### MEET THE JESUS UNIVERSITY INSTRUCTORS

**ALIYAH MOTLEY,**  
Advanced Ballet Instructor  
From a very young age, Aliyah was passionate about dance and attended the Cincinnati Ballet Academy, the Otto M. Buddig Academy, and UC's College Conservatory of Music Preparatory Program. As a child, she performed professionally for five years in the *Nutcracker*. Her

experiences as a young dancer helped her develop poise, discipline, and the ability to work with all kinds of people in a professional industry.

Although her background is in theater, Aliyah moved into teaching and found her perfect fit. Although she still performs at various community and church events (she attends Lifechangers Church in Fairfield), her passion is for teaching young people.

God's divine hand was clearly at work in bringing Aliyah to us. In 2018, she was interning at CHPC under Robyn Hubbuch (former Director of Youth and Family) when Helen Brooks asked her to help out with Jesus University. However, Aliyah was preparing to go to India on a mission trip the following year. She asked Helen for a donation, but she got something even better: a job. Helen hired her to choreograph and teach one dance for Jesus University. . . and she's been here ever since!

Aliyah says, "It is very clear the Lord was using the girls to minister to me and vice versa: the kids we work with are just very special." As her students face a whole host

of challenges—family situations, school, insecurity, finding their place in the world, developing faith—she realizes how similar they are to her. She can see herself in them and is reminded not to get lost in the dance, but to be a source of encouragement. Her goal is "to make sure that no matter how long a girl is in the program (one day or years), that girl will leave knowing who Jesus is by having experienced him through the loving instruction she got at dance class."

One of her most memorable times teaching at Jesus University involved the girls dancing to "The Blessing" music. During rehearsal, she and the girls explored the message of the song. She, herself, teared up,



thinking about the breaking of generational curses in her own life. She explained that the dance was more than just doing the motions; it was about choosing to take a different path in this moment, about living a life of abundance because they know to whom their lives belong. Afterwards, the girls danced it with a different sense of urgency. Aliyah explains, "When we're vulnerable about how much something means to us, it makes it most powerful."

If you're blessed enough to get to watch the Jesus University girls dance, Aliyah offers this insider tip: "Paying attention to even simple movements allows you to soak in the message. Focus on the emotions and the story that's being conveyed. Go beyond the

lyrics to the personal message that comes from the dancers. In liturgical dance, dancers are not playing a character. They are being totally open and unashamed before the Lord, more authentically themselves."

## ALLISON JACOBS, Beginners Ballet Instructor



Like Aliyah, Allison Jacobs, "the dancing librarian," found her way to CHPC in a way that was clearly orchestrated by God. She "just so happened" to be filling in at the College Hill branch of the public library, where she told customer advisor Evelyn Sussberry that she taught dance but because of the pandemic had not been working. Evelyn "just happened" to be

Jesus University director Helen Brooks' cousin and told Alli about an opportunity to teach liturgical and praise dance at CHPC. Having no experience in that kind of dance, though, Alli thought the gig was up, so to speak, but then it turned out that what Helen needed was a ballet instructor to teach technique to children. And so, Alli was ours!

As a highschooler at Cincinnati's School for Creative and Performing Arts, Alli majored in dance and costume design. Then she went on to Northern Kentucky University to pursue a degree in psychology with minors in dance and art history before earning her master's degree in library science at Kent State.

Her psychology training has been invaluable to her in her work as a teen librarian. She believes the library is "the last place in this country where people are just free to be: people of all backgrounds--citizens or not--can get a library card. It's a place where loitering is encouraged, so it's a safe haven for folks struggling with homelessness. It's a place that calls for compassion, empathy, and patience." In other words, it's a place aligned with Alli's spirit.

Alli's passion for dance and the wellbeing of the planet and all the creatures in it radiates from her. She has been a performer with the Contemporary Dance Theater and has taught there and at High Steppers in Mount Healthy. Recently, she performed at Global Water Dances 2021, a world-wide event promoting "awareness and a behavioral shift toward solutions for water preservation and conservation" ([globalwaterdances.org/](http://globalwaterdances.org/)). One of Alli's favorite and most

challenging performances was a modern dance piece about animal abuse. She had to learn to make animal-like movements inspired by wolves and their packs.

