



A Christmas MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

Every year the Season of Advent arrives, I am reminded of a phrase I grew up hearing as a child: "Advent tells us Christ is near; Christmas tells us Christ is here." These are the opening words of a hymn written by Arabella Katherine Hankey, a 19th century English missionary, nurse, and poet. For whenever Advent begins, I feel the spirit of Christmas in the air.

Advent is a season of hope and anticipation, preparation and waiting for the celebration of

the Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, at Christmas. As a child, waiting for the Christmas season seemed to take longer to arrive than it does today. Nevertheless, Advent is a time to look forward to the arrival of Jesus - the first time He came as a babe in swaddling clothes and in a manger, and His

future return in which He shall come triumphantly to judge both the living and the dead and to be in eternity with Him.

It is important that in the same way we plan, prepare, and be ready to have everything right to welcome guests who are visiting our home, the same is true of our Lord. The belief is that we will also plan, prepare, and be ready to welcome Christ when He returns the second time.

The expectations and hopes of Advent became reality more than two thousand years ago, on the night we call Christmas. It is no wonder that for me the traditional Mass on Christmas Eve night is still my favorite for it has such a magical, inspiring, spiritually uplifting, aura to it. Why? Because it tells me that this is the

night we celebrate Christ being here among us. We commemorate that God is with us – "Emmanuel." It also calls to mind that first Christmas night when the shepherds were greeted by 'the angel and a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" (Luke 2:13 –14). How unexpected and yet miraculous and thrilling the shepherds would receive this news and they went and found the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy in Jesus, the Son of God, who would bear the names, "Wonderful Counselor,

Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6).

Christmas, my friends, is such a wonderful time of the year. Let this Christmas be spiritually magical for you as you experience the presence of Jesus in your lives. Let us capture the wonder,

essence, and glory which the shepherds and later the wise men would have experienced when they encountered the Christ Child. And let us not forget the reason He came, which the Apostle Paul wrote so powerfully, "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children" (Galatians 4:4-5). He came to be like us and for us to be like Him.

May you, your family, and loved ones, have a blessed Advent and joyous Christmas.

I thank God for so much and will definitely continue an active spiritual life and enjoy being with my son and daughter in the Philadelphia area which I love.



Weekly Food Collection




Thanks to all who contributed food on Saturday, November 22, to decorate the Church building for Thanksgiving.

- Men of the congregation cut down Florida cedar tree boughs and brought them to Houg Hall; the congregation enjoyed a potluck meal and sang Christmas carols as we put together fresh wreaths for the interior of the church.
- Our Sunday School children took poinsettias and went caroling to the parish's homebound with one of the young people playing guitar. Deacon Dan LePore lead this.
- John Fulton, our organist of several decades,

died unexpectedly, just a couple weeks before Christmas, bringing a sad tinge to Christmas, even though an alternate organist was found for our services.

• Delilah, the African Gray Parrott, came to midnight mass with her human, sitting right up front with the Senior Warden and his



wife, Dick and Cathy LaQuerre.

• On Father Frisby's final midnight mass as the Rector of All Saints', his son Christopher, in addition to playing his trumpet served as the acolyte swinging the incense.

While swinging it, the incense pot (thurible) hit one of the pew torches, sprinkling incense on the front third of the congregation. The burn marks are still in the carpet up on the right hand side in front of the pulpit.

Oh my, there is so much happening today. Who are all these people? And why are there tents in the garden? "Kevin, the white frog with the big eyes, was talking – but only Draco the giant firefly was listening. "Oh, there is Mr. George and Mr. Jack with another tent."



Draco with his deep voice sang quietly. Mostly for Kevin, but for any of the other critters that were listening as well. "It's a fine day for men to work, and a fine day to watch them all."

That calmed Kevin down; he knew Draco would explain when most of the people were gone. But then it happened; another critter on four legs came sniffing around. From Kevin's vantage point this was a large ... something. He circled around a few times and then lay down with a loud "Umph."

Quietly at first the big black thing started to snore; but as he lay there the snoring became a snort. Then a yawn, and then it looked around... and said "Hi, I'm tired and hot so I hope you don't mind me resting here. When these tents and tables are all in place, I'll be leaving with my people."

Putting a brave friendly face on, Kevin replied: "You may rest here; it is a nice cool and quiet spot most of the time."

"Boggy are you thirsty?" A nice lady brought the critter a bowl of water. As he drank – very noisily and messy... Kevin heard her talking again: "You are a good dog; just rest. We will go home in a bit." Kevin smiled – now he knew this was a dog. His people loved him, and he would be leaving soon. So he asked: "Do you come here often? I don't recall seeing you before."

