## A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

During the month of May, we celebrate "Memorial Day," originally called "Decoration Day," on the last Monday in May. We think of that day as the unofficial start of summer, probably because it is a time for us to have barbecues in our back yards as we gather with family and friends.

Nevertheless, a fellow colleague once remarked to me that he cringes every time someone uses the word, "Happy" in reference

to Memorial Day. So, for example, people like to say, "Happy Memorial Day." Check Google Images, and the graphics will reveal how common that phrase is.

But is it correct to say "Happy Memorial Day" when this holiday was first observed on May 30, 1868, to honor the soldiers who died in the American Civil War? Is it correct to say "Happy Memorial Day" as we remember the men and women of our armed forces, some of whom are our loved ones, who died in the wars our

nation has fought? Is it correct to say "Happy Memorial Day" as people visit cemeteries and memorials and services are held to mourn those who died in the line of duty? Is it correct to say "Happy Memorial Day" when flags and flowers are placed on the graves of those who died in the US military? Is it correct to say "Happy Memorial Day" when American flags are flown at half-staff during the morning of that day, and the Taps are played at commemoration ceremonies? Is "Happy" the correct term to use?

As I thought about this day, our Church

commemorates Memorial Day on the Sunday before, however, many churches choose not to because it is not a holy day on the Church's calendar, and they strictly adhere to keeping the separation between Church and State. And on reflection, I wondered that even though Memorial Day originated to remember our military men and women who died while making the ultimate sacrifice for the freedoms we enjoy, what about the men and women who have suffered and are still suffering as they defend the faith? What about people who gave their lives defending



the faith and those who are still sacrificing their lives today?

The Church does not have a day designated specifically for those who died defending the faith. There are All Saints' and All Souls' Days, but these days are observed for the saints and faithful departed. However, since Memorial Day, by virtue of its name, calls us to memorialize our military personnel who gave their lives, why not also designate this day to commemorate the saints who sacrificed their lives for the faith?

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St. Paul reminds us in 2 Timothy 2:3, to "share in suffering like a good soldier of Christ Jesus." These men and women of faith who died were good soldiers of Christ. They did not retreat in the face of the enemy, defending their faith and declaring Jesus as their Lord and Savior. This is what the word "fight" means, "not letting up," "not



retreating." Hence the reason we have hymns like "Fight the good fight with all your might," which was the advice St. Paul's gave to his younger companion in 1 Timothy 6:12 - "Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the

eternal life, to which you were called..." and "Onward Christian soldiers, marching as to war." Why not remember the soldiers of the church who "... have fought the good fight, [they] have finished the race, [they] have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7), and have sacrificed their lives defending that faith?

As we celebrate Memorial Day this year, instead of wishing others a "Happy Memorial Day," why not say, "A blessed Memorial Day?"



In addition, as we remember the soldiers and service men and women in our armed forces who gave their lives for our country, why not also remember the soldiers of Christ who gave their lives for Christ, his Church, and the Christian faith?



Volunteers and clients at Helping People Succeed did an inventory. I have attempted to condense what follows it into a few categories.

Two strollers with car seat attachments, another car seat, and a rocking baby seat, 29 plush animal toys, 28 packs of baby wipes, 32 packages and 5 cases of disposable diapers, 7 diaper bags, 3 play mats, 3 quilts, 17 baby blankets, 48 bibs, and bags and bags of baby outfits.

All items were given a price value even the gently used clothing items and if my spread sheet is correct; the value of our donation of gifts equals \$4,651 and there was a monetary gift of \$100. Absolutely phenomenal!



We had several games that tested our "baby knowledge." Word scrambles: I knew a "ibb" was bib; and "prub" was burp, but a "rostlelr"? I forgot stroller had 2 "Ls"; it was so obvious - I just needed to spell it correctly.

Did you know a baby fox can

Well, there are some among us that are very well versed in animal baby identification! We moved on to Babies of the Bible – there we had two Biblical scholars. 
ward and for that we say, "You're welcome"!

#### PEERING INTO THE PAST

Early photographs show the steps that descend from the front door. The original church bell, hung above that original entry. One pull of the rope was all it took to ring the bell.



