have any questions, please reach out to anyone on the task force. Thank you.

### Partnership with Steele Creek Elementary

Central continues its support of Steele Creek Elementary. We work closely with Principal Looney, Assistant Principal Hill and the counselors to address student needs.

The school is now classified as Title 1 which means that a majority (57%) of students come from low income families. It continues to have a very diverse population with 40% of the students being English learners and 10 % of students with learning disabilities.

There is a positive school environment. This past year, the school was rated as high growth. This was only possible with committed teachers and staff who provided the extra support needed for this student population. The school goals are

- Building a learning environment which supports and celebrates students, so they want to be at school.
- 2. Improving academic proficiency of all students.
- 3. Maintaining highly qualified teachers in each classroom. 95% of the teachers are returning.
- 4. Increase parent participation

We are committed to helping in 2023-24 by:

- 1. Week-end food bags for homeless students (supplied each week).
- 2. Student recognition
- To celebrate students who meet academic goals by providing a simple breakfast for the student and a parent, twice in the academic year.
- To encourage all students work hard, study diligently, and exhibit good behavior. Provide simple snacks, such as popsicles or popcorn for special award gatherings.
- 3. Support for Children
- Addressing the emergency needs for children and their families. In past years, we have provided winter coats, grocery cards, socks/underwear/sweatpants.
- 4. Teacher support so they know that the community cares:
- Catered lunch on to celebrate the start of the school year.
- Quarterly teacher appreciation snacks.
- Providing a used refrigerator for teachers' lunches