With soulful eyes the dog looked at the frog and stated: "I come here every now and again, when my family has work to do here in the building or on the campus of this church. Sometimes I'm out in front of Bethany House, and sometimes I get to lie on the nice cool floor of the big hall."

Then he yawned again, and continued: "I have a pesky brother who is running around here like a maniac.

We don't look anything alike, we are not the same size, we are not the same color and we joined the family years apart. He likes to run around – zipping here and there. 'Pickles' is his name; he is always busy doing something, he just annoys me and wears me out at the same time. It is good to rest!"

Kevin took all of this in, but remembering what he had heard about kindness, belonging, and watching the people of this church helping each other, he was careful about what he said.

"I don't have a brother – or a sister for that matter–well, I don't know of any. But I have lots of friends here in the garden. We look out for each other, and care about what happens to our friends."

"Oh, I like Pickles, but he is so busy and wants me to play tag all the time. I get tired of it after a while." The dog continued: "Do you know what is happening here? Do you know you will be invaded tomorrow? There will be people all over here – and maybe a few other dogs. They will bring out Christmas trees and decorations, jewelry and crafts... 'Stuff!' That's what my master calls it... just STUFF."

Kevin was beginning to realize tomorrow would be a very different kind of day in the garden. Then he wondered what was going on around the corner with Groggy, Greta, and the other

critters.

As evening came and the campus was once again quiet, Kevin voiced his questions to Draco. He told Kevin just enough for him to not be afraid. He said: "I can tell you the others are already sleeping. They know it will be a busy day in the garden and it starts pretty early.

I could tell you all that will happen... but I'm ready to sleep as well. Just remember one thing. The people that visit tomorrow may get really close to you—but they will just walk on by. They will be too interested in what is for sale at the Holly Fair to pay any attention to you or me. Goodnight Kevin."

Early in the morning Kevin sat just pondering why there would be a sale of things.... And what things would available. Then he began to remember a previous day with tents, music and cars... and many people. Would today be the same? As he sat there... it began- one car or truck at a time.

Familiar faces, Jack and Sandy, Paul and Karen, Ms. Joyce, Dara and Natalie, they were arriving and putting things out on the tables, putting plants in the garden, rolling a big tall rack full of things, and the trees—pretty decorated trees.... The thought struck Kevin--- it looks like Christmas – did I miss the late night mass? No; I know that was not last night.

Draco would have told me to be quiet! The people are almost running back and forth. Ah, there is Jack with his coffee – all is right in the world. Something about seeing Mr. Jack with his coffee cup calmed Kevin. Then he heard the call to prayer and he turned to see Ms. Joyce standing on the steps as she led the people in prayer.

Draco smiled down at Kevin and winked when he knew Kevin was looking... That did it! The smile went back on Kevin's face and he just observed all that was happening – knowing it was all under God's plan.

Later, Kevin and many of the other critters listened as someone was explaining what Holly Fair was all about: "We offer the items, most of which are donated; for sale to the people of the Treasure Coast. Some come here mainly for the baked goods that ladies (and some men) make. The dill pickles Miss Pricilla makes and the pepper jelly that is made by Miss Donna are favorites.

They come every year for them. But we do this for others. We are God's hands in this endeavor because we use the money that is gathered, to help others. Some goes to Haiti for a school that the Diocese of South Florida helps. Some goes to the Scholarship Program for local high school seniors perusing advanced schooling and some supports our Vacation Bible School. All three of which are also supported individually by people of this congregation.

There are several local non-profits that receive some of the funds. Operation 300 is a camp for Gold Star families. They have programs for the children of service men and women that help the children cope with the loss of – the death of – a parent or sibling.


Another non-profit that benefits from this is in Port St Lucie. They help people recovering from an addiction, another is on Salerno Road in Stuart –LAHIA which stand for "Love And Hope In Action" they also help and feed homeless, and have councilors available to assist folks as the strive to be in a better spot.

LAHIA also have laundry and shower facilities for their clients. But, we do this as a way of giving back to the community and hope it gives a hand up to those who are in need and seek it out. God gives us many blessings, and this one of our ways of giving to others."

Kevin's smile got wider and his eyes became brighter; and as he looked up to Draco in the tree, they both nodded and winked. They were happy to share their Garden spot with all of our visitors, and the both said a quiet "thank you" to all the workers.

Spend a minute or two in the garden – you too will smile!


