#### OUR POIEMA PROJECT PRAYER

Father God,

You are our creator, our master-artist, the potter who shapes my heart to be like Jesus. I'm coming to you now, not as a stranger, but as your child, chosen and cherished. I am your masterpiece. You are shaping me like Jesus, so I can make a difference in the world.

That's what you do and that's who I am.

Father, when the noise creeps in and the world tries to define us, remind us that our identity is secure in You. I am not what others say about me. I am not what my past declares about me. I am not what my fears whisper. I am who YOU say I am. Give me the courage to walk in the identity you've given me. I choose to see myself through your eyes, in Christ. I am not an accident or an afterthought. I am redeemed and restored by your grace. You are shaping me like Jesus, so I can make a difference in the world.

That's what you do and that's who I am.

In moments of weakness, help us remember that your strength lives in us, your Spirit empowers us. I am intentionally created, deeply loved, and purposefully placed in this time and season. You waste nothing. In every challenge, every hardship, every blessing your hand is writing my story, shaping my calling. I am your masterpiece. You are shaping me like Jesus, so I can do a good work.

That's what you do and that's who I am.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

Thanks for joining us for the Poiema Project. The next 50 days are all about asking the question, "Who am I?" In the gallery of life, where influencers clamor and images flash, a profound truth often gets lost in the noise: you are God's masterpiece. You are crafted by the hand of God, for the purpose of doing something good in the world. In his letter to the church at Ephesus, Paul captures this beautiful reality with the word poiema. In Ephesians 2:10, Paul writes,

For we are God's masterpiece (poiema). He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago.

During the next 50 days, we'll uncover the layers of our God-given identity, peeling back the false narratives and uncovering the true story of who we are in Christ. It's not just content; we'll offer spiritual practices to help us dive into our identity, like a digital fast and a deep dive into our story with a post-it-note timeline. We'll follow a listen, learn and lean model. Each day, you'll listen to scripture, learn from the devotional, and lean in with your response. Here's how I will use this daily journal:

- 1. I'll start by reading Ephesians 2:10 (above) and then praying the Poiema Project Prayer.
- 2. Then it's on to the daily devotional.

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- 3. Finally, every day I'll do my truth rehearsal, reading the "Who am I" statements on the last page of the journal.
- 4. Don't miss the digital fast and the post-it-note timeline practices. They are gold!

So come as you are, masterpiece and mess, broken and beloved, confused and cherished. When we truly grasp who we are in Christ, it changes everything!

# MESSAGE NOTES

## WEEK ONE WHO AM 1?

That's the question we are asking for the next 50 days. Who do you think you are? We often find ourselves asking questions like, "Why am I here?" or "What is my purpose? But identity comes before destiny. The answer to "Why am I here?" is shaped by the answer to "Who am I?" We talk about self-image and the holy grail of self-esteem, but those are surface words. For the next 50 days, we're going deeper to our identity.

Here at the start of our journey, let me encourage you to daily make a statement and ask a question. The statement is an "I will..." statement. It's what you are going to do. It's not enough to listen and learn, we have to lean in or nothing will change. Before you leave a day, having pondered a scripture, prayed a prayer (or two) and read a devotional, write out an "I will" statement and then answer the question, "With whom can I share what I'm learning and what God is doing?"

During this first week, we are focusing on who we are without Christ, who the world wants us to be, and who we are because of God's shaping work. Some of us have spent long seasons of our lives trying to be someone we aren't, often afraid of finding out who we really are. But here's the truth: you are God's poiema project, and He does such good work!

So during this week as you begin to ponder your true identity,

- Make a gratitude list. Looking for God at work will help you see
   Him as the master-artist!
- Read the "Who Am I" list daily.

DAY 1 WHO AM I?





As a kid growing up, something that I would hear my mother say every morning as she dropped me and my brother off at school was, "Boys — you're leaders, not followers. Lead well today." Most days this was likely out of sheer desperation that I/we would not succumb to the questionable influence of some of our peers, but nonetheless, the principle stands to this day. Every single day I need a reminder of "who" I am, so that I know what to "do."

In other words, the "who" always comes before the "do."

