A Message from the Rector

College for Congregational Development Training Program

My Dear Friends:

From June 22 to 27, Duncan Hurd, Bill Winsemann, and I joined with other clergy and lay members of our Diocese and of the Dioceses of Southwest Florida and New York for a week-long, intensive, and incredible program, hosted by the College for Congregational Development. This two-year training program, held at Our Lady of Florida Spiritual Center in North Palm Beach, was intended to equip lay and clergy leaders with the skills and tools necessary in cultivating healthy, vibrant, and mission-focused congregations.

With a team of nine trainers, from as far west as the states of Washington and California and as far east as New York, and including three members of our own diocese, the structure of the program included plenary sessions with the entire group, small-group discussions, practical learning experiences and work sheets, designed to build and promote the best practices in effective communication, stronger congregational leadership, organizational development, and spiritual renewal and growth.

These practices were realized within the context of a mixture of reading, discussion, application exercises, intervention work, worship,

and the like. Varying approaches, models, and tools, were geared at equipping both clergy and lay people with the knowledge and skills necessary to be used at the individual, team, and congregation levels. The expectation is that individuals, church organizations and groups, and congregations, will:

- Examine their current reality and to ask, "Who they are, what they are, and where they are."
- Discern their future by seeking to find out what God is inviting them to be and to do at this particular time and in their specific place?)
- Work on a plan or approach along with goals and actions as to how do they get to the future.

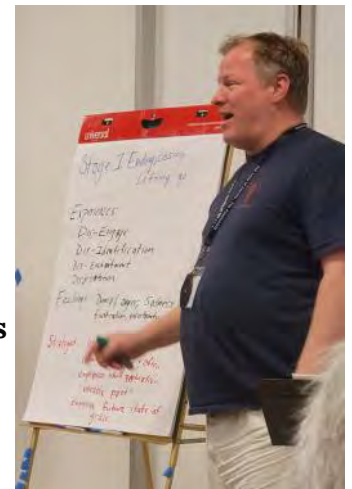
Some of the major areas we covered in the program were:

- * The four (4) **Sources of Transformation** as the Church – Prayer and Worship, Study and Learning, Action, and Life in Community.
- * **Faith Development in Community**, expressed by people over a lifetime, through worship attendance or their daily life, a set of beliefs or doubts and questions, are to be welcomed into the congregation.
- * Applying **the Benedictine Life** of stability, obedience, and conversion of life, into the congregational setting.
- * **Life Cycle of Organizations**, including local churches, starts with birth and include stages of formation, stability, decline, and disintegration, ending with death. For any congregation or group to sustain healthy stability, ongoing renewal is needed.
- * **Trust Development and Conflict** highlighted methods and tools for building trust and conflict resolution within congregational life.
- * **Intercultural Conflict:** Assessing communication and conflict resolution styles across varying cultures.
- * Identifying one’s personality type, using **the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) Assessment**. Participants completed this exercise as a means of understanding each other, their strengths, areas for

growth, motivations, and reducing miscommunication and misunderstanding.

- * **Facilitation Skills:** Creating successful meetings and the importance of a facilitator.
- * Three (3) main components of **Group and Team Dynamics** were examined: Task (*the group’s ability to accomplish tasks*), Maintenance (*maintain and nurture team relationships so as to contribute easily*), and Individual Needs (*recognizing each person’s gifts encourages inclusion and value within the team*).

Other areas included: **Brainstorming and prioritization, gathering data in the congregation, giving and receiving feedback, change processes and models, and congregations as organizational systems and its leadership**, as well as other topics.

A project is to be completed by November 1, and implemented within the congregations during the year. In June 2026, we will gather again to assess our work and complete the training.

The children brought in so much food that it filled a huge box to overflowing and they

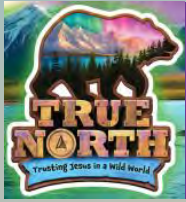

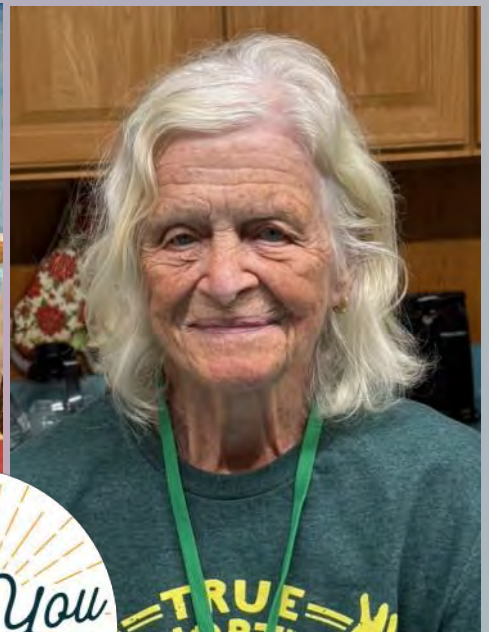

Peering Into the Past

What are the oldest things in our prayer book? After the Lord's Prayer, and Jesus instruction to remember him with the Holy Eucharist and to wash one another's feet ... What do you think?

