From the Pastor "If It Dies..."

(John 12:23-24)

Have you seen the Yoshino cherry (sakura) tree in front of the main office of our church this year? It burst into bloom several days before I wrote this article. And though today the tree is dropping petals with every gust of wind, the blossoms are still going strong! In Japan, where our family used to live, sakura signify both the transient beauty of life and the discipline and dedication of the samurai spirit — no matter



how short-lived. I find it interesting that though ornamental cherries are grown from cultivars, sakura grown from a seed actually produce fruit. These tiny cherries are harvested by birds and other creatures who eat the fruit once the blossom petals are spent and have fallen to the ground. Once the flowers are dead and gone,

the fruit of the tree remains! What a meaningful symbol for the Life we celebrate every year that coincides — more or less — with the blooming of the spectacular sakura.

Not long before His death, Jesus invoked an image from his own natural surroundings to describe what He was about to accomplish: "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified," He said, speaking about His death on a cross. "Truly truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies it bears much fruit. Whoever loves his life loses it; and whoever hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life." Jesus did not have cherry trees in mind when He spoke this parable. He envisioned a stalk of wheat or barley with an ear at the top, clustered with tiny kernels. Yet it is hard

The Pastoral Epistles: Paul's Last Letters

Sundays, 9:30-10:30 am Fellowship Hall

March 30-May 18

The apostle Paul labored ceaselessly for thirty years to spread the Christian gospel. He established churches in Roman cities and provinces throughout the region. Realizing that his ministry was drawing to a close, he knew that he must assign qualified leaders to oversee these congregations. Paul selected Timothy and Titus, two young men who had traveled and faithfully ministered with him.

In his last years, Paul wrote letters to these dedicated Christian workers to provide them with instructions regarding pastoral oversight for the churches. He would identify the types of persons who would qualify for church leadership and establish their key responsibilities.

As we conduct an expository reading through these epistles, we will hear Paul's voice giving both instruction and encouragement to two of his most reliable assistants men whom he addresses as his "true children."

Bring your Bible. Led by Larry Cameron. to miss the connection between sakura and the grain of Jesus' parable: Jesus recognized the time had come that He HAD to die. He realized the moment had arrived that the brief period of His earthly ministry MUST come to an end. It would end with His enthronement and glorification as King by His heavenly Father on a humble cross. Yet all of it was so that He might bear fruit through His disciples and — one day many years later — through such as you and me. He died so that you and I might not just "live" but enjoy abundant Life (John 10:10)... for all eternity!

"Hating" our lives in this world does not mean neglecting our bodies or despising the gift of physical life God has gifted us. It does not mean living as if simple physical pleasures were no longer important. It simply means recognizing where true and abundant Life comes from. It means being gifted by God to leave behind a legacy of faith that He can use to bless others. And even "if we die"... as people who die in Christ Jesus, all is not over for us. Good Friday and Easter mean we have so much more now AND in the world to come!

So we enjoy the exhilaration of Spring. Images of the dark wintry world springing into colorful life are all around us. What a beautiful reminder of Easter renewal the natural world can be!

The signs of spring mean it is almost time to say it again this year: "Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" I await that glad proclamation together with all of you.





Church Council News

March 2025

The March Operations report showed how the RLC staff are making improvements around our campus and keeping the costs to a minimum. This includes changes to cleaning services of the Preschool building, replacement of the campus phone system server – currently scheduled for this coming summer, and security upgrades via addition of one more exterior camera (previously purchased), as well as replacement of exterior lights.

Between the February and March Council meetings, we met with the RLC staff in a retreat setting to discuss our strategic focus for the coming year. This focus session was led by Rev. Dr. Travis Guse (LCMS Southeastern District Director of Wellness and Coaching). Four focus areas were discussed: Church/School Partnership, New Member Engagement, Crisis Care, and Digital Platform. More will be shared in the coming months about how you can help in any of these focus areas designed to help further the Lord's Mission Work here at Resurrection Lutheran.

A recent review of our Church documents revealed a procedural issue that the Council and Voting Members have overlooked since the Resurrection Constitution was revised in 2016. Specifically, all Voting Members are now required to sign the 2016 Constitution. This was not a requirement in the previous Constitution. The Council is currently working on a path forward to become compliant with this requirement and still make this easy for our Voting Members.

Ever Feel Overwhelmed?

I don't think it's a coincidence that April is national stress awareness month, which happens to coincide with filing our taxes. If you're like me and received a much larger bill (not refund) this year, the stress meter may be continuing to tick upwards. What stresses you today? Kids need to get to soccer practice or band or some

other sport. Oh, and they need your help with homework (that you too may need to relearn to help them). Our friends, spouses, or significant others would like to spend some quality time with us. We have a business to run or a boss that has four projects to give us on top of the six we're already working. You're leading (or attending) a Bible study next week and haven't looked at the material. The dog is mopey because you've haven't taken her to Bass Lake this week (OK... that may be just me). And through it all, don't forget to eat right and work out because after all, your physical health is important too.

I think my stress level increased just writing that. Feeling the stressors of life push against us can be overwhelming on its own, but sometimes we are the one listening to someone else's stress, and that can feel pretty helpless at times too. When our kids share their stressors, it's



not always easy to say "this too shall pass" even though we're sure they will look back and see this through different lenses in ten years. It can also be challenging with friends and family, always encouraging them to "hang in there" and praying that ten years from now will be different for them as well.

Brené Brown says that vulnerability is a strength, not a weakness. So, if you're stressed and need someone who can provide a confidential listening ear, consider reaching out to your Stephen Ministers. You are demonstrating strength in that moment. If you know someone who is struggling, recommend us to them. They do not need to be RLC members to use Stephen Ministry. We are not trained as professional counselors, but we are trained to listen and recognize when professional counseling may be needed.

Peter tells us to cast "all your anxieties on (Jesus) because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7) and Jesus Himself reminds us, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own." (Matthew 6:34) Ain't that the truth!

Matthew 18:20 says, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them." Well, we gathered 53 youth on a Friday night last month for a Late Night event. There were High School youth, Middle School youth, Resurrection Lutheran School Middle School youth, and a handful of friends. A large group of young people that didn't know each other, hadn't built trusting relationships, and honestly not all are settled in a church home. That's when God gathers close to us.

Whether we have a small youth group night or a large event like our Late Night, God is close at hand. His presence was felt among adults and youth alike that night whether on the playground playing Gaga Ball or in the gym playing Laser Tag with Nathan, owner of Mission Games, or during our meal time.

I gave them a challenge that night to get to know someone they had never met before. Here's how I witnessed God working through these youth. At meal time, I set up multiple tables for youth to eat at. They rearranged the room and made large table groups where their entire group had a space at one communal table. Looked a lot like Luther's Table.

Team goals were set when playing games and suddenly you couldn't tell who the church kids, school kids, or friends were. Numbers and snaps were being exchanged by the end of the night (that is how youth communicate). My two seekers for our game of hide and seek represented one from the church and one from the school, different ages and genders. The conversation started like this, "Well, since we have to wait for them to hide and we don't know each other, maybe we should find out some things we have in common."

Where two or three or 53 teenagers are gathered in faith, God will surely show up. We are so thankful for the

God who always shows up to help us have fun in our faith and build relationships with Christ at our foundation.