Alli finds her greatest joy in "working with children, seeing their faces light up when they try something new, so filled with light and happiness and joy." She finds watching how each and every body moves a little differently to be so "charming and adorable" that she carries the memories home with her. And so do Alli's students as they study under her and then join her in read-alouds of stories about all different kinds of people with dancing in their souls.

Although Alli has never done liturgical dance before, she finds that "honoring the individual, the space, and the people involved translates well to lots of faiths." Alli teaches the children that the space in which the dancers move is part of the art being created. She teaches them to honor and be thankful for others—their families who make sacrifices for them to pursue their interests, their leaders, their fellow dancers, their audience. She teaches them to be mindful about what they're doing and appreciative of all involved.

Alli's "insider tip" for audience members is to "be aware of all of the aspects involved in the performance—dancers, music, choreography, costumes, lighting design, etc., and to engage with the dancers, their stories, and expressions. Be open to the experience.

## HOW CAN ONE MEASURE THE IMPACT OF COLLEGE HILL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH?

Perhaps a good place to start would be to consider the role CHPC has played in the life of our family. Rudy and I (Laurie) were commissioned by CHPC in May 1986 as *Ministers of the Gospel* through Wycliffe Bible Translators. Our training took us away from Ohio and then from the US. But we were never beyond the touch of the Missions Committee and the many others among whom we had grown in Christ.

Many supported and partnered with us in prayer and financially. Fellow Youth and Summer Staffers, ministerial staff, and parents of Choir School's Tiny Tots numbered among these partners, along with members of the Inquirer's class, the Engaged Couples class, SMASH (Sunday Morning Adult Study Hour), the HELPER clinic, Bible studies and other classes in which we'd been active. Some of these partners had become active at CHPC after learning about it through our work, attending one of our Bible studies or attending the *Perspectives on the World Christian Movement* course

from the US Center for World Missions with us.

As you can see, Rudy and I do not look a day older than we did in 1988 when we arrived in the tiny village of Egbita, Zaire (now the Democratic Republic of Congo). We knew French, were learning Lingala (the regional language), and added Mangbetu (spoken by over 700,000 people in the middle of the Ituri Rain Forest) because making Scripture available in that language was our priority.

First, we needed to complete the alphabet and grammatical studies so that literacy efforts could be launched with books we created and teachers we trained. Rudy and I found greater meaning in Scripture and prayer as we learned, grew, and drew others into the task compelling us.

When war started in the Congo, local leaders told us it would be impossible to hide our complexions in the dark forest. They encouraged us to take our baby Annieo out of harm's way. We moved to Kenya and worked remotely on the literacy efforts. The plan was to return when the situation simmered down. It didn't.

For many years people from CHPC and beyond had been praying for not only for our ministry, but also for us to have children. Interestingly, our son Rudyo was born less than eighteen months after Annieo's birth.

Wycliff, after much prayer, asked our family of four to move to Senegal on the other side of the African continent. Rudy served as the Senegal's Literacy Coordinator and I organized pre-school activities for Annieo, Rudyo, and several other children. Once Annieo and Rudyo were in Dakar Academy, I assisted Senegal

language teams in planning language programs and creating audio Scripture materials. Due to our literacy activities in Senegal, Wycliffe language skills, and integrity in business and relationships, Rudy was invited to be a consultant to a variety of international partners: various Bible societies, UNICEF, USAID, the World Bank and International Rescue Committee in refugee camps in Darfur, South Sudan, Ghana, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and other countries.

CHPC's Endowment Fund helped finance several projects: Ndut Scripture recordings, transportation for literacy training among the Kwatay in the southwestern corner of the country, and reconstruction of the flood-damaged church of a small Kaasa congregation on the outskirts of Dakar.

In April 2020, Rudy and I left Senegal and returned to the USA via a COVID-19 evacuation flight. We have been working from the USA since; returning when necessary. I flew back to Senegal, thanks to CHPC's financial help. For eight weeks I encouraged and was encouraged by colleagues through group conferences and facilitating Scripture Engagement training events. I also helped inventory and pack up our center so it could be moved to a city near Senegal's capital, Dakar.

