A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Holy Week and Easter?

As we begin the month of April, we are approaching the most significant week in our Lord's life and that of His Church.

Holy Week or the 'Holiest of Weeks', as I like to call it, is the final week of the Lent Season in the Church's liturgical calendar. It commemorates the events and sufferings during the last week of Jesus' life on earth before His resurrection. Let me share with you the major aspects of Holy Week which begins on **Palm Sunday** and ends on **Holy Saturday**, the day before **Easter Sunday**.

Palm Sunday commemorates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on a donkey to observe Passover (Matt. 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-44, John 12:12-19). The Gospels tell us that people greeted Jesus by waving palms and spreading garments on his way. They

proclaimed him the Son of David and shouted for him to "save us:" "Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Matt. 21:9-11).

Churches observe this day with the blessing, distribution, and procession of palms. Also called the Sunday of the Passion, the Passion of our Lord is read,

giving dual significance to the day – a joyous celebration and the suffering and death of the

One who came to save us.

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in Holy Week, traditionally called Holy Monday, Holy Tuesday, and Holy Wednesday, are days for preparation and prayer, self-examination and meditation as we look toward the events of the Easter Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday).

Then comes Maundy Thursday, or Holy **Thursday**, one of, if not the most intricate day, or evening of Jesus' life and that of the Church. For me, the service on this evening is the most spiritually fulfilling of the entire year.

First, Jesus initiated the 'Holy Eucharist' or 'Communion' on this evening by sharing a meal, known as the "Lord's Supper," with his disciples (Matt. 26:26-29, Mark 14:17-25, Luke 22:7-22, 1 Cor. 11:23-25). Christians commemorate Jesus' sacrifice, with bread and wine (or grape juice in some churches) representing His Body and Blood (Luke 22:19-20).

Second, John's Gospel (13:1-15) records **Jesus** washing his disciples' feet, demonstrating his humility, love and service for others, which, as Christians, we are to emulate. Following the foot washing, Jesus gave his disciples a



'command' or 'mandate,' the meaning of 'Maundy' from the Latin word mandatum: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another... just as I have loved you... (John 13:34). In churches, foot washing takes place during the Eucharist on this evening, as the priest or other individuals wash the feet of the congregation.

Third, the **'Stripping of the Altar** in churches on this night, is the removal of linens and adornments from the altar area in preparation for the solemnity of Good Friday. It symbolizes the stripping of Jesus' garments and the desertion he faced before his crucifixion.

Then comes **the Watch** which the Church observes after the Eucharist until Good Friday as people watch, reflect, pray, or meditate for one hour. This is reminiscent of when Jesus took Peter, James and John, to the Garden of Gethsemane where he prays. However, he returns to find them asleep, prompting him to ask, "So, could you not stay awake with me one hour?" (Matt. 26:40).

On this holy night, Jesus is **betrayed by Judas Iscariot** (Matt. 26:14-16, Mark 14:18-21, Luke



22:21-23, John 13:21-30), arrested by the authorities, (Matt. 26:47-56, Mark 14:43-52, Luke 22:47-53, John 18:1-12), denied by Peter (Matt. 26:69-75, Mark 14:66-72, Luke 22:54-62, John 18:15-27) and questioned by the Sanhedrin, the Jewish religious leaders, at the homes of Annas, the former high priest, and Caiaphas, the current high priest.

Good Friday commemorates Jesus' trials before **Pontius Pilate**, the Roman governor (Matt. 27:1-26, Mark 15:1-15, Luke 23:1-25, John

18: 28-40, 19:1-22) and **Herod Antipas**, the tetrarch (governor) of Galilee; (Luke 23:6-12), his **crucifixion**, and **death**. Christians observed this solemn day by attending services, fasting and reflecting on Jesus' sacrifice of his life for us.

Holy Saturday or Easter Eve, Easter Even, Black Saturday, or the Saturday before Easter is meant to be a day of mourning, reflection, and silence, as we remember Jesus' death and burial, and prepare for the resurrection on **Easter Sunday**. On this evening, the **Easter Vigil**, also known as the Paschal Vigil, or the Great Vigil of **Easter**, is held by many churches and is the first service celebrating our Lord's Resurrection. The service is held in the dark between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter Day. During this service, the **Paschal Candle**, symbolizing the Light of Christ is blessed and lighted, and persons are baptized into communion with the Church.

Easter Sunday, also called **Pascha** or **Resurrection Sunday** celebrates the raising of Jesus Christ from the dead (Matt. 28:1–8; Mark 16:1–8; Luke 24:1–12; John 20:1–18). **Easter Sunday** is the principal feast day in the Christian liturgical year. The **resurrection**, one of the chief tenets of the Christian faith, occurred on the third day of Jesus' burial following his crucifixion at Calvary, marking his victory over sin and death, and the possibility of eternal life. Called the "Queen of Seasons," the Season of Easter lasts for 50 days ending on the **Day of Pentecost**. Customs like Easter eggs and Easter bunny form part of the celebrations of the season.

Let us experience this very crucial week in the life of Jesus and in our lives as Christians as we commemorate the events which led to His purpose for coming to this earth. For our Lord died to save us of our sins and to give us eternal life with Him and the Father. May we commemorate this week by acknowledging the importance of what our Lord did because of His love for us.

I look forward to seeing you during the week.



PEERING INTO THE PAST

In Dorothy Kalb's column "Down Jensen Way," published in the June 3, 1959 edition of Fort Pierce's **The News-Tribune** provided the following.