This is what I love about following Jesus. So often in the Scriptures, God is found reminding us who we are before He ever tells us what to do.

So who are you? Peter's words in his letter to a very diverse group of new Christians was:

- We are "chosen." Just let that sink in. The Creator of the universe
  has personally selected you. This isn't a random choice or a lastminute decision. God has purposefully and lovingly chosen you
  to be His own.
- 2. We're described as a "royal priesthood" and a "holy nation." In ancient times, priests were set apart to serve God and mediate between Him and the people. Now we have direct access to God and the privilege of representing Him to the world.
- 3. We are God's "special possession." Like a treasured keepsake or a priceless heirloom, we are deeply valued by our Heavenly Father.

Why has God given us this remarkable identity? The verse tells us: to "declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light." Our identity isn't just for our own benefit — it's a calling to share the transformative power of God's love with others — blessed to be a blessing.

Remember, you were once in darkness, but God has brought you into His marvelous light. Your life is a testament to His grace and power.



Take a moment today (preferably in the morning) and say this out loud;

- "I am chosen by God."
- "I am part of a royal priesthood."
- "I belong to a holy nation."
- "I am God's special possession."
- "I have been called out of darkness into God's wonderful light."

At the end of your day take a moment to reflect on how remembering your identity in Christ influenced your actions, behaviors, thoughts about yourself, etc.



Lord, thank You for choosing me and giving me such a precious identity in You. Help me to live in a way that reflects this calling, and give me opportunities to declare Your praises to those around me. May my life be a beacon of Your wonderful light in this world. Amen.

DAY 2 WHO AM I?



1 Corinthians 6:17: Galatians 5:16-25

#### LEARN

"But the one who joins himself to the Lord is one spirit with Him."

1 Corinthians 6:17. Personally I don't think this verse gets enough attention. Most Christians understand they are the temple of the Holy Spirit. But this verse goes beyond that — the Greek says the believer and Holy Spirit are "one spirit." Before there were two spirits. After we are born again there is only one. If we grasp this reality, it's astounding. The spirit of a believer is completely united with the Holy Spirit. There are no rifts, no gaps; they are one.

That means in my spirit I am holy. My spirit wants what God wants, loves what He loves, hates what He hates. I'm completely in sync with Him. My spirit isn't double-minded or compromised in any way. My spirit truly is holy as He is holy.

What compromises me is my flesh and my not-yet-renewed mind, the part that does not yet think as God thinks. Scripture never commands us to resist the pull of the Spirit. Instead we are commanded to "walk by the Spirit, so we won't carry out the deeds of the flesh." Galatians 5:16. Notice also the fruit of the spirit. Galatians 5:22.

My flesh is to be considered crucified (Galatians 5:24), it is to be denied. My soul (mind, will and emotions) needs to be renewed (Romans 12:2); it's still in process. My spirit, one with the Holy Spirit, is already entirely holy. Galatians 5:16-26



Read and meditate on these two passages. Consider how the fact that part of you (your spirit — perhaps the deepest part of your identity) is unequivocally holy.



Help me to understand the war within that Paul describes in Galatians 5:17-18. Help me to understand that part of me is fully on God's side. Help me to learn to find my identity in my spirit, not my flesh.

Wow! That captures ALL that Jesus has done for us. Rick Warren said, "The reason you have value is because of what God says about you ... not because of what other people say about you." We no longer have to live in our past, because Jesus has paid the price, and we are a brand new creation in Christ!



Here are a few things for you to ponder in your life today:

- Am I thankful for God's rich mercy, grace & love?
- Am I currently viewing myself through my own lens, or through God's?
- Do I recognize that real self-esteem comes from knowing that God created me, Jesus died for me, and as a Jesus-Apprentice, the Holy Spirit lives in me?
- Do I know someone who struggles in this area? If so, pray for them right now, and then reach out to them to let them know.
- Do I need to talk with someone?



Pause now and listen to the voice of God. Confess the areas in your life where you struggle in the area of identity and purpose. Ask Father God to guide you today. Thank Jesus for his incredible sacrifice of love for us. Invite the Holy Spirit to constantly remind you that you are a new creation ... a masterpiece made in the image of God!