From the minutes of the Vestry records, we learn that a letter of appreciation was ordered sent to A. M. Anderson for his contribution in the installation of the church bell. Vestry members Houg, Whitman and Barnwell also participated in the installation.

The minutes of 1955 further express deep appreciation to Clarence Gilbert for his generous donation of 'the fine bell."

A later Senior Warden's opinion recorded that "this one [bell] was known as a "real clanker" by members of the congregation at the time.

Be that as it may, the bell was eventually replaced with an electronic bell system. The purchase of the "Arcadian" bell was authorized by the vestry in January 1971, and was expected to be installed within the next two months. Charles Shilling was the chairman of the committee soliciting donations from members of the parish. The photo shows where the bells

were hung.

Since the Centennial Celebration of "The Church on the Hill," additional enhancements were made to the Church including a new Shulmerich Carillon, which replaced a long silent outdated instrument. Once again, the sound of bells could be heard in the surrounding neighborhood.

Here we are in 2025, and again the bells have temporarily gone silent.

# Martin County Genealogy Society Presentation


Martin County celebrates its centennial in 2025, and in commemoration, Martin County Genealogy Society (MCGS) welcomes Joyce Fletcher-Menard to talk about some of the people she has gotten to know in her work at All Saints' Cemetery in Jensen Beach. One of the oldest cemeteries on the Treasure Coast, at 126 years, All Saints is the final resting place for many of the people who laid the foundation for Jensen Beach, Rio and Martin County.

Joyce has served as the historian and archivist for All Saints' Episcopal Church and All Saints' Cemetery. She has written one book on the church, and four on the people in the cemetery. Joyce was the 2022 Martin County Historic Preservationist of the year, and belongs to several lineage societies, including the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

Join us on **Friday**, **May 16th** at the John F. and Rita M. Armstrong Wing, Blake Library, 2351 SE Monterey Road, Stuart. The event starts at 1 p.m. and presentations begin at 2 p.m., or a little earlier.

# All Saints' Cemetery

While we may not wish to think of our church as having or being a business, it is indeed engaged in several business activities. The Cemetery is one such business.




All Saints' Cemetery (ASC) is part of an approximately \$6.4 billion industry which has approximately 5,900 businesses throughout the US and employs approximately 35,300 people. The average number of employees is 6 per business. The industry's Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) has been 3.7% over the past five years; in 2024, the industry grew approximately 0.3%.

In comparison to the averages in the industry, ASC has revenue of approximately 25% of the average and 30% of the average number of employees. Last year, our cost of labor increased by approximately 20% while revenues went up by approximately 4.25%. Fortunately, our other expenses rose more in line with our revenues at approximately 5% increase.

The following trends and insights are courtesy of ISISWorld (IBISWorld).

#### Trends and Insights

- Cremation is gaining in popularity over traditional burials. Cost-effective and increasingly popular cremation services force cemetery businesses to diversify their offerings to attract budget-conscious families and stay competitive.
- Tariffs on Chinese and Mexican imports may impact raw material costs. While cemetery services are heavily reliant on raw materials for urns and caskets, the majority of the industry's revenue will not be materially impacted by import tariffs. Additionally, the business is not impacted by export tariffs.



- Market size is projected to grow over the next five years.
- Shifts in the demographic landscape will foster consistent revenue enhancement in

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burial services. With the US population continuously aging, there is a projected rise in demand for both pre-need and immediate burial arrangements.

 The sale of graves, plots and mausoleum spaces forms the core of cemetery offerings.
 Funeral homes often facilitate these purchases, though individuals can handle transactions independently. Many cemeteries have columbarium walls for cremation niches.

These trends continue to point to the importance of our new columbarium and the need to continually spruce up the cemetery to make it attractive to casual visitors, families in need, and persons visiting the graves of loved ones. If you see something that could be improved, please let us know.

## **GARDEN HAPPENINGS!**

Welcome to the garden.

My name is Draco and I live here in this shade tree next to the little church on the hill. I love to flutter my wings in the breeze that comes up the hill from the Indian River Lagoon. I watch most of the happenings here on this campus because I have such a wonderful vantage point; this is what I was doing the other day – watching the people that come here to worship God.