"ST ANN'S GUILD PARTY – St. Ann's Guild[1] of All Saints' Episcopal Church had a most successful dessert-card party in the Parish Hall.

A profusion of Hibiscus and greenery created a pleasing décor in the card rooms where Mrs. Cal Wilbur[2] and her assistant hostesses, Mrs. Letha Eaton,[3] Mrs. Florence Johnson,[4] Mrs. Wallace Fletcher,[5] Mrs. Richard Landis, Mrs. Allen Purdom,[6] Mrs. Joseph Persia, and Mrs. Ray Switzer[7] served a sweet course.

High score awards went to Mrs.
Robert Thurston, Mrs. [Miss]
Zillah Rhoades,[8] Mrs. DeRoe,
Mrs. Warren Shipes, Jr.[9], Mrs.
Robert Haire,[10] Mrs. Jane
Livermore, Mrs. Frank Magahan,
Mrs. John Herrman,[11] Mrs. Alice
Pitchford, Mrs. Letha Eaton, and
Mrs. Ralp Lassisse. ...received door prizes."

[1] St Ann's Guild was one of two women's social groups.

[2] Mrs. Cal Wilbur – After the death of Mr. Cal Wilbur, his widow Alice married John Barnwell. The window to honor John Barnwell she purchased is in the back of church, on the left hand side as you exit the church. She arranged the flowers for worship for some 35 years. Alice and John Barnwell are buried in the cemetery on the north side of the church.

[3] Letha B. Eaton, 89, died 2012, in Stuart. She was born in Fort Myers and lived in Jensen Beach since 1956. The church owned her home just a couple doors down from the Thrift Shop.

[4] Florence Johnson was the parish secretary,

working 3 hours per day, 3 days each week. Under the choir loft on the left hand side as you enter the church, is the window depicting the 10 Commandments which she purchased. She is interred in the cemetery down by garage on the west side.

[5] Georgia Fletcher was a member of the church, the wife of the Parish Treasurer and mother of Joyce and Bruce Fletcher. She is buried in the cemetery.

[6] Mrs. Allen (Joanne) Purdom was the Vicar's wife and a mother of three at the time.

[7] Mrs. Ray Switzer's husband installed the terrazzo floor in Houg Hall.

[8] Miss Zillah Rhoads was a member, aunt of the parish Treasurer, great aunt of Joyce A Fletcher Menard and is buried in the cemetery.

[9] Mrs. Warren Shipes Jr was a cashier at the then Frances Langford's Outrigger restaurant (now The Dolphin Bar). She had a kindergarten in her home for many years. At least three of All Saints' kids started their education there.

[10] Mrs. Robert (Connie) Haire was married in All Saints' in 1950. Her father restored the church to it's foundation after the 1949 hurricane. She served as Parish Secretary for Fr. Lynn and is the oldest member on the parish register as she was baptized as an infant in a Sewalls Point Estate.

[11] Mrs. John Herrmann and her husband were founding members of Holy Faith Episcopal Church, on U.S. Hwy 1 in Port St Lucie.

During Lent, we think about the season in many different ways. We first watched a video about the "Temptation of Christ" in the desert. Then we talked about ways that we can be tempted every day. Making right choices is so important and sometimes hard to do, but knowing that Jesus is always by our side helps give us the support we need.

"Walking in the desert with Jesus" is an activity we do each Sunday, where the children write the ways they are trying to improve their character and strengthen their faith on little cardboard footprints. The children have created a desert branch display which holds the cardboard footprints.

We are all looking forward to Easter morning! Before the 10 o'clock service, the children will flower the Easter cross and place their Mite Bags in a designated basket. We will have Sunday school as usual. And then of course, after the 10 o'clock service, we will have our annual Easter Egg Hunt. Make sure the children bring their Easter baskets to church!

GARDEN HAPPENINGS!

"The garden is quiet today, not like it was during the week-- with all that banging and clanging going on. Are there some new people around our beloved church campus? Greta's mind was skipping around to several topics as she asked her friends. "I've seen this cute little white and black car here more often in the past few weeks, but I have not figured out to whom it belongs. I do know there has certainly been a lot of banging; I can't imagine what that is from. Are they building a storage barn or workshop or ...?"

Draco cleared his voice and said: "Greta, from my vantage point up here in the tree, I can see a crane down by the river.

Little One agreed, "Oh yes I've seen that – they delivered a new building down the hill in the cemetery. Mr. D and Ms. Holly painted the patio pad down there near the road before they put the mini

building there! It's a column-bar-um. But they don't seem to be serving any drinks at that bar and all the windows are closed."

Groggy replied: "Ho, um, Ha-Ha-ha, Hum... um. Little One, that building is not, I repeat, is not a bar. The mini building is a Columbarium. It is a repository for the ashes of a loved one that has died. Someone buys a spot in that mini building. There are a lot of little doors and behind a door is an area usually called a niche. They put a box or urn or another type of vessel that contains the ashes into the niche. Then the door is sealed shut. It is a respectable way to bring closure to a family after someone has died. It

also is incredibly tidy.

No digging in the sand no dirt or .."

Greta, in a bit of a huff, cut him off: "Wait a minute, I'm not sure "tidy" is how you should think about this burial choice. I think of it as a way to preserve the land for other purposes. As long as it is done respectfully, the ashes of a cremated body should be-- can be interred or deposited in consecrated ground. That is why we have a memorial garden at the bottom of the hill. But, there are probably other opinions. I just don't want to talk about this anymore. It is