At a very young age, children learn to hide parts of themselves.

But as Christ's work gives us our identity and God continues to shape us, there are forces seeking to steal our identity. So my challenge to us this week is to beware the thief of your identity.

DAY 8 IDENTITY THEFT





Identity is tough ... At 31 years old, I'm still learning about who I am and the identity that God has given me. As a P.K. I had some conflicting identities that made living life difficult. At church I was who I thought people wanted me to be ... put together, walking hand in hand with Christ, behaving and making good choices. In school, I was who I thought my friends wanted me to be. And those two identities did not always (or often) match up.

I was looking for acceptance anywhere I could find it. And even though I had amazing role models who pushed me to be the person God wanted me to be, the desire to seek acceptance from others always overshadowed that. It was miserable. Basing your identity off of acceptance is a really effective way to avoid living into your true identity. Luckily, I've had people in my life who didn't let me stay in that place. People who reminded me that I was chosen. I was accepted. Not by man but by an unchanging God. A God who designed me with a purpose and gave me an identity that could only be found in Him.

I'm still not fully there. I still find myself at times putting my identity in how others view me ... but I've gotten better. And now, when I feel myself changing parts of who I am to be accepted, I remind myself that I already am accepted. I have already been chosen. And I've already been given an identity.

DAY 9 IDENTITY THEFT

#### LISTEN

DAY 11 IDENTITY THEFT



### LEARN

The Enemy wants you and me to feel: (A) beat down, convinced we're unworthy — unloveable — easy to overlook; (B) self-focused, always seeking self-improvement, looking to be in control; or (C) overwhelmed, distracted, looking for our identity in possessions or in a person ("if they just love me I'll be enough"). If Satan wins, we will never truly walk in the preciousness of who GOD created us to be. We'll never fully walk in the victory that Jesus bought for us at the cross. You are precious to Him! He has shaped you to be YOU. No need for self-loathing, pride, control, trying to be something we are not to gain someone's approval or love. He loves you just the way He made you. Parts A, B, and C above are not an exhaustive list of ways the Enemy tries to pull us from our true identity in Christ. Can you nail down 1 or 2 lies you might believe about yourself, your worth, your identity that contradict who God says you are?

Find a scripture that clearly reminds you that you are NOT those things. Write it and post it somewhere that you will consistently see it as a reminder that you are His Beloved.

E.g. I struggle with feeling like I don't belong. I will fight against that and hold onto the words of 1 John 3:19-20 NIV



Holy Spirit, please come and replace every part of my heart, mind, and emotions that is distracted by what the Enemy tries to sneak in. Transform how I think about who and WHOSE I am. Thank you that I am Your Beloved: that is my true identity first and foremost. Help me to walk in that reality more and more each day. I praise You for loving me, for wanting me, for rescuing me and for giving me life eternal and life abundant here and now. I love you Lord!

DAY 12 IDENTITY THEFT





"Saul has struck down his thousands, and David his ten thousands." We're all drawn to comparison, looking to build up the good and minimize the bad. Nothing irks us like having our ledger balance flip-flopped, especially publicly. Saul becomes filled with rage at the knowledge that David's record exceeds his own. The real trouble is that Saul never came to recognize that the taunting songs were merely the occasion for his anger, not the cause of it.

Three chapters earlier, in 1 Samuel 15, the prophet Samuel tried to shine the light of God's healing on Saul's real problem. Verse 17 says, "Though you are little in your own eyes, are you not the head of the tribes of Israel? The Lord anointed you king over Israel." Saul measured himself and found himself wanting.

Our own eyes are not a reliable measure of our identity. The Enemy loves to whisper in our ears, "You're nothing." Oh, how far from it! It is the Lord's anointing, the seal of His presence, that defines who we are. He chose to set His Spirit within us. Our roles and achievements are merely evidence of God's goodness and grace in and through us, not the measure of who we are.



Where have I become angry when my strengths were minimized or weaknesses magnified? Take some time today to listen to the Spirit as He brings convicting healing to your heart. Am I the one trying to flip the ledger on God? Do I feel like God "owes" me different circumstances? Have I minimized His greatness in an attempt to magnify my own? Let the amazement of unmerited grace and His overwhelming love wash away the lies of the Enemy who wants to make you doubt who you really are.



