"What time is it?" was a question asked long before Time Zones or Daylight Savings. Since Creation, God's people have been challenged to worship, remember, and pass on to succeeding generation, the knowledge of their God, who operates outside of time.

In the Old Testament, God was very prescriptive—defining times, seasons and worship for believers. After the crucifixion, resurrection and ascension of Christ, Christ's Church continued to equip believers to "Glorify God and enjoy Him forever," and to develop liturgy to make the life of Christ more real and contemporary to believers. So for centuries, the Christian Church has created a memorable reply to the question, "What time is it?"

On page 5 is a much-simplified calendar or annual framework that has developed to guide the "life of the Church." There may be different facets of life emphasized by churches around the world. But I always learn something from the overall layout. Find out the "current time" by referring to page 5.

EASTER: RESURRECTION OPTIONAL?



A recent survey in the UK found that 25% of self-identifying Christians do not believe in the literal Resurrection of Christ.¹ Yet, the Apostle Paul lists the Resurrection among the things of "first importance"—Christ's death for our sins, burial, Resurrection, and bodily appearance to many. This is the gospel in a nutshell.

Lest we think, as some do, that the Resurrection really is optional, Paul makes it crystal clear: "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins." ²Everything that we believe and hope for rests on the fact of Christ's Death and Resurrection!

C. S. Lewis, in his book <u>Miracles</u>, tells us that for the fledgling church "to preach Christianity meant primarily to preach the Resurrection." Being an eyewitness to the Resurrection was a requirement for the first apostles.

In the Fall of 2023, the CHPC Global Outreach Team shared a Vision for two trips to Kenya to serve others: MAY 18-31, 2024. Both build upon relationships developed over many years. As people prayed, the "vision" grew into a special "dream" for eight people: Dave and Maggie Smith, Barbara McMullen, Kelley Foresman, Rev. Erwin Goedicke, Jill and Michael Gaines and Catherine Sanders. Here's how Jesus is working in the lives of Dave & Maggie Smith and how we can support them in prayer.

Dave and I have been planning to celebrate our 45thAnniversary in a memorable and meaningful way. This past October, our church (College Hill Presbyterian in Cincinnati OH) had a zoom-call with one of our global workers in Kenya. Shortly after that another global worker visited our church to talk about her work in her home country of Kenya. As we listened, we felt the Lord nudging us to go to Kenya with a team —to learn and help.

Our assignment will be to visit the Children's Hope Center located

north of the capital city of Niarobi—a home for the many children adopted by Mama Lucy Gachero. For 25 years, she has adopted and raised hundreds of street children, giving them the good news of Jesus Christ, the love of a family, a good education and the opportunity to make a difference in the world.

We are learning about ways we can help when we go. We are to prepare to lead devotions at meal times and help Mama Lucy in any ways Lucy desires. Maggie may get to know and work with students who are learning to be

tailors. Dave may get to know and work with young people who want to learn to play golf (seriously).

Maggie sees herself growing in spontaneity as she will go with the flow and not always know what to expect or what she may be asked to do. We both want to be prepared to share our faith clearly and personally with individuals and with the larger groups we may be asked to address. We are learning some of the cultural practices so we can communicate well and respectfully. There is much to do and learn before we go, and we trust that God will help us each step of the way.

We will be developing a list of prayer points that you can use. It would mean a lot if you would be willing to take a particular day to cover us in prayer. EASTER: RESURRECTION OPTIONAL?

Later, Jesus appeared to more than five hundred people between his Resurrection and Ascension, so there were many people who could lend their witness to the gospel that the apostles preached.

But our personal spiritual destination is not the only implication of the Resurrection. Stan Mast, in an insightful commentary, says, "Easter is more than a single death and resurrection that gets us to heaven. It is the great new thing that inaugurates a new heaven and a new earth in which righteousness will dwell." In other words, Easter, which celebrates the Death and Resurrection of Christ, is the beginning of a new phase of God's work in the world, one in which all the wrongs in the world will be made right.

Isaiah 65:17-25 is a beautiful passage that describes the satisfaction, joy, and wonder we will experience in the resurrected creation. [SEE THE NEXT COLUMN.] When this world looms dark and futile, we can think about what is promised to us in the future: new heaven, new earth, no memory of pain and hardship, rejoicing in God and he rejoicing in us, no distress, no weeping, no death or loss, enjoyable and fruitful labor, nature in perfect harmony – the very picture of delight.

We have our part to play in this inbetween time as we partner with God to work toward this just, righteous, and beautiful world. "What God did once and for all in raising Jesus from the dead has immense future results, but those future results are developing now." ⁴ There is still grief, frustration, and discouragement at times because God has not yet brought the results of his work fully into view. But we can be certain that God will finish this work because Christ's Resurrection certainly happened!

ISAIAH (65:17-25)

Is. 65:17 "See, I will create new heavens and a new earth. The former things will not be remembered, nor will they come to mind.

18 But be glad and rejoice forever in what I will create, for I will create Jerusalem to be a delight and its people a joy.

19 I will rejoice over Jerusalem and take delight in my people; the sound of weeping and of crying will be heard in it no more.

20 "Never again will there be in it an infant who lives but a few days, or an old man who does not live out his years; the one who dies at a hundred will be thought a mere child; the one who fails to reach a hundred will be considered accursed.

21 They will build houses and dwell in them; they will plant vineyards and eat their fruit.

22 No longer will they build houses and others live in them, or plant and others eat. For as the days of a tree, so will be the days of my people; my chosen ones will long enjoy the work of their hands.

