DAUGHTERS OF THE KING

The Season of Lent invites Christians into forty days of prayer, repentance, and renewed devotion as we journey toward Easter. It is a time to “return to the Lord with all your heart” (Joel 2:12), setting aside distractions so we may listen more closely to God. Through fasting, prayer, and acts of mercy, Lent shapes hearts to reflect Christ’s humility and sacrifice.

For the Daughters of the King, Lent deeply echoes our vows of prayer, service, and evangelism. As women called to live under the Cross, we are reminded that true discipleship begins within.

“When you pray...when you fast...when you give” (Matthew 6:1-18), inviting a faithful life rooted not in display but in devotion. “Christening portrait, Winter 1941. Part 2

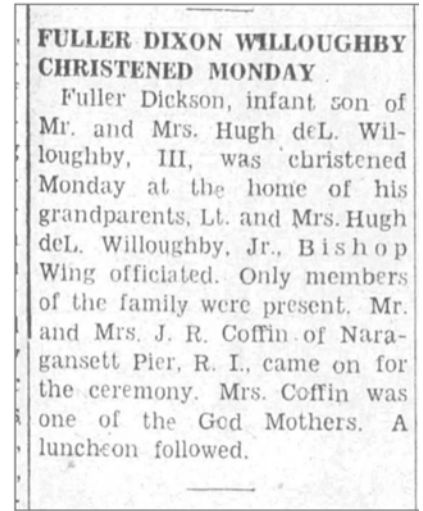
The picture of “a priest, the two children, and a baby” found on the Martin County Digital Library’s web page with the following caption.



“Hugh Willoughby IV stands on the Marvista lawn with his sister, Wayne Wilson Willoughby and a priest. The priest holds a baby, possibly dressed in a christening gown. The infant may be the third child of Marjorie and Hugh Willoughby III, Fuller Dickson Willoughby, and the photo may have been taken on the day of Fuller’s christening.”

When last month’s *Trumpet newsletter* was proofed by Fr. Tony, he astutely recognized that the person that was thought to be a priest was in fact a bishop because of his vestments. It is the Right Reverend John Durham Wing, who

was the Second Bishop of the Diocese of South Florida from 1932-1951.



Fuller Dixon Willoughby Christened Monday, STUART NEWS, 2-27-1841 p3 Bishop Wing officiated

Stuart News announcement of the Baptism of Fuller Dickson Willoughby with Bishop Wing as the officiant.

The baptism of this child warranted press coverage. Here is what our records look like. On the left is the date and location of the baptism; in the center is the child’s first, middle and last names, and on the right is the child’s date of birth. So now we have the specific date of the baptism.

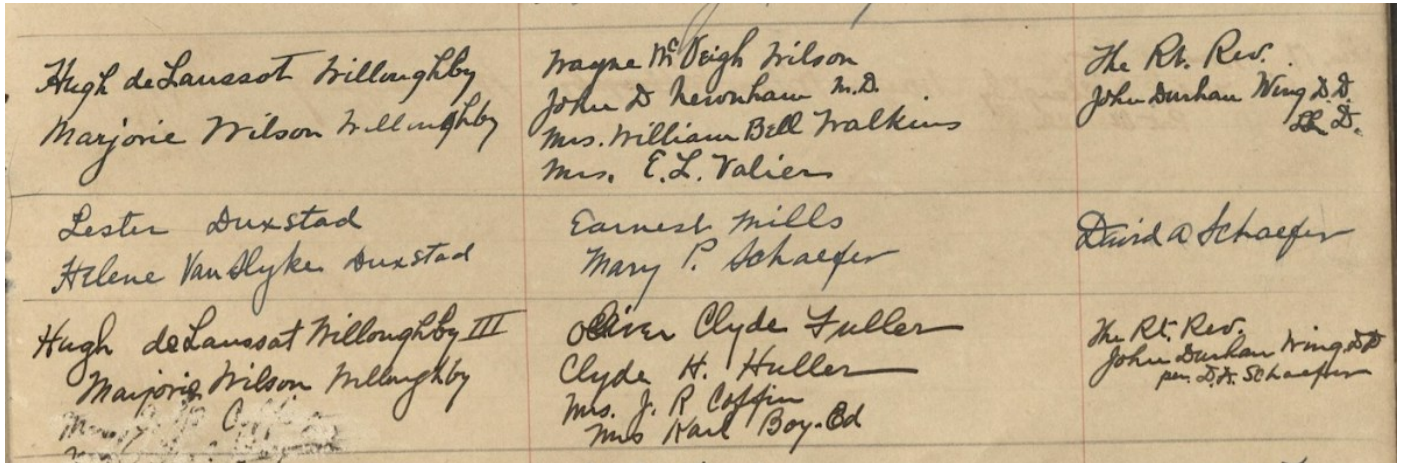

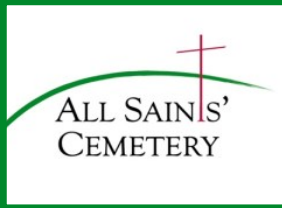

ALL SAINTS' CEMETERY

“Remember you are dust and unto dust you shall return,” Father Tony and hundreds of thousands of other priests intone on Ash Wednesday. “Ashes to ashes, dust to dust” is another saying referencing dust; it is often used during interments.



While the most commonly noted antecedent of these statements is from Genesis 3:19, there are at least six (6) references that are pertinent.

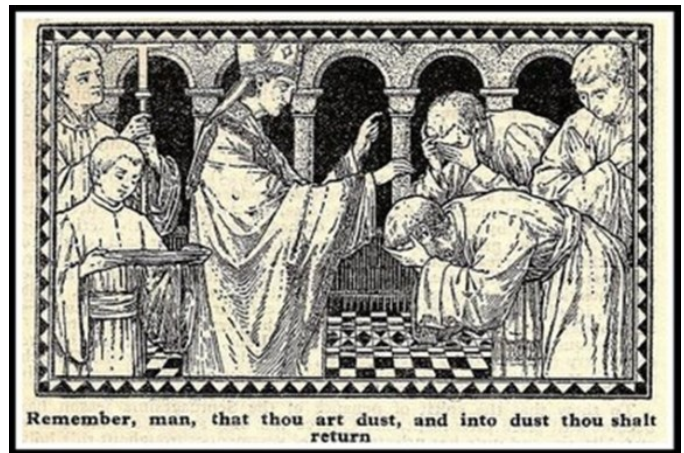
- Genesis 2:7 teaches that God created Adam from the dust of the earth: “The Lord God formed a man from the dust of the earth and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being.”
- Genesis 3:19 records God speaking to Adam, “By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return.”
- Genesis 18:27 records this statement from Abraham: “Now that I have been so bold as to speak to the Lord, though I am nothing but dust and ashes.”
- Job 30:19 records Job lamenting, “He throws me into the mud, and I am reduced to dust and ashes.”
- In Ecclesiastes 3:20, Solomon declared, “All go to the same place; all come from dust, and to dust all return.”
- Psalm 103:14, the psalmist declared, “For he himself knows whereof we are made; he remembers that we are but dust.”

Before Ash Wednesday, we collect palms from

previous Palm Sundays. These palms are burned and mixed with holy oil to create the slurry used on our foreheads. As the palms are burned, the carbon remains, which is black.

During cremation, the temperatures are so high that all of the carbon is vaporized. Cremains are returned to families as a light gray dust-like material which is primarily inorganic. All cremains are run through a machine to crush any remaining bone fragments.

It is common for families to request the Cemetery Staff to transfer the cremains to the final interment urn or to remove a small portion to share with other family members or to inter in another location.