Loving Father, I confess that I daily need to remember who You are. You are the one who loves me beyond measure. Your love is what gives me worth, purpose, direction, and life without end. Let the doubts that play in my mind be a reminder to me that the spiritual battle for my soul is itself evidence of how valuable I am.

#### LEARN

We go to great lengths to protect our personal identity. We make sure that our Social Security cards are tucked away in a safe place where no one would ever think to look for them. We create passwords for our online banking keeping our personal information in a safe and secure location.

I have to examine myself. Do I spend that much energy and effort on protecting my identity in Christ? Am I making sure that the Enemy cannot get in? And what tools and measures do I have in place to protect that identity?



The best way I know is that I keep the words of truth close to me daily, using them as passwords to protect me. He loves me deeply and I am His precious child. Memorize a couple verses that remind yourself of His truth about who You are in Him.



Father, we want to keep Your promises, Your word hidden deep within our hearts. Help me to always be on guard and to shut down the lies of the Enemy when he whispers that we are not enough. He cannot have the joy that I have in my identity in Jesus.

DAY 14 IDENTITY THEFT



Mark 10:2-5; Psalm 23

#### LEARN

Often people will speak about how "dumb" sheep are. I have read that they are actually very intelligent animals, appearing to have strong cognitive abilities and forming deep relationships with one another in their herd. What is true is that they are dependent on their shepherd and his voice, and without the shepherd, that is when they go astray and get lost from the flock. A few years ago I read the above familiar passage, but this time something stuck out to me. In verse 5 it says "But they will never follow a stranger, in fact they will run away from him because they do not recognize a stranger's voice." Wow ... they will NOT follow a stranger because they do not recognize his voice. What about us? How often do you take in lies from the Enemy about yourself, your worth, your identity, or God's love for you? If we are dependent on the Good Shepherd, like the sheep, the stranger's voice should make us run because we do not recognize it as God's voice!



Ask the Good Shepherd to reveal what words from the "stranger" you have been listening to and believing about yourself. Ask Him to help you find scriptures that identify the truth in order to combat those lies, and ask Him to make your ears and heart more keen to His voice over any others'.



Lord it says that You are the Good Shepherd and You laid down Your life for the sheep, for us. May we become so familiar with Your voice and Truth, that when the Enemy spews lies, we will instantly recognize that it is not You and be able to recall the Truth of who we are and Whose we are!

#### MESSAGE NOTES



Welcome to week three of our Poiema Project. For the last two weeks we've been setting the stage for our identity discovery. We asked the question, "Who am I" and we introduced a major reason why we struggle with our identity...it's the spiritual battle of identity theft. Remember you are the poiema of God! You are what God does. You are His handiwork. You are God's masterpiece. So when it comes to identity, our identity is received, not achieved. We surrender to it, we don't strive for it. My failures do not define me. Jesus sees me, forgives me and loves me deeply. Shame does not define me. Sin does not define me. I am forgiven and favored, redeemed and restored. Don't lose sight of our theme verse,

For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago. Ephesians 2:10

The theme this week is "I am not what I've done." Your identity is shaped by what Christ has done, so your past cannot keep you from God's future. He's writing your story and it's a story of redemption and grace. This week as we take one more look at some of the internal barriers to living into our true identity, let me encourage you to do an audit. You've had two weeks now to daily read through your "Who am I?" list. This week, do an evaluation. Which 2-3 are the hardest for you to believe? Focus on them this week. So, during this coming week;

- Do a "who am I" audit.
- Write out your "I will" statements and share what God is doing in you with someone.

DAY 15 I AM NOT WHAT I DID





How often do we find ourselves trapped by our past? The weight of our mistakes, failures, and poor choices can feel like an anchor, holding us back from embracing the fullness of life God intends for us. But today's verse offers a liberating truth: in Christ, we are not defined by what we did.

Paul reminds us that when we accept Christ, our old self — with all its sins and shortcomings — is crucified with Him. This isn't just poetic language; it's a profound spiritual reality. The person we once were, bound by sin and separated from God, has died.

