A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

In Memoriam – Audrey Haynes Holder

The following are extracts from my address, preached at my mother's funeral service on Friday, May 23, 2025, in St. Barnabas Anglican (Episcopal) Church, Barbados.



The eldest daughter of James and Edith Matilda Ward Haynes, was baptized and given the name **Audrey**, which means "noble strength..." My mother had the challenge of raising four boys and keeping us on the straight and narrow, the trials of rearing Ian and me on her own while Dad worked for a year in an isolated country in the

South Pacific Ocean, named Ascension Island, the struggles as a homemaker while Dad was the only breadwinner in the home, among others. Yes, my mother had her challenges, but she kept rejoicing. Often, she didn't know what tomorrow would bring, but she didn't worry about it because she knew who held tomorrow and she knew who held her hand.

That was the very nature of my mother... a woman who was rooted in her faith. Her words, actions, and very essence, radiated from her faith in God and His word, and her love for his Church. Mom loved the Lord first and foremost. She engaged in daily prayer and reading the Bible, which she and Dad did twice a day until she did it on her own after his death. She taught us to always give our best in whatever we do; mediocrity was unacceptable. When we are working for God, you give doubly of your best... Mom had a genuineness of faith of which Peter writes in [1 Peter 1:7], a faith that was "more precious than gold." Her faith was of such that even though she has never seen God, she knew and loved him. Mom's faith is what kept her going. It was very strong, stronger than anyone we knew. At times it was

pleasantly frightening when we didn't think the impossible would happen and it did, and all along Mom believed, even knew, it would happen; it was only a matter of when and God was the one who determined that. When we, her children, were in stressful situations, she had a way of getting us to relax and put our faith in God... and we are going to miss that deeply. This is part of the reason I have wrestled tremendously with her death for we are now unable to ask our parents for their words of advice and wisdom that would strengthen our faith. We have lost our lifeline.

Since Mom loved God, she also loved the church... and this Church of St. Barnabas in particular... it was a vital part of her life. Her sons had to follow suit. Having a good Christian upbringing was crucial. We were not religious fanatics but praying at least twice daily was the norm. However, Sunday was of exceptional importance. She brought all four of us to this place for services, Sunday School and Evensong. We couldn't play sports nor what mom called "secular" music at home on Sundays, only religious music. As we got older and joined the AYPA [youth group], all we had to say was that we were ... going to the church for a youth event or activity and the response was always "Yes." But we better go where we said we were going. Ian remembers we were not as lucky with non-church activities, although in my case, most of my non-church activities like going to the cinema and other events were spent with my friends, the late Roger Maxwell and Grell Griffith, the son of our former rector. What could go wrong when you are out with the son of a priest? So, mom would let me go.

My mother became passionately involved in the church's life after we had reached an age of independence. Having taken care of the home and family, she dedicated time to God. She could easily spend several days a week attending services, meetings, evening classes, and church events. Even when she and Dad moved out of the parish, they continued worshiping here every Sunday and Mom continued her involvement in the Mothers' Union, Church Army and Prayer Group, which she enjoyed. She participated in several evening classes and Dad always drove her to them. After learning many skills, she made and iced cakes for weddings and went on to teach a few of the crafts she had learned to the children in the summer day camps. When Dad decided he wasn't driving anymore, a neighbor took them to services on Sundays, while Mom rode on the bus and walked a reasonable distance to get to these grounds for meetings and activities. Once, I asked her if she thought of going to Christ Church, her childhood church, which was closer. But mom wanted to continue attending St. Barnabas, even saying that "Christ Church will have me for a long time after I am

gone... but St. Barnabas will have me now."

Mom had a habit whenever she heard I was preaching at St. Barnabas to call and remind me not to preach any of my fifteen minute sermons, which she felt was too brief. She would remark that the people at St. Barnabas would think I had nothing to say and then I would leave, and she has to remain. I would tell her I am exhausted after preaching for fifteen minutes and that people's ears and posteriors could only take so much hearing and sit-

ting on pews. She would counter by saying, "sermons at St. Barnabas are 30-45 minutes long, so people's ears and rear ends are accustomed to longer sermons." In the final

analysis, I would say to her, "Mom, I am going to preach for five extra minutes so that you wouldn't be embarrassed." So, as you may already realize, this sermon is more than 15 minutes so that mom would not be embarrassed that I didn't have much to say about her.

