"We don't talk about the wrath of God a lot. This word wrath probably brings a lot of thoughts and questions to your mind. Maybe it concerns or confuses you to hear God and wrath in the same sentence. How could the God who is love be a God of wrath? Isn't this idea something people used to believe? Isn't God's wrath something certain people use to threaten and manipulate? Maybe hearing

about God's wrath takes you to a place where anger has wounded you. We don't want to think about wrath. But God Word does." – **Michael Nolen**

Have A Volunteer Read: Romans 1:18-25; 3:9-12; Psalm 19:1-2; Jeremiah 2:11-13 Point #1: We are all SINNERS.

"Paul says, "Apart from Christ, this is who we are." We're sinners. It's true about everyone apart from Christ. We're all sinners. We were created by God for God. God created us to live in relationship with him, to experience his love and goodness. He made us to worship him and serve him and share his goodness with his world. But the reality is we've all rebelled against God, from our first parents Adam and Eve to every single person who's ever lived. The Bible teaches we are sinners by nature and sinners by choice. We've made God our enemy, and as a result we live under his wrath".

"We are created as worshiping creatures. You can't not worship. You're going to worship something. When you reject God, you don't get rid of God, you replace him with someone or something else. If it's not God, it's always something else. It's how we're made. Our hearts are always reaching out to something... asking something to save us, something to help us, something to satisfy us, something to make us feel loved or lovely. We worship whatever we think we need to feel alive. We can't help it. There are even religious versions of this, where people claim to follow the biblical God, but because of sin, they craft their own version of God in their minds. — **Michael Nolen**

What do we find ourselves being tempted to worship apart from God?

"This is just the natural tendency of fallen human beings in our sinful state is to reimagine God in the way that we like him. So Patrick Morley said it like this... There's a God we want and a God that is and the two are not the same God. And notice how insane this all is." – **Michael Nolen**

How do we tend to reimagine God?

Have Another Volunteer Read: Romans 2:5 Point #2: We all deserve GOD'S WRATH.

"Part of our trouble with God's wrath is we misunderstand it. Wrath is not an outburst of anger or cruelty. God's wrath is God's holy, settled opposition to sin and injustice. It's a fruit of God's holiness and his goodness and his justice. Wrath is actually the revelation of God's love.

Why is God's wrath different from man's wrath?

"In Romans 2:5, God's wrath is something that's future. But wrath also is something that's present. First, the present wrath of God is revealed in humanity's alienation from God. Second, the present wrath of God reveals itself in humanity's moral disintegration. One of the manifestations of God's present wrath is God gives us what we want." – **Michael Nolen**

How often do we blame God for our sins or the sins of others?

Have Another Volunteer Read: Romans 8:1

Point #3: We all have ONLY ONE HOPE: THE GOSPEL.

"The good news is that Jesus, God's Son, has come to bear God's wrath for us. The sinless one took on our sin. The righteous one took on our unrighteousness. He who knew no sin became sin for us. And God the Father poured his wrath out on God the Son, the wrath we deserved. Jesus took our sin on himself and God gave him over to wrath. At the cross, Jesus stood in our place, so through faith in him, we could stand forever righteous. What a beautiful picture... Jesus taking our sin, bearing our wrath, so that we could have his righteousness and know God's acceptance." — **Michael Nolen**

"We're all under the wrath of God, and it's a choice whether or not you stay there. Maybe you're thinking, 'What if God's already given me over? What if it's too late? God gives you over to yourself to bring you to the end of yourself." – **Michael Nolen**