This is the miracle of the Christian life — we're given a new identity, one that's no longer rooted in our past actions but in the present reality of Christ's indwelling presence.

This means that our daily lives, decisions, and self-perception should be guided not by the echoes of our past, but by the truth of who we are in Christ. We are loved, redeemed, and made new.

The verse ends with a beautiful reminder of why this transformation is possible: because Jesus "loved me and gave himself for me." Our freedom from the past isn't something we achieved; it's a gift given by a Savior who loved us enough to die for us.

So today, if you find yourself haunted by past mistakes or defined by old labels, remember: that's not who you are anymore. In Christ, you are a new creation. Your identity is not in what you did, but in who He is and what He has done for you.



- 1. Stand in front of a mirror.
- 2. Look at yourself and say out loud: "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me."
- 3. Take a deep breath and imagine the old self, with all its mistakes and shortcomings, fading away.
- 4. As you exhale, envision Christ's presence filling you.
- Now, state one positive attribute of Christ that you want to embody today. For example: "Today, Christ's patience lives in me" or "Today, Christ's love for others lives in me."
- 6. Throughout the day, when faced with challenges or temptations to fall back into old patterns, recall your morning mirror moment and silently repeat, "Christ lives in me."
- 7. Before bed, reflect on moments during the day when you were aware of Christ living in you. Write these down if possible.



Lord Jesus, thank You for the new life You've given me. Help me to fully embrace the truth that I am not defined by my past, but by Your presence in me. Teach me to live by faith, trusting in Your love and sacrifice. May my life reflect the reality that Christ lives in me. Amen.

DAY 16 I AM NOT WHAT I DID





My favorite passage to teach for the women's Bible study at the county jail is Luke 7:36-50. That said, several years ago when I felt the Holy Spirit nudging me to teach this passage, I didn't want to. Not sure why. The Holy Spirit was persistent, so I complied.

A very pretty young woman attended. A few minutes into the lesson I noticed this woman's eyes were watering. I thought she must have severe allergies. Her eyes continued to water through the whole lesson.

We had been discussing how Jesus saw the "sinful woman" as opposed to how Simon saw her. Simon was blind to the miracle of redemption happening before his eyes, but Jesus saw her — her hunger, her repentance. In His eyes all she had done in her past didn't matter. Her repentance, her passionate love for Jesus now defined her.

Turns out, the pretty young woman didn't have allergies; she was crying. She confessed to the group that she was a prostitute. Some of the other women in the jail had been persecuting her because of it. I realized the Holy Spirit knew this story probably more than any other in Scripture was what would bring healing to her heart.

That was several years ago. I don't know what happened to her. I do know I've never seen her again at the jail. It is my hope Jesus' last words to the "sinful woman" are still ringing in her ears, "Your sins have been forgiven."



Consider: how can I allow Jesus' forgiveness to define me? Offer Him a response of love and gratitude.



Jesus, help me to remember that Your forgiveness defines me, not my failures, not my past. Let Your words to the woman in Luke 7 also ring in my ears, "Your sins have been forgiven."

To me it speaks to generational curses and behaviors: toxic patterns that are passed down, causing a ripple effect. It takes boldness and grit to say, no more, this cycle ends here with me. This is not who God created me to be. This is not the mother I choose to be for my children. I am choosing to press into the painful areas of my life to find healing and peace — not only for myself but for my daughters. This is a journey we all face at some point in our lives and a process that doesn't happen overnight. But we were not designed to wallow in our regret from past sins and become hand-in-hand partners with guilt and shame. We were made to live in freedom and walk in His light.



My challenge to you today is to ask God where you need to be refined in your life. Maybe you already know an area in which you are struggling or for which you need prayer. I encourage you to talk to someone about it, be open, vulnerable and willing to press into the hard stuff. Isolating ourselves in shame only prolongs the healing and redemption God offers all of us. Our identity and self-worth can only be found through Christ

DAY 22 I AM NEW





These two verses in 1 Corinthians are some of my favorite scriptures in the whole bible. Paul tells us that he should be considered the least of the Apostles and that he doesn't deserve to be called an Apostle. Why? Because of the fact that he had persecuted the church. Paul had thrown people into prison, broken up families, and even thrown in his vote with those committing murder. He passionately tried to destroy the body and bride of Jesus. How did someone like him become an Apostle? He gives us the answer in verse 10 — "but by the grace of God I am what I am." Paul wasn't who he used to be; he had been saved and transformed.

