# From the Pastor From Death to Life

#### (Ephesians 2:1-10)

You may have heard the popular tale regarding the origin of the word eureka, often used to convey the sense of "I've found it." It has to do with a really clever Ancient Greek scientist observing the displacement of water in his bathtub when he got into it...an observation that led him to calculate the volume of even irregularly shaped objects. He was so excited he immediately jumped out of his bath and ran out into the street naked, shouting "I've found it!" ("Eureka!"). I did not find the secret of any mystery concerning the mysteries of science or mathematics. And thankfully for all concerned my Eureka moment didn't involve streaking in the Lochmere Parkside neighborhood! If I'm honest, I am a little embarrassed that my Eureka moment was so long in coming. It has to do with crosses I see all the time at Resurrection but never stopped for very long to ponder. Did you ever notice that the crosses you see all over our campus have the same shape? They are all ordinary crosses ending in four points or "arrows."



A little time online led to the discovery that this particular kind of cross is what is called a "Passion Cross". It is a Passion Cross because the four points on the top, bottom, and sides

of the cross represent the "Passion" or suffering and death of Jesus. These four "arrows" signify the three nails and one spear that pierced our Lord and brought about His sacrificial death on a cross for our sins



and the sins of the world. But if you look around at RLC you'll also see that the top of the cross is often under another arrow—a roof or other architectural feature—pointed upward. That reminds me that the Passion of our Lord is directly connected with His resurrection and ascension! Jesus would suffer many things, be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes, and be killed. But on the third day, he would rise again! His rising demonstrates His victory over sin, death, and the devil. And that is the world-changing reality we get to remember and celebrate in the month of March this year. It underlies the name of our congregation: "RESURRECTION Lutheran Church."

Jesus has crossed over from death to life. As people who, by the grace of God, are found in Him, we have done the same! St. Paul writes: "You were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked....But God, being rich in mercy...made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us" (2:1-7). Whether it is our Lenten focus on 40 days in the wilderness with Jesus, our special services during Holy Week, RLC kids' Easter Extravaganza, or our church's self-identity as people who are "saved by grace, through faith, for service" every day of the year (2:8-10), we have ample opportunity this month to celebrate that were it not for Jesus though we are people who would be dead in our sins. His Easter victory is our victory, too! By the grace of God, we have passed over from death to life. What difference will that gift of life make in your life—and the lives of those you meet this year? I can't wait to answer that question together with all of you.



"For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known" 1 Corinthians 13:12

My wife just returned home from 90 days in Europe working with the US government. As many of you know, it was supposed to be a 2-year "gig",



but paperwork problems and other factors resulted in an opportunity for her to come home early. We each have our share of military deployments and so long-term separations are nothing new to us; however, each one of them always presented an opportunity to reflect. One of my reflections can be summed up as we talked about

entering that stage of life when we really appreciate the time we have together as kids start to make their way out of the house.

Each long-term separation is a change in your daily life. Routines are thrown off track and a new one begins to take shape. We recognize that emotions are OK to experience: 'sad' that they had to leave; 'angry' that you now need to pick up their part of the routine; 'resentful' of other couples that seem to enjoy what you now see as a hole in your own life. Rumors of early returns can bring a sense of 'hope' that quickly shifts to 'disappointment' when they don't return early. And through it all, life continues. The sun sets... the sun rises... and you do it all over again.

Maybe you read that and thought about times in your life or the lives of other family and friends. It might not be a spouse on long-term travel, but rather disruptions like a divorce, long-term health issues, the death of a loved one or significant financial changes. Anything that disrupts your routine for an extended time brings opportunities for reflection. We think about what we would do differently if given the opportunity or what we now appreciate or must accept as part of a new way of life. Taking time to reflect is an important part of how we move forward and can help shape future interactions as we learn from past experiences. One of those reflection opportunities is right now.

During Lent, we reflect on our own sinful condition as we move forward to Good Friday and Easter Sunday: Christ's actions on the cross and His resurrection from the dead for our sake. We reflect on bad habits we would like to give up and/or good habits we choose to add over the next 40 days. As we reflect, we also share in the hope of what is to come. Paul reminds us in his letter to the Corinthians that there will come a day when we see clearly, when we know Jesus face to face, and reflections are no longer needed because we "know fully".

For now, we use the opportunity to reflect and learn. I appreciated my time of reflection over the past three months and I pray that your journey through Lent does the same for you... without having to send a loved one off to Europe.

May God bless you over this season of reflection and lead us all to the celebration of Easter victory.

# **Lenten Offerings**

Offerings received during the Lenten Midweek Worship Services this year will go to support the following:

#### **Triangle Family Services**

Since 1937, Triangle Family Services has served as a place for sustainable solutions helping families facing a crisis. They provide solutions to provide safety and security to local families and enabling our community to thrive. Their focus is on four core program areas: Family Safety, Financial Stability, Mental Health, and Homeless Engagement/Housing Stabilization. (<u>tfsnc.org</u>)

#### **Inter-Faith Food Shuttle**

Since 1989, Inter-Faith Food Shuttle (IFS) has recovered and distributed over a million pounds of food per year and has taught skills for self-sufficiency including culinary job skills, shopping and cooking healthy on a budget, and how to grow food. They service seven area counties, including Wake County, and their programs support low-income families living in 'food deserts' and without the income to purchase healthy meals. They partner with food providers, houses of worship, and community housing to distribute access free food at mobile markets where needy families live. IFS was started by two women, a Christian and a Jew, who wanted to recover and distribute food that would otherwise end up in landfills. (foodshuttle.org)

#### Lutheran Braille Workers

Lutheran Braille Workers (LBW) provides God's word – the Bible and other Christian materials) to people who are blind or visually impaired, completely free of charge, in quality formatted Braille and specialized large print, and in multiple languages. LBW started in 1943 in response to a shortage of Braille Bibles for blind pastors in Germany and now provides materials throughout the world. (<u>lbwloveworks.org</u>)



# Church Council News

# February 2024

During the February Council Meeting, Pastor Blanke presented to the Council a draft charter for mission engagement. Paul and Susan Brandt (who became members on 25 February) have agreed to facilitate the new Cross-Cultural Mission Engagement Team. Desiring to be faithful to Jesus' Great Commission to "Go and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28:18), this team, by the grace of God, will assist RLC in bringing the Gospel of Jesus Christ across boundaries of language and culture, both in our community and abroad.

Building maintenance issues continue to be a challenge.

- During a recent major rain event, the gutters outside Room 117 overflowed causing a leak in the room (This area has not been a problem in the past.). This leak was quickly cleaned up, but we now realize these gutters were not designed large enough to handle the flow of water that is possible. The Council is requesting price quotes for gutters, installation and gutter guards. The cost is estimated to be about \$10,000.
- The Council is looking at replacing at least 4 sets of windows in Rooms 115 (nursery), 123, 130 and 131. These windows all have wooden frames which make them subject to decay and leaks. Also, the cranks no longer work, making these windows not usable for emergency egress.
- The parking lot was last updated (cracks filled and seal-coated) in 2015. This and other asphalt issues will need to be addressed in next year's budget.

Time and talent worksheets will be distributed in April this year (usually happens in January). We are exploring ways to improve these forms and encourage more participation in the many missions and activities Resurrection has to offer. The Council also requested QR codes be used more regularly to direct people to the Vanco Giving Site.

Finally, we started our initial discussion about planning the Resurrection 50th Anniversary which will take place in 2028. It has been suggested we spend time looking at the (and building a better) archive of information and pictures in preparation for this momentous occasion. 
