A Message from the Rector

The Season of Easter

Often times we think of Easter as being one day instead of a number of days. Easter is a



season of fifty days, beginning on Easter Sunday and ending on the Day of Pentecost or Whitsunday, with a number of significant days within this period. As we are near the end of the season, let's briefly look at those special days. They include:

The most important, of course, is **Easter Sunday**, the day we celebrate our Lord's resurrection from the dead. It is the first day and Sunday of the Easter Season. Easter Sunday is the principal day in the Christian or Church's year. It supersedes Christmas and Pentecost, which are the second and third most important days in the Church's year respectively.

Some has asked, "**Why is Easter Sunday a moveable feast day instead of it being like Christmas?**" It's a combination of things. For starters, it needs to be on a Sunday and having it on a specific date would mean that Easter would not always fall on a Sunday. More importantly, Easter Sunday always falls on the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon, which is the first full moon after the spring or vernal equinox. (Yes, the date of

Easter is chosen by the moon because the English monk, the Venerable Bede, felt it was a good way to remember when Easter falls). So, Easter Sunday always falls between March 22 and April 25. As a result, the date of Easter Sunday affects a number of other dates including Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday and Holy Week, Ascension Day, and the Day of Pentecost. It also determines the dates of Jewish holidays.

Concerning **Easter eggs**, it is believed that this tradition started among the early Christians of Mesopotamia (*present-day Iraq and north-eastern Syria, but also including parts of present-day Iran, Turkey, and Kuwait*), who stained them with red coloring or dye "in memory of the blood of

Christ, shed at His crucifixion." The practice was adopted by the Orthodox Churches, and it spread into Western



Europe. It's believed that this custom became a part of the Easter celebrations. Eggs represent new life and rebirth, and is symbolic of the Trinity having a shell, yolk, and albumen as three parts of one egg.

The Second Sunday of Easter or the Sunday after Easter Day, is called **Low Sunday** because church worship attendance often decreases significantly as compared to the usual large number of worshipers on Easter Sunday.



Good Shepherd Sunday always occur on the Fourth Sunday of the Easter Season. The Gospel passage from John's Gospel,

which is read in churches on this day, tells the story of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, who is prepared to lay down his life for his sheep. This day is also called **Vocations Sunday** when we pray for persons to be called to various vocations and ministries, both ordained and un-ordained. It reminds us of Jesus' teaching to "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest" (Matthew 9:38).

The Sixth Sunday of Easter (the fifth Sunday after Easter Sunday) is commonly known as

"Rogation Sunday."

The word "rogation" comes from the Latin verb *rogare*, meaning "to

ask." It is an ancient festival of the church devoted to asking for God's blessing on the land and sea, industry and commerce, and the stewardship of God's creation. The Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday following Rogation Sunday are called "**Rogation Days**," which are for fasting and prayer. Rogation Sunday is usually observed with processions, litanies or prayers.

Ascension Day, the ascent of Jesus into heaven, is celebrated on the fortieth day of the Easter Season or the thirty-ninth day after



Jesus' resurrection. It always falls on the Thursday following Rogation Sunday and the three Rogation

Days. Ascension Day, which used to mark the end of the Easter Season, occurs ten days before Pentecost. A number of Scandinavian and European countries observe Ascension Day as a public holiday with special services, events, and symbols. The Feast of the Ascension ranks with Easter, Christmas, and Pentecost in terms of its significance.

In light of the importance of Ascension Day, when it is not celebrated on the day, the Ascension is celebrated in churches on the following Sunday. Hence, the Seventh Sunday of Easter is also called **the Sunday after Ascension Day**.

The fiftieth and last day of the Season of



Easter is called the **Day of Pentecost** or **Whitsunday**. The day celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit in the form of tongues of fire upon the Apostles and other followers, as recorded in Acts 2. Those gathered were empowered to continue Jesus' teaching and mission. This day is also commemorated as the Birth of the Church. It is the third most significant day in the Christian calendar. The word "**Whitsunday**" is used in Great Britain and other countries for this day. It is believed that the name is derived from the white garments worn by catechumens, who were to be baptized on that Sunday, and was therefore called "White Sunday."

Hope this information was educational.

Deacon's Report

So much is happening with persons applying for financial assistance through TRUE, the Fund we use to help people in financial need. The biggest problem I encounter relates to housing costs, which are increasing to the point where people can no longer stay where they are living, and most of them struggle to pay their rent or are forced to become homeless.

There are few places in our County for the homeless, as all the few shelters we have are full with waiting lists. As far as I know, little can be done to overcome these problems. \$200 from TRUE often does not help them, especially when the rent is due. I spend much of my time listening and offering them prayers.

I can help a few applicants with more minor needs, which are minimal. Sometimes, just a small amount given means so much to these applicants. It lets them know that somebody cares, and the Church cares. We listen and hear their needs. What can we do to provide specific needs when resources are unavailable? How can we help people with minimal income and rising inflation costs?