God's grace didn't make it so that what Paul had done became untrue. God's grace made it so that Paul could become a new creation. What defined Paul was no longer his past sins but rather the grace and love of Jesus. This is the same work that God is wanting to do in each of our lives.

DAY 23 I AM NEW

A highlight of a trip to Italy this past summer was a tour of an organic lemon farm in Sorrento. The owner described the grafting process that has enabled his crops to thrive. Lemon tree shoots are grafted onto bitter orange rootstock, providing a multitude of benefits including (1) resistance to diseases and pests which promotes longevity and the ability to produce fruit for extended periods due to their robust root systems; (2) a more consistent growth process, fruit size and quality; and (3) cold hardiness. Imagine that! Immediately, the concept of being grafted into Christ shifted from black and white to color. When we trade our old lives for new life in Christ, our tender shoot is spliced into Him and we receive all the benefits of HIS strength, resistance, and root system. We become a brand new creation.

But the Enemy still calls us by our old name. "Call a dog by a name enough times and he will eventually respond to it." The Liar has repeatedly called us names — defeated, lost, hopeless, too much, not enough. It takes diligence to recognize his schemes and stand up to the bullying; to say "that is NOT my name." I am no longer that person. My sins have been removed as far as the east is from the west (Psalm 103:12). I am being transformed by the renewing of my mind (Romans 12:2). I am putting off my old self and putting on my new self — the self created after the likeness of God (Ephesians 4:22-24).

When the Enemy calls you names, don't even turn around. That's old news. Eyes fixed on Jesus, your brother, who has your back. (Mark 3:35)

## LEARN

If you know Team Sublett, you likely know some of our story. We expanded our family through adoption ... six times in six years. Some of the adoptions were international. Some were domestic. But they all had at least one thing in common. At some point near the end of the adoption process, we stood before a judge who uttered something along these lines: "This is now your child; these are now your parents, your family. Nothing you can do from this point forward can change this. This child has all the rights and privileges, all the responsibilities and expectations as all your other children. For all practical purposes, as of today, it's as though this child has always been yours.

#### LEAN

We are all adopted in and through Jesus Christ. God wanted us to be His children, so He drew a plan long before you and I were born. Adopting us gave Him great pleasure (Eph 1:5). God says that He has given us His Spirit, the Spirit of adoption, not the spirit of slavery to fear, our old way of life, or anything else that would compete with Him. He gives us the privilege of calling Him Abba, a Hebrew term that carries the idea of intimacy and obedience. Jesus called the Father Abba, and we can too. In our adoption, He has made us His children ... and His heirs. What is God saying to you?



Abba, thank You for loving us, for making our adoption not only possible but a reality. I pray that You would help us to settle into Your love, to live in the joy of our relationship with You, and to walk with You in intimacy and obedience. Help us to live as sons and daughters of the Most High God, and to carry on the family business.

What would my life have been like if I'd grown up in foster care without the love and support of a permanent family?

I have lived with the realization that I had been deeply longed for and wanted my whole life, but I kept that thought especially close to my heart during my difficult/awkward teenage years. Later while at the Penn State Brandywine campus, I attended a Christian fellowship group and learned more about a God that also deeply longed to have a relationship with people, so much that He sent His Son Jesus to the earth to die for our sins. On a summer afternoon in 1982, I asked Jesus to be my Lord and Savior and experienced my second adoption — this time into the family of God!

Ephesians 1:4-5 says "Even before He made the world, God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in His eyes. God decided in advance to adopt us into His own family by bringing us to Himself through Jesus Christ. This is what He wanted to do, and it gave Him great pleasure."



Our Heavenly Father invites us to live with the realization that we have always been loved and longed for by Him. And He wants us to be more than just a member of His family. He desires to have a deep, intimate relationship with us.



