REPORT OF THE RECTOR

Equipping the Saints for the Work of Ministry, for Building up the Body of Christ!

When the Apostle Paul wrote in the fourth chapter of Ephesians about the many various gifts and talents that God has instilled in the faithful, he didn't talk about any particular skill or position as being more important than any other. Rather, he made the point that all of the gifts, together, were given with the designed purpose of helping the community live fully into its mission and calling, and ultimately of building up the community. Rowan Williams put it another way when he wrote in his book Tokens of Trust "A well-functioning Christian community is one in which everyone is working steadily for the release of the gifts of others." This image of community comes to my mind repeatedly as I think of the past year.

I've always known St. Mary's to be a community that works hard, with great joy, to serve God; to worship in beauty, spirit, and in truth; to learn and grow in our faith; and to reach out in compassionate care to our neighbors near and far. This starts with Vestry members and staff who live into their roles out of a sense of call, not merely as duties or jobs, and this can be seen in countless examples of parish members living out their faith in their home, work, school, community groups, and neighborhoods. This report, of course, highlights so much of how this community of Jesus has sensed God's call to be the Body of Christ, and I hope that you will take the time to read all of it.

This year, however, the people of St. Mary's stepped into new leadership roles in remarkable ways, leading up to and during my summertime sabbatical. Not only did usual fellowship and outreach ministries of the church continue without missing a beat, and liturgies continue to be offered, but about half of Sunday services were lay-led (by desire!), visiting clergy & guests were welcomed warmly, mid-week programming (which usually pauses during the summer) continued, AND some long-deferred painting maintenance at the church, a renovation of Mary's Kitchen, and the beginnings of a Parlor re-imaging was taken on! Wow! I have tried to express adequate thanks on behalf of the church to all who took on additional responsibilities during this time. While there are too many saints to name here, I simply must highlight your Sr. Warden, Vicki Kennedy, whose organization, devotion, leadership, and loving sacrificial service was a constant throughout this time. God bless y'all!

Personally, I will always be grateful in more ways than I can articulate for the support that St. Mary's offered to my family and me as I retired from 20 years of Coast Guard service and lived into the season of sabbatical rest and renewal. I look forward to opportunities in 2024 to share more with the church about these experiences and how they have shaped me, including a bread-baking workshop scheduled for February 11, 2024. I will always think of this summer, not only with appreciation for the adventures, the renewal, the prayer, the baking, and the sabbath rest that it entailed, but also with gratitude for all of you who served at and from St. Mary's in such a variety of ways as the Gospel of Jesus Christ continued to be proclaimed in word and deed!

This year, St. Mary's continues to be a community that supports the calling, discernment, and formation of clergy. As Fr. Greg Smith has served in his first year of ordained ministry as a priest based out of St. Mary's, it has not been surprising for him to receive and respond to many requests for his services in other regional churches in need of clergy support. Jon Sargeant is now a Candidate for Holy Orders as he has progressed through the discernment and formation process towards the priesthood. The Vestry has supported his application to be ordained to the (transitional) diaconate, which we hope will take place in the coming months. In this vein, we also celebrate the life and ministry, and lament the recent death of, the Rev. Deacon Barbara Houston, who served as a deacon here for nearly 15 years until her retirement in 2011. Over the years, her vocational ministries were with the Episcopal Farmworkers' Ministry and Mary's Kitchen, as well as serving in the liturgies. May the past and present examples of these ministers inspire us all to continuously discern God's call on our lives and follow faithfully wherever our Lord leads.

Finally, friends, we close 2023 at what I and many others at St. Mary's perceive to be a momentous time along our path of discerning long-term mission priorities for us as a church community. The Long Range Planning Committee and Vestry are ready to commence the early stages of a capital campaign that will address accessibility for all people throughout the church campus, as well as the development of our West Lawn beginning with an updated playspace and natural area for our children and community. This work will be presented in much more detail as the campaign begins and I am grateful for how these groups have worked so hard to form comprehensive plans out of the expressed needs and desires of this church family. Indeed, all of these plans, along with the highlights throughout this report reflect a church striving to welcome and equip the saints for the work of ministry and to build up the Body of Christ. I remain grateful to share in this work with you.

REPORT OF THE SENIOR WARDEN

Renewal has been a key theme for St. Mary's in 2023. I worked closely with other Vestry members to plan for Fr. Tom's 14-week sabbatical this summer. This led to a time of refreshment and renewal for him and his family while it also opened an opportunity for our congregation to welcome a series of guest preachers and celebrants, and to experience lay-led Morning Prayer. I'm so thankful for our parishioners' encouragement and continued participation in worship and church life throughout this summer.

The Vestry has also moved forward in renewing our physical facilities with a much-needed paint job in our Nursery School classrooms and corridors. This fall, with ECW funding and the leadership of Anne Lindley, we are seeing a renewal of our Parlor. Other ongoing projects include roofing repairs and plans for updated security and fire alarm systems.

Our Long Range Planning process continues to move ahead preparing for improvements to our physical facility that will enhance our mission of “serving with JOY.” We’ve also held a successful stewardship campaign, celebrating on Consecration Sunday our ability to give of our time, talents, and treasure.

This year has also brought changes in personnel, including the retirement of choirmaster and organist Sharon Veitch. We are blessed to have a fine interim organist in Sylvia Wall and to see growth and renewal in St. Mary’s Choir with more singers and a new Choral Scholar. Through a generous bequest from the estate of Sam Gilmore, the Vestry this year has established a Choral Scholar Fund which will help sustain our choir’s growth.

