DELIVERING GOD'S LOVE KENYA-STYLE

For I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope—Jeremiah 29:11.

Scriptures like this were vital to CHPC's 7-person team's decision to go to Kenya, May 16-26. Less than a week before the group was to depart, the Hope Children's Center

was closed to outsiders due to an illness affecting the children. Few people like surprises, but, after a time of intense prayer, the whole team decided to go to Nairobi and be servers and learners as God led. The July Bell Tower News will have reflections from the whole team.

Pictured is one of the opportunities that developed. Four of the team drove with "King David" into the bush for a delivery to a rural Maasai village. Historically, this male-dominated tribal group were fearsome warriors, and seminomadic herders of sheep, goats, and cattle. More recently, the Kenyan government has provided schools, but girls, in particular, have real challenges once they reach puberty.

Add-A-Room and Delivering Dignity are two ministries helping to give girls a future and a hope. They express Christ's love in very practical ways. Add-A-Room seeks to provide safety for young, vulnerable girls forced to leave their family's oneroom houses and to sleep outside when they reach adolescence. Add-A-Room encourages mothers

to attach a room for girls to live in. Then, the ministry provides girls a foam mattress to sleep on, a solarpowered light to study by, and a "Delivering Dignity Kit" for their monthly feminine care needs. The result is girls are more physically protected (fewer teenage pregnancies and early marriages). Plus, more girls finish school and choose a life of dignity and purpose.



Ann Rainey followed Jesus, into heaven on August 2, 2023. She had a profound, lasting impact on SonLight Power. Her husband and founder of SonLight Power, Allen Rainey, reflects on why the mission was made possible through her. "Ann was the driving force in the beginning of SonLight Power. Without Ann —her inspiration, support, grace, faith through financial sacrifice there would be no solar mission. No development of my skill and talent in solar. No SonLight Power. Her strength of character, Holy Spirit-inspired vision, support, and faithful sacrifice were key ingredients in the success of SonLight Power from the beginning. I and countless others impacted by this mission since then are so grateful."

THE 12-PACK THAT CHANGED EVERYTHING

The full story starts at a campground in Mounds State Park, Brookville, IN. Ann and I ended up in the campsite next to a guy with a 12-pack of Budweiser and a loudmouth. We loved the outdoors. But this experience, along with similar unfortunate camping experiences, inspired both of us to consider purchasing land so that we could enjoy a quiet, comfortable place to camp in early

spring of 1995.

By early summer we had purchased 50 acres outside Brookville that we affectionately called Camp Amakanata, named after my grandfather's fish hatchery in rural Georgia, renowned for its ability to grow trout. Ann liked Amakanata as much as I did. Throughout the summer weekends, we were busy clearing the land, exploring, and camping. Ann was there many weekends but also spent time with family.

It didn't take long to realize how important electricity would be to make the camp viable. I considered bringing grid power to the camp at first, but when learning how much it would cost, I started exploring other options. They say necessity is the mother of invention. That was the case when I started my journey with solar power in 1995. Back then, solar power wasn't nearly as mainstream as it is today. Especially in rural Indiana.

Ann waited patiently that winter as I poured into solar power trade magazines, books, and installation manuals. When I was ready, we invested \$1,200 to install two panels, a charge controller, inverter, and battery. Those components would power a well pump and a few lights for camp buildings yet to be.

That marked the beginning of many improvements, experiments – learning and mastering solar power by trial and error. And the beginning of a story much bigger that only God could write. Fortunately, Ann perceived what I almost overlooked.

PERSISTENCE

Skip ahead almost five years – I'm entering my fifth semester at Regent University (Virginia Beach, Virginia) pursuing a degree in Practical Theology with what turned out to be a concentration in missions. It was during that stretch that Ann shared her belief that solar power was going to be part of my long-term mission. At first, I didn't pay attention to the seed being planted. I was distracted by the crush of study. But eventually it worked its way into our prayer life and we were both asking for wisdom and guidance to see what that would be like.

Over time, I envisioned doing solar work in some form as a missions pastor. Ann didn't think that was the answer, but she really didn't know how things would work out. We stayed persistent in prayer. The Bible verse that comes to mind for that season is Luke 11:8 "... and yet because of his persistence..." We were persistent and eventually we found ourselves moving back to Cincinnati for family reasons the last semester.

That's when Wayne Darbonne, then the missions pastor at our church, College Hill Presbyterian Church (CHPC), organized a missions conference. At the conference. Dr. Jeff Heck was doing a breakout session for medical mission teams serving in the Central American country of Honduras. I went and listened to what Jeff had to say. Afterward I asked him, "Is there any need that you have in Honduras for solar power?" And Jeff looked at me and said excitedly, which is out of character for him, "You know solar power!? You need to come with me to Honduras!" And so we did. That was the beginning of our solar-powered ministry—SonLight Power.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE....

James Paudel and his family immigrated to the United States from Nepal in 2012, and moved to Cincinnati in 2016. He says he is grateful to live in the U.S. because of the freedoms and opportunities that are available to him. His commitment to Christ is making a huge difference in his life.

He is a 10th grade student from Finneytown High School who Cindy Carlson and others drive to attend CHPC youth group each week. He has participated in the annual youth mission trips for two years. He appreciates his neighbors and friends, including his wrestling and football coaches and teachers at Finneytown High School who have supported and encourage him.

For the past two summers, James (navy shirt) has taught with the

Swim Ministry. Last July, he qualified for a special "pre-Life Guarding" class, designed to give experienced staff a taste of what they would need to do to qualify to take the American Red Cross Life Guarding classes. Three of the class, including James, are now certified Life Guards. James

was offered a job at the Powell Crosley YMCA—but there was a hitch. To be employed, James had to prove that his immigration papers were in order. His permanent resident visa or "green card" needed to be renewed.

Around the first of the year, James' mother was involved in an accident that totaled the family auto and put her on disability. Others helped the family in many ways, but James' Green Card expiration was overlooked. This was serious. People began praying diligently for a way forward.

Sure enough, God had already provided the team with the skills needed to apply for the visa renewal. Rick Kennedy (a former CHPC member) is James' "mentor." Jaylen Williams, a friend and neighbor had told James about the City Gospel Mis-

sions' Mentor program. It took a year of waiting and praying, but James was matched with Rick Kennedy, a retired spokesperson for General Electric. James said having Rick as his mentor is a great help to him. "It's cool to have a mentor. We do things together. Rick is a friend. We can talk about life, and Rick shares wisdom with me."

Rick, along with the Poudel's family friend Cin-

dy Carlson, were able to navigate the U. S. government's website to successfully apply to renew James' green card. Three heads were definitely better than one!

Relationships and partnerships like the City Gospel Mission's men-

toring program, youth groups, sport coaches, teachers, friends, neighbors, even an "adopted grandmother" have all vital to James and his family. It does take a village of believers pooling their gifts, praying, and acting together to reveal God's love and provision in obvious ways. Phil 1:5-6 says, "I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.




PSALM 139:14 PROCLAIMS THAT WE ARE "FEARFULLY AND WONDERFULLY MADE."

It is so amazing to see how she has made it regardless of the struggles she had as a young child when she was taken from her parents.