Other areas of my ministry are more hopeful. We have identified more homebound persons and are now providing them with Communion in their homes. Please let us know if other persons would like Communion in their homes. We have found out that some people used to come to Church but, since the pandemic, have not felt well enough to attend Church. They watch our services on Facebook or YouTube or through our new website but greatly miss receiving Communion in person.

I continue to do my weekly Bible Study at the prison. Several men attend every week and are committed to reading the Bible and receiving other services I provide, including Communion. We have recently been looking at the meaning of the word "Paschal" and how it relates to the Resurrection.

I am pleased that I can continue my diaconate work and be so active at All Saints'.

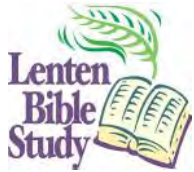

I am in need of a volunteer to take over the weekly delivery over the summer. The job is easy, even I can do it. See me between or after mass to discuss.

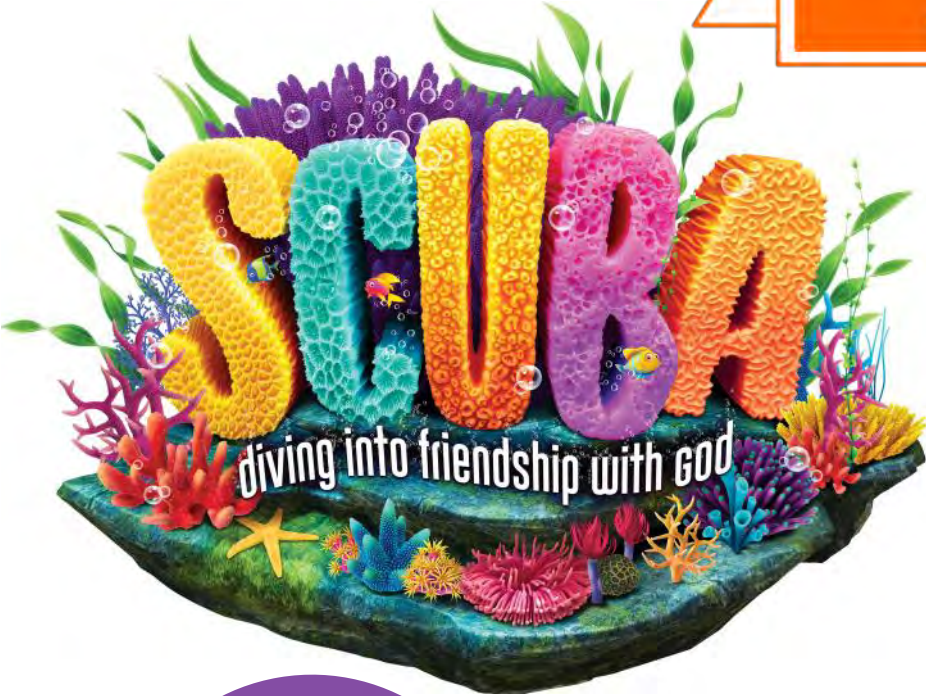

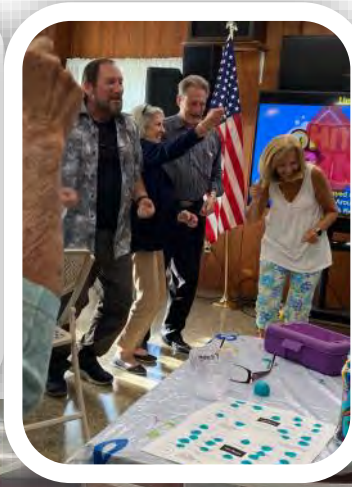
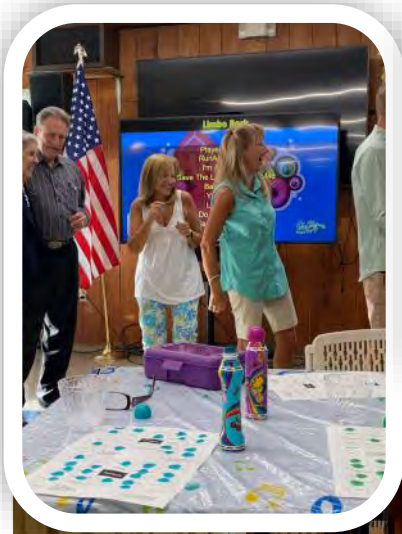

Finally, the Annual Easter Egg Hunt was enjoyed by all. Within about 8 minutes, all 365 eggs were found!

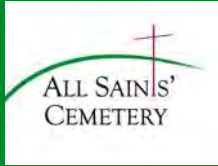
Now the children are deciding what will be the next project they can do for the church.
