Lenten Message from the Rector

My Dear Friends:

I grew up on the island of Barbados at a time when the Season of Lent was the most penitential, somber, time of the year. There was no other season in the Church's Year with as many worship services and spiritual enrichment programs than during Lent. I worshiped at the Eucharist and Evensong each Sunday morning and evening respectively. There were mid-week Lenten services on Wednesday evenings, and Stations of the Cross on Fridays. Sprinkled in between was a weekly Bible Study. Attending church services and formation programs were the order of each week during Lent.

As kids, we learned that the devil was more mischievous during Lent, which I figured was because of the temptations our Lord encountered from the devil while he was in the wilderness. I believe St. Peter's caution to "discipline yourselves, keep alert. Like a roaring lion your adversary the devil prowls around, looking for someone to devour" (1 Peter 5:8) played a part as well. I am sure my parents, particularly my mom, having to rear four rambunctious boys wanted to put the fear of God in us so that we would be the best behaved children in the neighborhood. So, mentioning these things to us, even though Scriptural, placed a bit of "the fear of God" in us.

The phrase "the fear of God" appears mostly in the Old Testament rather than in the New Testament and is a forgotten concept in our age. It is not meant to make us afraid of God, as I believe my parents may have partially intended it to be but "the fear of God" means having profound respect, an affectionate reverence, a sense of awe and wonder for God. There are people who believe that we no longer need to "fear" God because it is an Old Testament notion that is not relevant for us

today because we receive God's grace and love.

Nevertheless, we still need to possess "the fear of God" for it is important to the deepening of our relationship with Him. Without the fear of God," we make decisions based on our limited human understanding rather than making decisions based on God's approval.

Therefore, having "the fear of God" is expected to be a daily part of who we are as God's people, and it helps us to understand and live our lives under His care. Having "the



fear of God" is the gateway for wanting to please God recognizing that our relationship with him is one in which He has ultimate authority and power over us. Having "the fear of God" is to be exemplified in our worship experience, giving honor and glory, reverence and praise, awe and wonder to God, rather than assessing our likeness for the service. Our respect for God's glory causes us to honor Him; our thankfulness for His compassion and mercy causes us to serve Him.

So, I am inviting each of you as we observe this Lenten Season – to live our lives in "the fear of God." Let it be a season for self-examination and repentance, as a period

self-examination and repentance, as a period for prayer, fasting, and self-denial, as a time for reading and meditating on God's holy Word. Let us carve out space and time each day during this season to spend with God so that we would deepen our relationship with Him and to truly experience Him in our lives. Let us use the time to listen to Him, to fear Him, to be respectful and be reverent, to have a sense of awe and admiration for God and the things of God for it is the beginning of acquiring spiritual wisdom. For such wisdom is seeing life, not from our perspective, but from God's perspective and being able to respond appropriately.



As we engage in this discipline during Lent, may we be able to say in the words of William Cowper's hymn, **O** for a closer walk with God:

The dearest idol I have known, Whate'er that idol be, Help me to tear it from thy throne, And worship only thee.

So shall my walk be close with God,

Calm and serene my frame; So purer light shall mark the road That leads me to the Lamb.

I wish you, your family, and loved ones a holy Lent!
















Lenten Bible Reading Challenge



GARDEN HAPPENINGS!

"Bea, do you remember the quilt that was keeping you warm a few weeks ago when it was so chilly out here in the garden? Oh, I'm sure you do since all of us were blessed with a garment to keep us warm. The Garden Whisperer sure took care of us. Did you also know the ladies from Bethany Ministries finished 16 quilts?" Greta seemed to have something big on her mind as she asked her friend these questions.

"Oh yes, I remember the quilt snuggled around me and I saw all 16 quilts last week on display in the church building. They looked wonderful and I think the children will really like them. I wonder how they accomplished making so many quilts. Any of the pictures of the quilts that I asked Joyce Menard to send to you.

In a rare occurrence, Greta smiled as she answered her friend: "They are quite a team; and Bea, I believe team is the word here... I think they use teamwork."

