A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

Caribbean Sunday at St. David's-in-the-Pines, Wellington

Unable to accept an invitation to celebrate and preach at St. David's-in-the-Pines Episcopal Church, Wellington, Florida, last October, I was finally able to do so this year on October 26, at their Caribbean Sunday

celebrations. This was the first time I worshiped at St. David's and visited the beautiful city of Wellington.

Every October, St.
David's-in-the-Pines
celebrates this
signature event,
considering the
diversity of the
congregation which
comprises members
of at least twenty-four
Caribbean islands and
three African nations.
It is an observance of
the many cultures

and ethnicities that make up the congregation at St. David's.

Sunday morning services began at 8 and 10 a.m. like All Saints'. The Right Reverend Todd McGregor, former Bishop of Madagascar and currently their Clergy-in-Residence, was the Celebrant and Preacher at All Saints'.

At 8 a.m., a small number of people attended the service. However, at 10 a.m., one hundred and eighty members and guests attended the Caribbean-styled service which featured steel pan music, West Indian folk hymns and songs, and traditional negro spirituals. The Eucharist was fully sung with the usual service music as

well as the Psalm, and a "Caribbean Lord's Prayer." Large flags depicting the countries hung along the walls of the interior of the Church building, while smaller flags lined the main aisle, adding lots of color to the

ambience of the worship space.

One of the highlights of the occasion for me was the reunion with one of my former seminarians, the Reverend Edward Mark, whom I had not seen in twenty-five years. Brother Edward, as he was called at the time, was a theological student and ordinand assigned to my parish of St. Cyprian's Anglican Church, Barbados, in 2000. I was his rector and mentor for his final year before he returned to the Diocese of the Windward Islands. It was a blessing to celebrate the Eucharist with him and to share conversation. He is currently the Priest-in-Charge of St. David and St. Paul's Anglican Churches in

Grenada.

Following the service was a reception with cuisine from the islands and African nations – just what the doctor ordered. The


parish hall was decorated with paraphernalia depicting the many cultures and ethnicities, and there was the aroma of Caribbean cooking. Director of Camp DeWolfe in the Diocese of Long Island. It was a beautiful, spirit-filled day of prayer and worship, fellowship and food, as I met new people and delighted to see "old" friends. My thanks to the Senior Warden, Vestry, Bishop Todd, and the congregation of St. David's-in-the-Pines, Wellington, for such an incredible day.





Bob Crowder.

"Former longtime Martin County Sheriff Robert Crowder died Oct. 23 at his home in Georgia, the Sheriff's Office announced. Crowder was first appointed sheriff in 1972 and served until 1973. Crowder, a Republican, in November 1992 was elected Martin County sheriff over Democrat James Bud Slay Jr.

... He retired in 2013. ... Sheriff Crowder passed away peacefully with his wife, Debbie, by his side, in his hometown of Lookout Mountain, Georgia," the Sheriff's Office stated on social media.[2] Sheriff Crowder was a worshipping member of All Saints' for a number of years. His campaign crew in the 1992 campaign came, in part, from members of this congregation. Now you know what the Sheriff had to do with All Saints'.

As the evening cooled down a bit and the mosquitos began to buzz around, Flora flew around the outside of the church building a few times and then glided down through the cemetery to the Indian River.

There she looked at the construction, the big machinery and all the power boats and sail boats on the hard. She then flew back up the hill and followed the road for a tour of Rio, stopping every now and again to look around in wonder. On her return to the garden next to the little church on the hill, Flora settled down to tell Greta and her other garden friends about her adventure.

"Maybe God will punish them; or even send a storm that takes the building down." When Little One looked up, he realized everyone was staring at him with a 'frown face.' "What? He blurted.

That's what I think God should do!"

Groggy cleared his throat and added a loud rib-bit! Then he gently asked Little One: "Do you think God would be happy destroying buildings that people just put up? And remember what a mess this area is if we have a powerful storm. A really bad hurricane could destroy our garden home too." "Well, I heard God destroyed the Tower of Babel.

God did that because the people wanted to be like Him like God and to decide how things were going to happen in their life. The idea was that the tower could help them get to Heaven."

After a minute of silence, Little One continued. "Oh ah, I guess God will not take that building down just because I want it down. But I can always pray for that to happen."

"I guess you could, Father Tony says: "prayer is what helps us continue hoping that all will be make right in the world, and it is our job to always pray." (*) But is that really what you want to pray for?"

After a bit of reflection time Flora asked: "Are we done with talking about that building?" Because I want to tell you what I saw when I followed the road to R10."

Her friends all looked puzzled... but finally Draco started to chuckle. "You mean Rio, the

village around the bend on Dixie Highway. You are actually correct when you call it R10, that is how that area got its name; from the roadway # 10. But these days the people around here call it Rio. What did you see in Rio, Flora?"

"Big orange orbs, several funny looking statues of the same person dressed in black with a funny hat and perched on a broom. Some of the orange balls had faces – weird ones with pointed eyes."

Again, Draco chuckled. "Halloween decorations! That is what you were seeing in Rio. Some people carve faces in the pumpkins making them jack-o-lanterns and some folks set them out with other fall items. It is a custom all over the country!

I just think decorating with fall items seems a bit out of place here in Florida." "Oh, I want to see a pumpkin!" Groggy and Greta said at the same time. Greta continued: "Maybe the Garden Whisperer with bring us a pumpkin! If it is orange, it will match my dress.
But Draco, what is Halloween?" Halloween is a newer term for All Hallows Eve. It is night before the day designated as the day to



celebrate and honor the saints. Pope Gregory III, back in the 8th century designated November 1st as the day to celebrate and honor

the saints who have died. Halloween is now celebrated on All Hallows Eve by many.

The practice of going to friends' homes and saying 'Trick or Treat' stems from and even older custom of the poor people knocking on doors asking for folks to share some of their recently harvested food.

"I did not know any of that!" Greta said. "I'm glad people shared their food with others." Flora began to beat her wings in excitement. "I heard someone talking about a Harvest Festival here at All Saints' Church. "That must be a celebration of sharing food too.

"Oh yes, it is and it is so fun to see how they do it here. We all like to sneak into the church and look at how they decorate with food. Cans and boxes, fruits and vegetables – sometimes bread and grains – they ask everyone in the congregation to bring food items.

They spend hours setting it up, then on Sunday they pray over it and bless all of it. After that the children and a few adults pack it up and take it all to the food bank to share.

Harvest Festival is usually the Sunday right before Thanksgiving." "Oh, I will make sure I fly into church and view it all. Make sure you remind me when it will be decorated!" Flora commented to her friends.

Kevin added:" The date – the Sunday before Thanksgiving; is November 23rd. That means November 22rd is when everyone should bring their food items to church! "Thanks Kevin!


