DELIVERING GOD'S LOVE KENYA-STYLE

The CHPC 2024 Outreach Trip to Kenya, East Africa provided seven church members some amazing opportunities to learn from and serve others. The "Nairobi Three" — Catherine Sanders, Michael and Jill Gaines—shared life and ministry with CHPC Global Worker Gabe Howard and his family. Gabe teaches English to refugees in Nairobi, the capital city. The "Flex Four"—Kelley Foresman, Barb McMullen, Dave and Maggie Smith—had diverse experiences with other Kenyan ministry partners, mostly outside the city. The two groups shared two apartments near each other and the Howards. All received first-day cultural orientation and last-day debriefing with Gabe.

Monday through Thursday, the Nairobi Three assisted in classes at Iftiin English School and prayed as they walked through the community. They visited students in their homes and a mosque. In the evenings, they received further training from Gabe Howard.

The Flex Four spent Monday with Nimo Kimani in Maasailand at a remote rural school distributing free "Delivering Dignity Kits" (washable feminine care products). The team supported Nimo as she shared about using and caring for the kits and how they helped the school girls stay in school. Later, the four joined in Maasai-style worship and shared God's Word at Pastor Moses' Zion Baptist Church.

On Tuesday the Four joined sports evangelist Phelix Ochieng and school children in slum areas of Nairobi to share songs and wisdom from Scripture. They experienced first-hand how God can use sports like soccer to build relationships which open doors for Christian discipleship, and provide fun for kids who have few such opportunities.

Wednesday and Thursday, the Four traveled several hours to a remote Maasai area with "King David" Mulatya to see the "Add-a-Room" project supported by the CHPC's Endowment Fund. (This was the June Bell Tower News cover article.)

This project aims to protect adolescent girls who, by tradition, must sleep in the open outside the family home. There they are targets of molestation and rape. "King David" encourages mothers to "add a room" onto the family home. He also offers incentives— a free



mattress and a solarpowered light for protection, and to help girls to do school work after dark.

The Flex Four slept overnight in tents in the Maasai village and ate meals prepared onsite. They met with

elders, distributed Delivering Dignity Kits to girls and gifts to the families who had added a room. The team participated in the dedication service for the new rooms, and accompanied "King David" Mulatya as he visited a new *boma* (village enclosure) to select the next sites for mothers to add-a-room.

MEANWHILE THE NIAROBI THREE worked with Gabriel Howard at the Iftiin Education Centre. IftIIn is a Somali word for "light." Through teaching English the team was able to bring the light...to light the students' future and lives. Mike Gaines said, "If the door opened, we had to be ready to share our faith, and we did. Everything they do at the school is done through relationship. In our orientation, a wonderful Muslim man joined us and read from the Koran. Gabe read from the New Testament, making a wonderful backand-forth.

Respecting the culture is the first step in gaining trust. So, the three team members took an educational tour of a Nairobi mosque to learn more about the religion many of their students hold (PICTURED RIGHT).

Friday's schedule was free and gave time for packing and shopping. Then Saturday, all seven team members served with Phelix at a sports evangelism event by facilitating *Youth Alpha* small groups.

INSIGHTS FROM BOTH TEAMS

Dave Smith: "Our big God showed up incredibly. Our theme verse became: Proverbs 19.21 "Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the Lord's plans that prevail."

The prayers of the church were palpable as we encountered blessed interactions with King David, Nimo, Gabe and others on their team. I can see why many have placed great trust in them. We found their hearts true for the Lord and efforts persistent, wise, and strategic in their mission.

It's amazing that a congregation like ours is brought together with a small congregation of Kenyans so that God can achieve a huge impact for God's people and his glory."

Jill Gaines noted, "Each day we would pray as we walked around the school's neighborhood. We met people in their shops and some—even young ones—looked like they had given up on life. By contrast, the other English teachers and our students were so welcoming—sharing their life, their culture, their table for hours. To be hospitable is a very big part of the culture."

Barbara McMullen: "In Kenya, there is a level of respect between children and elders. The elders train up the children from a young age, as in Proverbs 3 and Deuteronomy. The principal took us to different classes. I was so impressed with how the children responded with

manners. They were very attentive and responsive to all the adults. They want to be educated. The principal said, 'The teachers come at 6am to pray together for the children. If they misbehave, we pray for wisdom and walk with the children.' These young missionaries are going into places that are not always safe, that have a lot of generational strongholds, so we have to cover them in prayer."

Kelley Foresman: "These [Kenyan workers] are giving their lives. They are tentmakers, but what they live for is to share their faith. Each one prayed before we started every day. we were so covered in prayer.... Nimo said, 'Just let the Spirit of the Lord lead you.' So Maggie spoke to the girls, and Barbara spoke, and I spoke. It was just amazing to see the Spirit of the Lord work. What

we shared somehow coordinated together!"

Catherine Sanders:

"The church was so welcoming. Young people are listening. There were so many young men and women there, as well as old, just praising the Lord. The singing was so amazing. It warmed my heart to be a part of it. Don't let age deter you!"



I was visiting a young woman last week who talked about her "coping mechanism being crack cocaine." She said it in such a matter-of-fact manner. It's been on my mind ever since. It seems so obvious that using crack is probably not a good idea, and yet what coping mechanism is healthy? Jesus went off by himself to pray and be with his father when he needed to cope. I've chosen to ask for help sometimes or turned to music or to journaling to sort out some mess in which I find myself. All too often I choose food or isolation or pity – not healthy choices for me. I wonder how we might become more aware of our coping choices and more courageous in what we choose.

Almighty God, sometimes our boat feels so small and the waters so big. I want to handle it myself – even make you proud of me. Yet, our Lord Jesus didn't handle it by himself. He turned to you for direction and comfort. He's probably the one who could have figured it out himself, and he didn't do it that way. Guide us, merciful Father, to cope the way Jesus did and come to you early and often. Meet us when we come and help us ask for comfort and then receive the comfort you provide. We need you so, Lord God. *In Jesus, Amen.*

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS DAY EXPERIENCE



We believe that the power of the cross has destroyed what divides us, and the power of the Spirit will strengthen us and demonstrate Jesus' powerful love, which binds us together. Even in an election season that has become so partisan and

divisive, Jesus unites us. What an exciting time to show the world how powerful God's love in Jesus is.

Take a moment now to reflect on your life. When were some difficult life situations —losing a job, failing a test, relationship explosions, illness, loss,or moral failure. How have you experienced God showing up for you? How did God take what was bad, broken, and fragmented and make it whole? God is not only making us a kaleidoscope; God is making you a kaleidoscope, too.

JUDGING RIGHTLY

In our summer Kaleidoscope series, we have encountered numerous reminders not to judge one another. (Rom. 14:10-13, Matt. 7:1-5, James 4:11,12, Rom. 2:1-3, and John 8:7. But, some of you may wonder, "Aren't

there times we do need to judge?".

As a member of the Evangelical Covenant Order of Presbyterians (ECO), we have a guide—Essential Tenets—a core understanding of what God teaches us in the Bible. CHPC's staff and ordained leaders must agree to follow these guidelines in all

of life and church leadership. These serve as a guideline for the pastors, elders, and deacons to judge rightly by what we agree are God's directions for us as a church. If you would like to read them, Google "ECO Constitution." You will find it an excellent aid for "judging rightly."