It was early morning and someone I know fairly well had just lit a charcoal fire beneath my tree, but off to the side just a tad. The chemical smell from the lighter fluid bothered me, so I moved around to the other side of the tree. There I have a different view of the gardens, the parking lot, the sidewalk and the grassy area by the Conkling Cross. I listened as directions were given and people hurried off to do something. When the Rector began the worship service I wanted to absorb the words because on this morning their meaning would be so important to hear. It was just before dawn on Easter morning and the discovery that Christ had risen from the stone tomb was about to be retold. Approximately 2,000 years ago this event took place in the Holy Land and now, still: it was going to be retold, again, and I was waiting.

I listened as words were murmured between the men around the fire. More chairs were set up for people that were just arriving. The ushers handed out bulletins, Ms. Joyce stood ready with the processional cross and Father Tony began the appointed announcement and prayers: Prayers to sanctify the new fire; prayers that the Light of Christ will enlighten and guide God's people. The procession began with Father Tony intoning: "The light of Christ." and I could hear two female voices over all the others that responded: "Thanks be to God." Moving through the gathered people Father Tony repeated: "The Light of Christ." Again, this

time more voices sang the response "Thanks be to God." But I was stunned; from the garden I thought I heard a new voice. As the daylight increased and dawn became imminent and the procession reached the outdoor altar at the base of the Conkling Cross, it was repeated a third time: "The Light of Christ."

This time when the voices all were lifted in the response "Thanks be to God" I was looking toward the garden home of my friends. But that very musical tenor voice was not coming from their spot. Then I trembled because I could see another critter sitting there looking right at my tree. I fluttered my wings. Then thought, well, maybe he was looking at the Indian River Lagoon, at Father Tony or watching and waiting for the sun to rise; I could not tell exactly. But this was not someone I knew. After looking a few more times, I guessed the new comer to be about 14" high, a bit wide, sort of white but defiantly had black lines—maybe clothing—on him; but those eyes—they were huge!



I turned my attention back toward the service, and was surprised to realize I almost. missed the scripture reading about Moses, the **Israelites** and God making safe passage for

them through the Red Sea. I also have to admit, my mind wandered a bit wondering if the visitor would stay for a while or move on before the day ended. Every so often I looked back at

the stranger, and then at the sunrise, it was cloudy, but the sun shone through the clouds in a unique way this Easter morning. The Altar Guild was scurrying around trying to get the communion items, the missile stand, the paschal candle, the procession cross, the altarlectern and pulpit paraments all inside for the next service. It was all I could do to not laugh at the commotion.

Ninety-something chairs from two different places had to be sorted placed on the rack and rolled first to Houg hall to be unloaded and then reloaded with the chairs that went to the garage. And then it was calm—the service had started inside, the people had left campus or gone inside Houg Hall. Then he spoke—the stranger spoke.

"Nice service, good message too – but what is all this rush for? I just do not understand people. My name is Kevin. I saw you looking at me, and then at the service... but you kept peeking at me as if you thought I would just go poof and disappear."

"Nice to meet you, Kevin; my name is Draco, and I apologize. I was thinking about Jesus having risen from His death, about the Angels rolling away the stone, and Jesus just standing in the garden.... and you appeared. It was the Garden Whisperer. She smiled and waved to Kevin and then she looked up in the tree at me and said "Hi Draco, Happy Easter." That was all she said, too! When I looked at Kevin again – it looked like he closed his eyes. Maybe he was just looking down, but I think he must be shy around people or he was taking a nap. We all do that!

Later in the afternoon, I introduced Kevin to Greta, Groggy, Jackson, the parrot and Little One. We had a good conversation about Easter morning. Greta Liked the music at the 10:00 a.m. service, Little One liked the Easter Egg Hunt. Kevin and I found the dawn service very inspiring. The parrot – he liked the new mulch! Groggy was dozing... again. We still hope to see Bea the big red bee soon, but for now all is well at the Little Church on the Hill with a Big Heart.

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
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