Lord, thank You for the love that You have for each of us that started before we ever heard about You. Thank You for the chance to be a part of your family! Today, help me to live in the full assurance of how You feel about me.

DAY 31 I AM CHOSEN



Ephesians 2:1-10, Deuteronomy 7:7-8



You are a child of the King of creation, chosen to be His own. As you read those words, do they resonate with profound sweetness? Maybe they feel neutral: an intellectual statement that you acknowledge must be true. It's in the Bible, after all. In his preface to the Screwtape Letters, C.S. Lewis wrote that the "ruthless, sleepless, unsmiling fixation on the self" is the mark of hell. To pull away the cover from the septic tank of our own hearts and to see our sins, failures, and weaknesses in the full light of reality would be torturous

But God does see it all.

We expend so much energy trying to minimize, blame-shift, or cover up exactly the mess that Jesus came to redeem. When we acknowledge what God already knows about us, it sets us free from thinking that we earned His grace. That's the beauty of being chosen: it's not by our doing or by our merit. To be honest before God about the debt I owe is to stop looking at myself and to be in awe of Him. I'm His child, not because I deserve it, because I cleaned myself up, because I avoided "that" sin. He loves me because He loves me.



It's hard to be vulnerable. Look for some time this week when you can talk with a trusted friend, and see if you can be honest about some of the places where God wants to release you from believing that you have to be deserving of His love. You are His child, not His hired hand.



Abba Father, I need you. Holy Spirit, I need you to remind me every day that I am no longer a slave to fear and my need to self-protect. Jesus, I need you. I need to see you on the cross, taking what I deserve, so that I can be freed from my mess to delight in all that You deserve that you impart to me: the freedom, joy, and security of being loved as a child.

You are God's masterful creation. You are divine poetry in motion. You ... are His masterpiece. You are God's magnum opus. His best and highest creation.



Believe it or not, an important question in loving one's neighbor is, "How do I view myself?" Why is this important? Because our view of ourselves is primarily based on how we think God sees us.

It's so critical to our Front Yard Mission that we get our identity straight. Without a proper Christ-centered identity we will never be free to love our neighbor. And yet how we view ourselves is a bit of a balancing act.

Rick Warren said, "True humility is not thinking less of yourself, it's thinking of yourself less." Let's face it ... you are a living paradox, an oxymoron, an enigma. And the mystery is this: you are not able. However, Christ in you is able. You are unworthy, but you are not worthless. You were a cracked jar of clay, yet you have been made new and now hold an unspeakable treasure.



Father God, I choose to believe the truth about how You see me. I thank You that I can hope in the future and believe in the good destiny that You have for me. You have a vision for my future. It's easy to read scripture and see all of the amazing things that followers of Jesus accomplished. When you stop and think about their lives, it's also really easy to see how messed up so many of them were. David was an adulterer and murderer, Moses was a murderer, Gideon was a coward filled with doubts and questions, and Peter denied ever knowing Christ. Yet through it all, God used them. Through it all, God's love for them never diminished, never changed, and was never questioned. In my past, I've allowed my mistakes to affect how I thought God saw me. Because how could He use me when I've done so many stupid things? How could He use me when I've said no to so many of the things He was pushing me to do? What I've found as I've continued to be imperfect is that God uses our weaknesses to show off His power in our lives and our world. God doesn't promise to take away our mess, at least not in this life. But he does promise that His grace is sufficient. He does promise to give us life and to help us experience freedom.



For a lot of us, it's hard to accept that we are weak. It's hard to admit that we are messy. It feels weird, but take some time to thank God for our weakness. Thank Him for His grace that is sufficient to cover all of our weaknesses. And take time to repent. Confess the places where you've fallen short and ask God to help you run in the other direction!



Jesus, thank You for using us to bring You glory. Thank You for all the examples of using broken people to bring You glory. And thank You that your grace is sufficient. Forgive us for the places we've fallen short. Forgive us for the times we relied on our own strength. And Jesus, thank you for using a glorious mess like me.

DAY 39 I AM A GLORIOUS MESS

# LEARN

Moses is a great example of God using an imperfect person to glorify Himself. When Moses encounters God at the burning bush and is called to go to Egypt, he's full of "why me's" and "what ifs." Then, after all of God's reassurances, Moses still says send someone else! He's focused on his lack of qualifications instead of on the power of the God who calls him.

