JESUS UNIVERSITY: A DANCE OF LOVE

The Jesus University dancers led in worship during Christmastime. The group has grown in skills and numbers, and BTN asked Helen Brooks to share with readers about this exciting group and how to encourage and support it.

Jesus University is one of CHPC's Outreach Ministries that teaches ballet and poise with "an eternal difference." The group's first dance, organized by Helen and Joseph Brooks, was performed for CHPC's 2015 Christmas Eve Family Program.

In 2019, Jesus University merged with City Gospel Mission's Princesses

The program, with a mentoring approach and a focus on success for each girl, helps girls build character, self-esteem, discipline, and a love of dance.

CHPC is currently one of the largest sites. Prior to Covid-19 pandemic, Jesus University participated in a city-wide ballet recital. It featured 500 dancers under the direction of Gordon Haven (pictured), founder of Princesses Ballet.

Jesus University is currently one

of the few sites still conducting practices and Bible study while ensuring social distancing and other safety protocols are in place. The girls can be seen practicing around our church campus every Saturday and preparing for Sunday morning worship performances throughout the year. They are also required to participate in weekly Bible lessons and two community outreach events each year.

We believe in creating an environment where children can come and flourish in the Gospel and have fun doing so. It's like "a Sunday School with ballet slippers." Our mission is to develop, nurture, and build disciples for the Kingdom outside of the church walls. In fact, the ministry includes girls who attend CHPC and

others who live in surrounding communities.

The Jesus University participants also learn how to apply biblical principles in their lives daily and during worship performances. Recently, guest speakers have included Darryll Davis (Making Good Decisions); Drew Smith (Spiritual Gifts); Aliyah

Brandy and her husband (Marriage); Jennifer Cronk (Advent); and next month, Penny and Bart Sauer will be presenting on Being Good Stewards.

this winter, two members of the Jesus University team were baptized, and one member rededicated her life to Christ. We are looking forward to having more girls do so.

Two dynamic ballet instructors lead and teach Jesus University. Aliyah Brandy is our primary Instructor. She is classically trained through the



Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and was featured as Clara in the Cincinnati Ballet's *Nutcracker*. Nicole James instructs the older girls. She trained under Gordon Haven and City Gospel since she was eight years old. Favia Brooks Leary is the Asst. Director of Jesus University, and Joe Brooks secures the CHPC campus so the girls have a safe place to practice. Jesus University has flourished because of parent volunteers (Catherine Sanders & Kamico Adkins).

Jesus University has ministered and performed their dances throughout the community, including Twin Towers, Northminster Presbyterian Church, and the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. We have continued to minister during the pandemic and believe that children should have a space to continue to enjoy fellowship with others their age.

Jesus University offers an open ministry to children of all races and ethnicities, following the vision of the church to become a diverse community, and we seek prayer to help us grow in diversity in order to look more like Heaven.

TANDEM FOR LIFE

Having grown up attending CHPC, Molly and Luke had known of each other for many years. However, it wasn't until 2019 that they really came to know each other as peers, friends and more.

There they were at the College Hill 2019 Block Party in August volunteering to serve at the aptly named "Jesus Tent." While cleaning up from an evening of Jesus-centered conversations with visitors, they found themselves in a conversation of their own. 

Q: The CHPC Christmas decorations appear on the first Sunday of Advent and disappear by the Sunday after the 12th Day of Christmas. Where do they come from and to where do they return? Who does the "decking?" Here are the answers:

A: The Sanctuary Guild guided by Avril Warren and Sharlyn Stare, designs and maintains the decorations. Most are stored in the church's "undercroft"— the area under the Sanctuary. Ron Bredemeier employed his carpentry gifts to create a safe, dry location for many of the perishable materials.

Each year men and women from the church are recruited to unpack, carry, assemble, fluff and light the 9-foot to 12-foot trees, and hang the greenery high in the arches.

A LONG OBEDIENCE IN THE SAME DIRECTION


