PASTOR'S ADDRESS

A Companion for the Journey

Dear Bethanians,

The smell of fresh-baked bread is the smell of hospitality. Realtors might encourage sellers to fill their houses with the scent of a fresh whole wheat loaf. One knows they are in the embrace of Holden Hospitality when welcomed by warm bread at the meal served upon arrival. My grandmother's rye bread had such a loving, wholesome quality about it – and now Laurie has taken up baking bread with her recipe for family gatherings. It smells and tastes like homecoming.

Bread is also that which we take for the journey. When young, our family would grab a couple of loaves of Fisherman's Wharf Sourdough Bread, and a hunk of cheese, and we would be good for a day of adventure. The Exodus from Egypt included unleavened bread for the journey of freedom, supplemented by manna, a "bread-like substance" delivered each morning with the dew. Jesus fed bread to the 5,000, and to the twelve, sharing food and sharing community in love. "Do this in remembrance of me." And, indeed, at Emmaus the followers recognized the risen Jesus in the breaking of the bread.


A Companion for the Journey: Continued

Entering the Dark Wood of Lent

Dear Friends,



The six-week season of Lent invites us into reflection on what it means to be human and at the same time, what it means to be people of hope. We pause in prayerful meditation as we go through the motions of Lent–beginning on Ash Wednesday when we mark ourselves with ashes up until the day we celebrate that from those ashes, new life is possible. Although we enter the dark wood of Lent intentionally, we do not travel alone. We are surrounded by loving companions who enter with us, and by the love of God in Jesus who walks with us no matter where we wander.

To expand and deepen our Lenten experience, an interactive prayer station is set up in the sanctuary for all to find a space to pray–maybe in new and meaningful ways. A brick "prayer wall" anchors the prayer station, symbolizing the temple wall where Jesus worshiped and taught. Over the centuries since the destruction of the temple in 70 CE, the remaining Western wall has attracted pilgrims who consider it a holy site to come and pray. Our prayer wall will offer us an opportunity to have a similar experience. At any time throughout the season, you are welcome to offer your prayers and slip them in the spaces between the bricks, just as pilgrims do in Jerusalem. Slips of paper and pencils will always be available. Candles will also be available for you to light during your prayer time, symbolizing the hope we carry with us, even as we move through the dark woods of Lent and beyond.

Each week a different element will be located in front of the wall, reflective of the Gospel readings we follow through the season. The prayer wall and candles will remain for your use, but the elements will change weekly (think water, sand, stones, etc). Information about the element and what it symbolizes will be provided on Sunday to guide us throughout the coming week. You are invited to interact with the element as you pray–after worship or communion, or maybe on your way back to your seat after passing of the peace. Our Wednesday evening Lenten service will be rooted in this prayerful experience as well. The sanctuary is available during the day, so please feel free to use the prayer station during your personal prayer time.

Like the pilgrims in Jerusalem, I hope that you'll find the prayer station to be a holy place where we draw near to God and trust that God, our faithful companion, meets us there. Prayers can come in all shapes and sizes—some are spoken, some are silent, and some are experienced with our bodies. The Lent prayer station offers us the opportunity to express what's on our hearts and minds in a variety of ways. As we prayerfully journey through the dark wood of Lent, may we carry a spark of hope that leads us home.

2023 Annual Meeting

The 2023 Bethany Lutheran Church Annual Meeting was held on Sunday, January 29 after the 10am worship service. Council President Vicki Browning opened the meeting and a quorum was declared. After an opening prayer from Pastor Erin, the 2022 Annual Meeting minutes were approved. Pastor Paul and Vicki Browning both offered remarks. Treasurer Jim Rohrscheib gave a presentation on Bethany's current financial status and the proposed 2023 budget. After a brief discussion, the budget was approved. The financial report was followed by the election of new council members and the election of 2023 nominating committee members. Linnea Chu was approved for a first term and Jennie Harris was approved to continue for a one-year term on church council. Alice McCain, Barbara Deines, Wayne Daley, and Barbara Swartling were approved as 2023 Nominating Committee members. David Swartling next gave an update on the status of Bethany's Affordable Housing project. The Affordable Housing Task Force proposed a motion with a set of next steps for the initiative. The motion was approved.


The highlight of the meeting was a resolution offered by Pastor Paul, giving special recognition to Bethany volunteer, Jim Rohrscheib.

From the Bishop

When I was in sixth grade, my teacher decided that we were going to build chicken skeletons. From real chickens. So, the teacher divided us into groups. A local farmer donated the chickens. Each group had to boil and boil their chicken. When all the flesh and tendons, etc. were boiled off, and the bones were clean, then we had to build the chicken back up so that it formed a

complete bird.

When I think back on this project, I wonder what we were learning. Anatomy? Names of bones? I'm not sure. But what I did learn was community, relationship, and collaboration. Withour the people in my group – and the different skills and gifts that they had – we would not have been able to put this chicken back together. We had to make sure that the bones were sorted into the right boxes (the feet bones, the leg bones, the wing bones, the beak, etc.) We had to make sure the bones weren't wet and that there wasn't anything left on the bones so it didn't stink. (My mom claimed it did stink. Side note, I was elected to bring home the completed chicken. My mom was not pleased and at some point it disappeared from the living room bookcase.)

Anyway, getting back to community, relationship, and collaboration ... as I think of our synod, and what God is calling us to do and to be together, I think that these three things are key. I know that many of you are already in relationship and collaboration with other ELCA congregations around you. Perhaps you share your building with other ministries. Perhaps you share a food bank or work with a school. Perhaps affordable housing is part of your collaborative work. Many of you have preschools. All of these are wonderful ways to collaborate.

I'm wondering if we can think even bigger and more relationally than that. What if people from geographically close congregations met and talked about who they are. What their hopes are. What their fears are. What they need from others. What they have to offer others. What might come out of these conversations and relationships? Perhaps a way to share staff? Perhaps a way to be more impactful in the community? Perhaps new ways of using property? I'm not sure. It would be interesting and exciting to find out.

As I have mentioned before, study after study indicates that pastors today are lonely and feel isolated and anxious about the future. As my staff and I travel around the synod, we hear that many congregations also feel lonely and isolated and anxious about the future. Hearing stories and knowing some of the difficulties, doesn't it seem that it would be better to build relationship with one another and collaborate rather than every congregation trying to figure it out on their own?

Here are three ways that we are encouraging congregations to be in community, build relationships, and collaborate.

First, we continue to expand the LiVE Project (Living into Vocational Engagement). We are excited about the synod's collaboration and building relationship with the Trinity Education Foundation who is contributing funding this year and partnering with us. I encourage you to visit www.lutheransnw.org/ministries/the-live-project and learn more.


Second, in lieu of a Synod Assembly this year, we are hosting two Synod Gatherings in the spring with forums where relationships and collaboration are key. Watch for information in early February on the two Gatherings (May 13 in Mount Vernon and May 20 in Bellevue) via email and on our website here: www.lutheransnw.org/events/synod-gatherings

Third, the Grace Grant application this year asks applicants with whom they are collaborating on the proposed project. The application process is open February 1 – May 31. Read about the focus areas and how to apply for this final year of funding here: www.lutheransnw.org/pages/grace-grants

You know, I could never have built that chicken alone. Nor would I have wanted to. Truthfully, even with my group, it was messy and hard. In my memory, we had a few bones left over that we quietly threw in the garbage. And yet, I am still in relationship with many of the people in my sixth grade group. And we are bonded from the chicken-building experience.
