6th Grade Summer Reading Definitions

<u>Setting</u> - time and place of the action; creates a feeling, mood, or atmosphere

<u>Author's Purpose</u> - the reason the author wrote the story or the text

<u>Point of View</u> - the perspective from which a story or event is told $(1^{st}$ person or 3^{rd} person)

<u>Protagonist</u> - the main character in a literary work

<u>Antagonist</u> - a character or force in conflict with a main character or protagonist

Plot - sequence of events or action in a literary work

<u>Conflict</u> - a struggle between opposing forces; causes the action (external conflict-outside source; internal conflict-within the mind of the character)

<u>Resolution</u> - falling action or end of the central conflict; follows the climax of the story

<u>Tone</u> - the attitude of the author or speaker toward the subject of the passage

<u>Characterization</u> - analysis (or description) of people or animals that take part in the action of a literary work

<u>Cause/Effect</u> - a relationship between events and circumstances that bring about a result