23 They will not labor in vain, nor will they bear children doomed to misfortune; for they will be a people blessed by the LORD, they and their descendants with them.

24 Before they call I will answer; while they are still speaking I will hear.

25 The wolf and the lamb will feed together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox, and dust will be the serpent's food. They will neither harm nor destroy on all my holy mountain," says the LORD.

IT'S ABOUT TIME

The Church's "calendar" is unique. You'll notice that the center is an X with a P super-imposed, a Chi Rho. This symbol for Jesus Christ used by the early Church was adopted by Roman Emperor Constantine after a miraculous intervention by "the One God," Jesus. It's central placement declares that all time revolves around Him.

Many of the other words may be familiar. **ADVENT** (color purple) - preparation for the birth and 2nd coming of Christ.

CHRISTMASTIDE (color white)the 12 Days of Christmas - reflections on the incarnation of the Son of God. The coming of the Magi, the revelation of Christ to the non-Jewish world.

ORDINARY TIME (color green)the first season when the church focuses on the earthly life and ministry of Christ - His water baptism, and declaration of the Holy Trinity "this is my Beloved Son."

LENT (color purple) - the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday (not including Sundays and non-fasting days) for preparing new converts and personal reflection and change. During Holy Week, the church journeys with Jesus through the final moments of his life, his death on the cross, and his resurrection of from the grave.

EASTER (color white)- we participate in the glory of God's victory over sin and death as we "hasten to see the stone rolled back, and even the angels perhaps, and Jesus himself." Christ is risen —and we are raised with him with him into the newness of eternal life.

EASTERTIDE (color white) is a period of fifty days, between Easter and



the promise to send the Holy Spirit to his Church. From Easter to his ascension, Christ spent forty days with his disciples, teaching about the Kingdom of God. Christ's Ascension is about the enthronement of Christ, his coronation as King of kings, and Lord of lords. Before ascending. he tells his disciples to wait for the promise of the Father, the Holy Spirit, whom he will send. Ten days after the Ascension, the promise was given, poured out on all flesh, fulfilling the prophecy of Joel 2, during the Jewish feast called Pentecost. Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost.

ORDINARY TIME (color green)The season between Pentecost and
Advent emphasizes result of Jesus
passing on to His mission to His
earthly body, the Church—now alive
and embodied by God's Spirit.

NOW WHEN SOMEONE ASKS YOU, "WHAT TIME IS IT?" you will be able to check your watch, your phone and read the liturgical calendar—the way the Church tells time. With the advent of Jesus, all time is centered on him: (A.D. is Latin for "in the year of our Lord"). The liturgical calendar is also a way the Church sanctifies time with Christ-centered worship, and the raising up new generations of believers.

From Biblical texts of King David to oratory, poetry and rap, we celebrate the broad and sweeping story of the Black experience set to extraordinary music and the brilliant musicianship of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. It will be a concert of eloquence and joy!"





PREACHING AFTER EASTER

The essence of testimony is to inform others of the ability and power of God to deliver on His promises, in order to encourage those already trusting in Him, and those who express confidence in the counsel of His Word. Our testimony encourages others.

It's March Madness time. The NCAA

basketball tournaments have started, and coaches all over the country inspire, encourage, and challenge their teams to play with excellence and energy. When the games are close near the end, coaches call a timeout to give the team some crucial closing instructions so that the team will play well all the

way to the end.

In John 13-18, Jesus pauses to give some final instructions to "the Team" on his journey to the cross and the empty tomb. Traditionally, these selections have been called *Jesus' Farewell Discourse* and his *High Priestly Prayer*. but we will call them *Jesus' Living Will and*

Testament. It's not his Last Will because Jesus is STILL ALIVE! In these passages, Jesus shares with his disciples then now the crucial life messages as a Jesus follower.

Each Sunday, we will explore his living words for all who join him on this lifelong journey with God. Jesus does not hold back. He challenges, comforts, explains, and instructs us with an explicit declaration of the core necessities of living life with God in the power of Jesus' resurrection.

Here are Jesus' Living Words:

John 13 — Love;

John 14— Believe;

John 15— Abide;

John 14 & 15— Holy Spirit;

John 15— Persecution;


John 16— Joy;

John 17A— One; John 17B— World.

It's the time of year when the CHPC Congregational Nominating Committee, CNC, solicits names of potential officers – elders, deacons, a trustee administrator, and members of the CNC for 2025. God uses this process to help the Church and those nominated to "learn to discern God's will for their lives."

THE CNC DEPENDS ON THE STAFF AND THE CONGREGATION FIRST TO PRAY AND THEN TO CONSIDER WHOM THEY KNOW WHO MIGHT BE EMERGING AS AN OFFICER.

The process has been designed to actively listen to God. People who are recommended do not know who has suggested them. [You may even propose yourself.] CNC members then call each person to say: "Your name has come to my committee. Would you be willing to pray with me about what God may be doing in

your life and what He might be leading you to do?"

If the answer is "Yes," that begins a longer conversation between the CNC contact, the person suggested, and the Holy Spirit —that helps all to learn to grow in discerning God's leading. The process is a wonderful example of "Christ's Body-

building"— a way to discover our spiritual gifts and stirring each other up to use them within and beyond the Church.

In September, the CNC will announce a slate of officers to be elected at the October Congregational meeting. But the greater value of the service of Congregational Nominating Committee is to help all of us to grow as "God's talent scouts" for the Church, and to grow in our own personal ability to discern God's loving voice calling to us.