Bea winked at her friend and said: "There are basically four ladies doing this outreach work. They are supported by Women's Fellowship as that group somehow pays for the batting. You know, that warm stuff in the middle of a quilt.

I overheard Miss Joyce saying she would do the quilting as long as someone else would help with the sandwiching. I'm not real sure how they do it, but I know the batting goes in the middle and there are pieces of fabric on either side of that batting. Usually one side has a design made out of different colors and that part is sewn together carefully." "Ah, yes." Greta answered. "Just yesterday, Miss Maryann said she was getting material and rulers from a lady that is not physically able to do her quilting anymore. It was very nice of her to share those things. I have heard people praising her work; so I think Miss Maryann must be an awesome quilt maker. This gift can only help! Hmm, I wonder how much time it takes to make a quilt."

Surprising the other two, Groggy answered. "Well, ladies, let's think about that question. First one needs a design idea, and then they need to gather the supplies and equipment needed. I have heard those same people exclaim over a new sewing machine that does embroidery designs as well as quilts. So, that must be one of the things that they each own; a sewing machine. I also know how long it takes SOME people and SOME statues to make up their I mind over small details, so choosing the right material design or color, or shade of the right color might take a good

bit of time. It might even take weeks to find the right fabric! But these ladies seem to be on a fast track"

"I think they must work smarter than others since they made so many!" Little One was quick to add. "But now that I think about that, I know it was 2 months of time to make 16 quilts. Because they started after Holly Fair on making their own Christmas gifts and then changed their mind and decided to have one session of quilting at Bethany House in December. Miss Joyce said so one Wednesday after a Healing Service." Good of Little One to remember that, but he surprised them

even more when he added: "When I was in the Thrift Shop in Bethany House last year, I went into the quilting rooms and I watched them divide up the work just like you said. That day each lady brought in one or two of the quilt tops they had finished. Then they took turns helping each person to sandwich their quilts. They talked about which fabric to use for a backing. Apparently, Miss June

likes to match colors, Miss Joyce just wants it to be large enough, and some Miss Maryann sews

together so it is a large enough piece for a particular quilt. The other lady said she had material at home that would go great with a quilt top, so that one did not get sandwiched that day. They pinned some of the quilt sandwiches together; top, batting and backing just like a sandwich! Oh, and others they used spray ad... hmm, adhesive, well, something in a spray can." Jackson added: "I remember that Little One; it is called temporary spray adhesive, and boy does it smell. I was choking; good thing they turned the fan on. I was happy they used that stuff on the material and not us!"

Groggy took that moment to add his thoughts. "You all do know that they don't get paid to make the quilts, right? And you have heard Father Tony's sermons about the first commandment: To love God, above all else. And the Second Commandment: To Love our neighbors as ourselves. So, we know they enjoy quilting but why do you think these ladies do so much of this stuff?"

Bea, the big red bee was quick to answer: "To make a quilt for others is to show love for our neighbors. It is also a way of honoring God." Greta added: "To give away a quilt, shows that love to a neighbor. Just like Miss Jiggs did last week when she gave the "Pencil Quilt" she won at the High Tea, to Miss Joan.

"Oh yes!" Little one piped up. "And Miss Joan said she would have the quilt blessed by Father Tony and then she would mail it to her granddaughter. Now that is sharing love all over!"

"That is a great observation, and one we can all learn. Another Biblical saying: 'Tis' more blessed to give than to receive' and I suppose for the person doing the giving that is very



true. Maybe receiving a blessing like a quilt will help those children at SafeSpace to experience and learn thankfulness; and have some hope for their futures." Draco, the firefly in the tree, seems to always have a way of summing things up quite nicely.

Perhaps we can all take a gem of a lesson here, and find a way to share something with someone in need, or a way to bless them in their daily life. This reminds me of the Scouting way: "Do a good turn daily!"

Looking forward to Lent, I suggest we reflect on the blessings we have received and find ways to share them.