As a musician and worship leader, I used to get easily distracted by how I performed on any given day. My voice would falter or my fingers hit wrong notes, or I wouldn't feel mentally and emotionally engaged like I wanted to. Like Moses, in those moments I'd ask God isn't there someone better for this? My gaze was turned inward, blocking me from experiencing the grace of God and the peace that comes with humble surrender to Him. But as He grows my ability to shift my gaze to Him, my worship and life become less defined by my capabilities or what people think of me and more defined by gratitude and joy in knowing that God can and will do whatever He wants to, on my best and worst days. He doesn't want to use perfect people to bring Him glory, just hearts humbly and joyfully surrendered to whatever He wants to do.



Every morning for a week, start the day with this short prayer (or a similar one of your own): "God, thank You that You are in control. Thank You for Your grace in using me just as I am, while continually renewing me each day. Help my gaze to shift back to You when it focuses too much on things around me. I surrender my day to You with joy and humility. Amen."



Lord, we are broken people, but You delight in using us as we are. I pray for tangible revelations of your grace in the places where we're fixated on our inadequacies and mistakes. Open our eyes to who You are and where You're at work!

My flesh would prefer to be sturdier, more finished-looking, but like Rahab and Gideon and Peter, my fragile mess becomes a showcase for the redemptive work of my Dad. If I'll just show up, He welcomes me into his workshop and whispers: "This, even this, is something we can work with! Come with me." (Philippians 1:6)



What part of you or piece of your story is long overdue to be handed over to the Father? He doesn't panic or shame. No mess is too big. Freedom awaits.

But God sees me and He wants to use me even with my inadequacies. The above verses remind me that He will equip me to do the work He is calling me to do if I am willing to be used by Him.



Do you feel Him nudging you toward being on mission with Him? Do you feel inadequate? So many people in the Bible felt the same way: Moses, David, etc. The truth is we are inadequate alone, but with HIM all things are possible and He will equip you for every good work.



God, thank You for calling us to be on mission with You. We are trusting that since You have called us, You will equip us. Thank You for seeing our flaws and insecurities but using us anyway. Amen.

DAY 50 I AM GOD'S JAR





When Paul calls us to fix our gaze on unseen eternal realities, he's simply asking us to believe that what God says about reality is true, even when we don't see it. He's asking us to believe that the harvest is plentiful when we look at our neighborhood; to believe that our battle is not against flesh and blood even when others attack us. He's asking you to believe that you are His kid, covered in His love, even when you feel unseen and believe the darkness will not prevail; even when hope seems unreasonable. He's asking you to believe that you are, in fact, say this to yourself, "I am God's Jar." You are God's jar and your life is filled with a great treasure. That's Paul's message in 2 Corinthians 4:7. "But we have this treasure in jars of clay ..."

You are God's jar. And what is a jar? Most jars are defined by what they contain, water bottles, a flower vase, a cookie jar, a fine bottle of wine. So, what's in your jar? What is the treasure? It's the glory of God coming alive in your life. It's the Spirit making you more like Jesus. It's the resurrection power of Christ let loose in your life. Ultimately, it's the life of Jesus in you. When it comes to your life, God is passionately obsessed with shaping your jar for Jesus. He wants you to become so full of Jesus that when people look at the container of your life, all they can see is His heart.

But take a deep breath and listen. Your jar full of Jesus doesn't happen without the crucible. It doesn't happen without getting shaped on the potter's wheel. We want change without the crucible. We want glory without the pain. We want resurrection without death. But that's not how it works. "For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all."



Just imagine holding that crucible in your hands and offering it to Jesus. Breathe in resurrection life, breathe in future glory, breathe in his Spirit ... and just say, "I give this to You, Jesus. Do everything in me that You need to do, so that You can do everything through me that You want to do. You are the potter. I am the clay. Shape me for you."



Father, shape me for Your glory. Jesus, fill me with Your Spirit. Spirit, fill me with Your power. I am Your jar. Do everything You need to do, in me, so that You can do everything You want to do through me. Amen.