Mom loved people... the people here at St. Barnabas and her church friends, the majority of whom have predeceased her. But she loved people in general. She taught us always to love people, never to hate or dislike anyone. "You may not like a person's ways or something they have said or done, but you are never to hate or dislike anyone," she would say. Her love was exhibited in her kind, caring, affectionate, and generous manner. When you came to our home, you couldn't leave without mom giving you something to take with you, whether foodstuff or something she had made. She believed "It is better to give than to receive." Sometimes, we couldn't get house guests to leave because they felt so much at home with us, primarily because of mom's loving and caring nature.

And it goes without saying that she loved her

family. She loved her sons and would do all within her power so that we received the best of everything, even if it meant she went without. Her commitment to raising and caring for her family was paramount.

Mom was a disciplinarian. She did not spare the rod and spoil the child... She did everything possible to ensure we were well-grounded. She knew our different needs and how to engage with each of us when we were boys. She knew which tactic worked on each of us, whether it was a scolding, a story, or a good spanking.

We commend to God this woman who many may not have known was an exceptional seamstress, who could make anything out of

fabric... my mother who God blessed for the last 31 years of her life with the joy of celebrating both her anniversary of birth and my

As part of our Church's participation in Martin County's Historic Preservation Month, the Colonial Dames of the 17th Century's Lord Baltimore Chapter, held the unveiling ceremony of a marker providing part of our history on Saturday, May 24th.



The President of the Lord Baltimore Chapter, Donna K. DuBois, served as mistress of Ceremonies. In the absence of our Rector who was overseas, our Senior Warden, James Laverty, (pictured above) welcomed the fifty-one people in attendance.



The Colonial Dames of the 17th Century had four of their state officers in attendance, including the State

President, Sharon Spry (*right*) and State Historical Marker Committee Chair, Carol Bruno (*left*), who provided remarks and did the actual unveiling.

Eileen Vargas, Commissioner: District 1, Stuart's mayor, Campbell Rich, and other elected officials presented remarks. Martin County's Historic Preservation Board was represented by Joetta L. Rice who highlighted Martin County's



Historic Preservation efforts and this year's Centennial Celebration for Martin County.

When the remarks were completed the marker was unveiled and light refreshments were enjoyed.

The marker is located at the corner of Patrician Street and Seaview Drive next to the flagpole and church sign. All of this was followed by the tour of the church provided by the Parish Historian. Twelve people stayed to enjoy our rich history.

The Cemetery Staff installed the signage and their assistance was appreciated.

The National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century members are "devoted to preserving the memory of those that settled in the United States of America prior to 1701."

The organization preserves historic sites and records, promotes heraldry and coats of arms of colonial families and organizations, and supports education at local, state, and the national levels.



All Saints' Cemetery

Did you know that the Cemetery spent over \$12,000 in sprinkler repairs last year? There are many sprinklers along the roadway in the cemetery, and it costs between \$250 and \$300 to repair when they are driven over or parked upon.



The cemetery has marked the sprinklers with bright yellow concrete stops and is

moving the sprinklers away from the roadway, but we need your help.

- 1. Please do not drive on the cemetery grass. If you find that you are going one way and another car is going the opposite direction, carefully pull over between 2 marked sprinklers and stop. After the other car has passed, carefully pull back onto the roadway. If you don't see marked sprinklers, then back up until you see a safe spot. Do not drive along on the grass.
- 2. Please do not park on the cemetery grass. If you must park along the roadway, be sure that you are parking between 2 marked yellow sprinklers and only pull the width of 1 tire off the roadway.
- 3. Please do not stomp on the sprinklers. Most of the new / replaced sprinklers are designed to be sticking up out of the ground (see picture). This is for better visibility. We've had helpful people stomp on the sprinklers to "make them go down." All this does is break the pipes underneath the ground.
- 4. If you have an event that you believe will require you to park on the cemetery roadway, please contact the Cemetery Manager, Rebecca Damberg, at least a week in advance. This will allow the cemetery to



put up signage for where it is safe to park.

We are working so hard to keep the grounds green especially in the summer heat. We sincerely appreciate everyone's support to keep the church and grounds beautiful. Together, the church and cemetery can make great strides in making our church look its best.