Meanwhile, Rudy was preparing for training teachers in South Sudan with the World Bank. The trip has been delayed several times. Instead, he has been occupied with other projects: a dialect survey in a troubled area of Somalia, orthography problems in Central Sudan Languages, investigating reading program strategies in Uganda refugee camps (and some fishing slipped in). Fully vaccinated, we each antic-

ipate travel within and beyond the USA. We hope to visit Cincinnati this summer.

We have wonderful memories of other summers and times at CHPC—our kids learning lifelong skills like swimming and then teaching with the Swim Ministry. They joined Youth Mission Trips to



Kentucky, and were part of *Splash Kingdom Drama Camp*. We stayed at the CHPC Mission House at many times of year—building snowmen, celebrating birthdays, cooking great meals. The house was a place to call “home,” where it was easy to host family and friends. Even when our family got older, we felt like we would be welcome to stay, worship and grow with our church family. We looked forward to planning for the next time in Ohio. Our family photo album shows us all growing up as part of a bigger family called College Hill Presbyterian Church.

CHPC has greatly impacted our family and many more families for the Lord’s glory! What about you and yours? How has CHPC impacted you and those around you for His glory? ■

No, this is not an article about a soccer game nor the pursuit of the ice hockey's Stanley Cup. Instead, hear the good news about God's work through the goals we have set as a congregation—a chance to imagine our personal ministry “across the street and around the world.”

In March and April, church attenders were challenged to individually set some simple congregational and personal goals for the next six months. Some examples were a goal to grow in Jesus' Lordship by purposeful prayer and study of the Bible alone or with others; to invite others to church; and to intentionally care for others with acts of mercy in the name of Jesus. Some made daily, weekly, and monthly goals around these three categories.

Thanks to all who sent me their goals. I'm astonished at what happens when we set goals together. We have made clear commitments to do evangelism and discipleship in our daily lives: 562 plan to invite people to church or to know Christ; 367 plan on doing direct acts of mercy in the name of Christ; and we committed to do 4,275 different acts of discipleship over this 6-month period. Even if we only bat .500 (which is Hall-of-Fame caliber), God is working in our midst to pursue His mission for the church.

## KALUBI MISSION TRIP TO THE CONGO TO BRING HEALTH AND HOPE

July 21 to 31, 2021 CHPC member Jacky Kalubi and her son Daniel will return to Kalala Museu Clinic in the Congo (the red spot on the map).

**KEEP THEM IN YOUR PRAYERS!**

In 2013, the Kalubis traveled with a SonLight Power team to install solar panels at the Kalala Museu Clinic. Electricity brought sustainable, reliable energy and endless possibilities to that little patch of land in Tshibombo, in the heart of the Congo. This summer, they travel with a group of 45 doctors, nurses, and volunteers on a medical mission trip with Christian Brigades.

Daniel is coordinating the logistical details of this trip and appreciates prayers for leadership, vision and calm. The team will hold free clinics and provide medical attention to people in need. Christian Brigades will also distribute medical kits, essential hygiene items as well as medical equipment.

Jacky has raised funds to provide sanitary menstrual products. "Period panties" are a relatively new product that is cost-effective, environment friendly, and

sustainable. For more info, see Jacky [jacky.kalubi@7hills.org](mailto:jacky.kalubi@7hills.org). She plans to take 150 pairs. The CHPC World Mission Budget has donated funds toward the trip and cost of these products.

1. Safety and traveling mercies for all.
2. Safety and peace for loved ones left behind in the USA.
3. Logistics on the ground such as transportation, lodging and food.

6. The people of Mbuji-Mayi and Tshibombo to be receptive to the mission—to receive treatment and hear about Jesus Christ.
7. God to "shut the mouths of lions."
8. Break toxic family ties—people released from generational links.
9. Protection against demons and bad spirits [this is serious in the African context].
10. TRUST in the Lord; serve with Joy.

Jacky's Study Passages: Ps. 121 (given to Jacky by her father when she left Congo in 1980); Ps. 91 (given to her brother, a virologist, in 1990 when he moved to Philadelphia); Isaiah 43:2; Ps. 34:7 and Eph. 6:10-18 *put on the whole armor of God.*
