SUMMER SWIM MINISTRY

Finneytown area toddler drowns in backyard pool

The Swim Ministry staff is committed to making an eternal difference in the lives of children one swimmer at a time, but the odds are not good:

DROWNING IS "A WORLD PANDEMIC FOR WHICH THERE IS NO BROAD PREVENTION EFFORT." NEARLY 400,000 DIE EACH YEAR.— World Health Organization

DROWNING IS "A LEADING CAUSE OF DEATH FOR CHILDREN." EACH DAY THERE ARE 11 FATAL AND 22 NON-FATAL DROWNINGS. EVEN NON-FATAL ONES MAY RESULT IN BRAIN DAMAGE AND LONG-TERM DISABILITY.—U.S. Center for Disease Control

Such statistics were the driving force behind our miraculous 2020 summer season: "The Big Splash." In spite of the pandemic, we safely taught swimmers and finished financially solvent. Lesson fees covered expenses, but individual donations and grants enabled us "to dream BIG." God used the 2021 grant application process to show us how we could make a differences



in even more children's lives, despite the statistics.

The toddler in the newspaper article was part of a close-knit immigrant community that was devastated by his death. Two concerned neighbors asked us to pray for God to comfort for

those who grieved this seemingly senseless death.

The toddler's death refocused our 2021 "Big Splash" grant applications. We intentionally included scholarships for children of immigrants and others who have little or no tradition of swimming lessons. All four grant requests were fully funded. Two national foundations cited our summer 2020 track record as proof of our commitment. The spokesman for "Step into Swim." Rowdy Gaines—3-time Olympic gold medalist and commentator—said, "In 2020, you taught 202 swimmers in the midst of the pandemic. That's 202 more than all the Y's in the USA. Plus, you gave \$2,940 in

scholarships to underserved kids!

Grants, individual donors, our mulch fund-raiser and donors provided \$7,210 in swim scholarships. Over 35% of our swimmers where *underserved* children/teens who came from WhizKids and Treehouse tutoring/mentoring, Jesus U. and LifeSpring Ballet groups, Pleasant Hill Academy, Mt. Healthy North Elementary, and the area. Seven racial/ethnic groups took part in the swim lessons.

GOD AT WORK—Sekar emailed wanting evening swim lessons for 13 children of refugees. We said, "Yes" even though we had no pool, no staff, no transportation, and no idea if we spoke a common language. When the students arrived in our church van, their swim teachers smiled, and with a slight bow greeted them and their parents with their traditional greeting, "Namaste!"

Few had ever been in a swimming pool. The children took swim lessons, and their parents learned "water safety" (Reach-Throw-Don't go). Mid-week, Sekar revealed that he was the one who had found the drowned toddler and that the child's brother was one of our students.

The last-day award celebration was filled with hugs and photos. Later, as the teachers gathered in prayer, we each sensed that God had touched us deeply through the drowning death of one child. As we simply taught swimming, we had seen fear and grief overcome by respect, love and fun. We were refreshed and renewed in our resolve to keep "Delivering the joy of Living Water."

JACKY KALUBI: YOU CAN GO HOME AGAIN . . . MINISTRY AROUND THE WORLD

This summer, CHPC Elder and professional educator Jacky Kalubi and her son Daniel said yes to a fellow Congolese friend and doctor. He invited them to join the medical team (pictured above) returning to the Congo—Jacky's country of origin.

Daniel managed the operations of the trip, setting up lodging and transportation and leading registration. He particularly enjoyed exercising his gift of languages, speaking English, French, and Tshiluba. Jacky herself speaks seven languages and joined the team as an interpreter for the nurses, doctors, and pharmacists who volunteer for Christian Brigade, an organization that sponsors international medical missions.

Jacky was a vital team member since the medical diagnoses depended on the translations she was able to provide.

The team members traveled to Tshibombo, a remote village in the interior of north central Congo. They were met by a crowd of people of many ages expecting their arrival. Alerted through radio announcements, people walked or motored from as far as 50 miles away to obtain the free services.