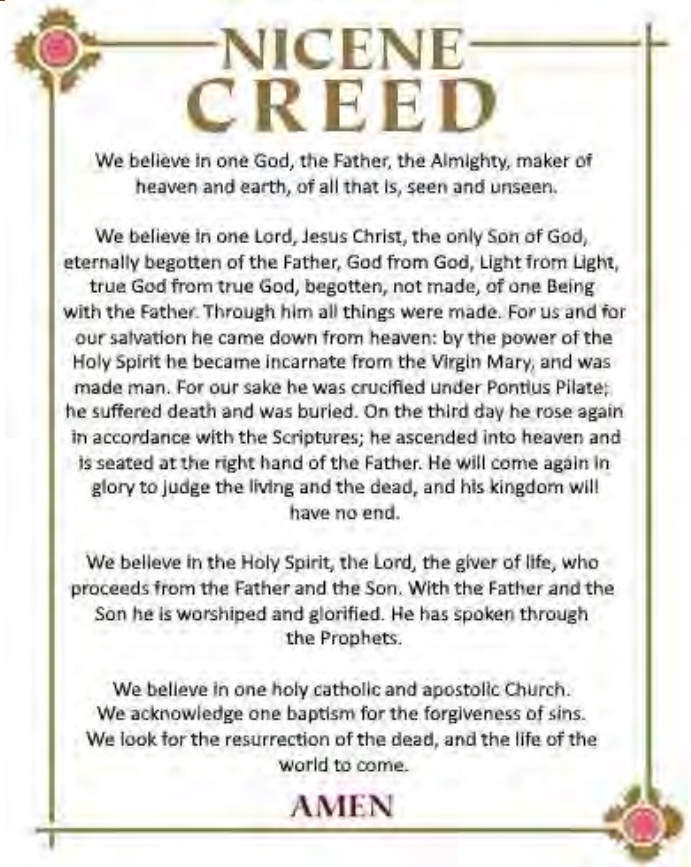
May 2025 marked 1,700 years since the Council of Nicaea met for three months. This meeting was convened by the Emperor Constantine I. He gathered approximately three hundred bishops in Nicaea (now Turkey) who developed the first official declaration of the Christian faith. It is still considered the more foundational creed in

Christian denominations around the world, including ours.

The current Book of Common Prayer for use by the Episcopal Church in the U.S. was



approved in 1979. Beginning on page 864 in the red covered Book of Common Prayer found in our pews, you will find the Articles of Religion. The eighth one follows.

VIII. Of the Creeds.

“The Nicene Creed, and that which is commonly called the Apostles’ Creed, ought thoroughly to be received and believed: for they may be proved by most certain warrants of Holy Scripture. The Bishops, Clergy, and the Laity of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, in Convention, on the twelfth day of September, in the Year of our Lord, 1801, established the Articles of Religion.

So the next time someone asks you what we Episcopalian believe, just pull out the old Nicene Creed. Hope you find this helpful.

“I like to see the children and watching their games – That’s right up my alley – and I know they will go home and peace will pervade until the next day; right?”

“You got that right. They will spend the morning learning about God and Jesus and experience the “TRUE NORTH” as best as they can – after all we are in Florida.”

“Ha Ha! – you are right ... I heard Flora the new bee; describe the scenery in Houg Hall. It sounds beautiful; with snow banks and pine trees, flowing streams and wildlife all around it sounds magical. But I’m happy for warm sunshine right here! “

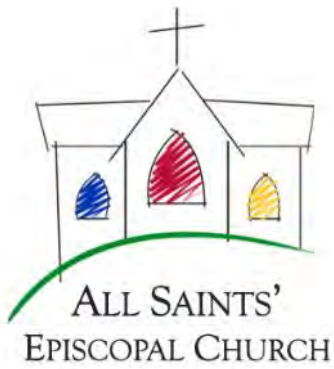