The team worked 12-hour days, providing medical treatment, surgery, medications for pain management and infection control, preventive teaching, and prayer. At the end of the long days, the team met to debrief each other about what they had experienced: burn cases, problematic pregnancies, infections, malnourishment, emergency surgery, unmanaged diabetes resulting in the need for amputations, and more.

A memorable experience was the discovery of the gender of twins in utero using an iPhone that could do ultrasounds. Only one in three infants born in rural villages have access to a hospital, thus prenatal care and teaching is a high priority.

Concerned about the empowerment of women, Jacky gathered and provided feminine hygiene products that were enthusiastically received (see photo below). In addition, the team provided Bibles,



medicines, shoes, toys, and caps.



Throughout the CHPC campus, programmable occupancy and vacancy sensor light switches automatically control room and hall lights. Many have a push button manual control as

well as a dimming sensor. Switches have a 180-degree field of view and manual presets for delayed-off time settings. Once you use them, you'll wonder why you haven't installed them in your own home.



During the Aug. 15th Open House, many remarked how "bright" the halls and rooms were. LED lights had replaced traditional ones. The technology has been around for decades. Now, LEDs are affordable, reliable, and safe. Energy efficient and long-lasting LED lights are environmentally responsible and budget-friendly. They can be used anywhere, require up to 85% less energy than traditional ones. and radiate little heat. Most LEDs last a minimum 25,000 hours. If an LED bulb were left on all day every day, it would be about 15 years before it needed replacing. This reduces electricity and maintenance costs and helps the environment.

River. Beginning at the Serpentine Wall, they swam the river to Kentucky and returned to Public Landing. Only 120 finished the 900 yard swim: 80 men and 40 women. The average time was about 20 minutes. The river patrol



stopped traffic. Life guards in kayaks and police boats lined the course. The swim was a fund-raiser for *The Adventure Crew*, a Cincinnati-based non-profit working in over 20 inner-city schools to get teens out into nature year round. For Galen, the swim was an 80th birthday present to himself.

THE YOUTH MINISTRY has also begun! Anne and Bill Clippard generously offered their pool to the Youth Ministry so that we could come back with a bang (a splash?).



As we started the year, we began a series called "Squad Up." This study is about how we have been selected by God, how he brings us into his family or his "squad," and how this choice is all his and it doesn't change based on our sin but instead relies on the faithfulness of Jesus. We are focusing on relationships

both vertically and horizontally. Vertically, the relationship is with God. Everything we do should come from that. Horizontally, when we consider how we are loved and the grace we have experienced, we must return that love and grace to others.

"Squad Up" also focuses on who we can share God with and how. As we know God's love and share it with others, a "squad" of people is built up around us that will help point us to God. Then, together, we grow in ways that we can be more available to God as he adds more to "his squad" (family of believers).

October 31—Halloween was once thought to stem from Irish Celtic paganism. By the 5th Century the Church chose the day to celebrate All Hallows Eve: Jesus' victory over death and Satan, and Eternal Life in Christ. Traditions developed like making lamps out of pumpkins and candles to keep vigil through the night.

November 1—In the 8th century Pope Gregory II established *All Saints' Day* to honor all the saints or "hallowed" ones in heaven, especially those martyred for Christ. Three centuries later, it became one of the six major feast days in the Roman Church. It was a time to remember believers who died and pray for the eternal life of others. Family members and friends dressed in bright costumes, and entertained each other in exchange for treats. (Sound familiar?)

This year, consider this deeper purpose of the holiday. In the midst of life take time to love other. Ask the Holy Spirit to lead you to ones who don't know Christ and make you his witness. Honor those who died in the past year, and pray for martyrs suffering for the Lord worldwide. Thank God that "the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed to us." That's no trick!

On October 24, the congregational meeting will be held between worship service.: 9:55 – 10:35 AM. To do this, the traditional 9 AM service will end 10 minutes early (9:50 AM) and the start of the 10:30 AM second service will be delayed 10 minutes (10:40 AM). Multiple indoor locations may be used to allow for social distancing. Covenant Partners (members) will use paper ballots to vote on a slated of nominees for CHPC Offices.

CANDIDATES LISTED were recommended by the congregation, and interviewed by the 2021 Congregational Nominating Committee, chaired by Session Elder Sharon Holland.