Each day as Senior Warden has renewed my belief in St. Mary’s vitality and dedication to transforming lives through living into the gospel. I am deeply grateful to our outstanding staff - Lori Kelly, Sherry Tanner, Liz Hengst, Jim Godfrey and Ronnie Taylor - for their wise advice and unfailing willingness to help. I’m honored to have served with this energetic and optimistic Vestry. And I’m inspired by the generosity and spirit of unity in the people of St. Mary’s Episcopal Church.

With the help of many, we are on track to have the necessary roof repairs made within the first few months of 2024. As I consider the year to come, I anticipate that a number of other significant projects (currently in discussion) will be completed by your Vestry, notably the installation of a door security/lock system, as well as a fire alarm system.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

Our YTD financial statements for the ten months ending October 31, 2023 are included, beginning on page 16 of this report.

I would like to thank Jon Sargeant, our out-going Treasurer for his help with the on-boarding process. He, along with Tom Warren, Lori Kelly, and Jess Edwards helped me acclimate to the flow of financial information and the structure of our Vestry meetings.

Let's jump into the numbers. On the revenue side, our pledges for 2023 totaled \$500,000 which was just over our pledges for 2022 which totaled \$498,309.20. We are thankful for your generous and dedicated support of St. Mary's this year.

Through October 31, 2023, we have received \$388,938.95 in pledged funds and we hope to receive the remaining \$111,061.05 in November and December, as in years past.

The annual budget which was approved by the Vestry in January included using approximately \$55,000 of investment income in order to meet a total annual budget of \$632,270.89. Our budget has a surplus of \$4,036.11 over planned expenses.

On the expense side, the vast majority of our operating expenses for this year are currently running at or below budget. Our target YTD expense percentage reporting from the end of October, 2023 is 83.30%. Our actual expenses YTD ending in October, 2023 shows expenses at 79.81% of our budget.

In summary for 2023, at least through October 31, 2023, our expenses have exceeded our income by \$44,206.81. However, our remaining pledged income in addition to our planned year-end transfers from investments should more than make up for this deficiency. In summation, we are in a good position to finish 2023 in line with our initial budget projections.

We have already begun the process of discussing our budget for next year, and in that regard, if you have not submitted your 2024 Estimate of Giving card, please help us with our planning by turning this information in to the church office as soon as possible. To date, we have received a total of 87 commitments for a pledged amount of \$447,441.

It has been an honor to represent St. Mary's as your Treasurer this year and I look forward to another financially healthy and productive year in 2024.

REPORT OF THE WORSHIP COMMISSION

Throughout the seasons and Ordinary Times of the year, we have worshiped together at vibrant and joy-filled 8 am and 10:30 am Sunday morning services, Tuesday and Thursday Morning Prayer, Mid-week festal Eucharists, Compline, Evensong, a Pet Blessing, All Saints Evensong, Lessons and Carols, Stations of the Cross, and our amazing Boar's Head Festival and Renaissance Banquet. We have worshiped together in our beautiful sanctuary, our beloved All Saints' Chapel, St. Francis Garden, and in the life-giving open air of our West Lawn. We shared the blessings of life in Christ at heartfelt baptisms, weddings, funerals, graduation celebrations, and Consecration Sunday services.
- We are thankful for the seven years of service of Organist & Choirmaster Sharon Veitch who made each of our worship experiences rich, vibrant, and meaningful with music and liturgies that blessed us, informed, renewed our faith, and filled us with joy. Recently we said a fond goodbye to Sharon as she left us to enter into retirement. We welcomed Sylvia Wall as Interim Organist & Choirmaster and a new Choral Scholar, Christian Cortes, a student at East Carolina University. Certain of our Sunday services have been blessed by the musical accompaniment of City Lights Jazz and the Craven Brass Quintet. The Schola Cantorum of the Diocese of East Carolina offered a glorious Choral Evensong.
- A successful Ministry Fair followed our traditional celebration of the Feast Day of St. Mary the Virgin and the beginning to our program year.
- The Worship Commission has met quarterly to plan for each upcoming season.

EYC is also enjoying our new partnership with EYC from Calvary Episcopal Church in Tarboro, NC and are excited to see this friendship blossom over the next year.

There are opportunities throughout the year to serve together, have fellowship together, and learn and grow together. REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMISSION

I am pleased to report that the 2023 Parish Budget is in good shape and on track to finish the year as planned. We have implemented many good disciplines over the past several years that help to ensure fiscal responsibility. This year, we have determined that we need to be proactive in the maintenance and repair of our church property, and have laid out a plan to repair/update items such as the windows, the classrooms and hallways, security, and fire safety, etc. It is our intention to dedicate a larger portion of the budget in the coming years to this discipline of maintenance in order to ensure the condition of our church property for the future.

We continue to meet annually with our Investment Committee and our advisors at Wells Fargo to ensure that our endowments and investments are being managed properly in order to preserve the positive impact they have for our church operations and outreach for the future.

In continuing the plans that our Long Range Planning Committee has diligently spent the past several years working on in order to improve the life, ministry, and outreach of St Mary's Church, we are moving closer to a Capital Campaign in 2024 that would serve to improve the accessibility and handicap access inside of our church and create an updated play space and natural area on the West Lawn. This will be a first step in the larger Long Range Plan that has been created, and we are excited to see this campaign be successful in reaching toward the larger goal.

The goal of Christian stewardship is the faithful management of all that God gives so that God can use our gifts to transform us spiritually and to extend Christ's transforming love to others. There were 101 pledges made in 2023 with a total pledge of \$500,000. To date, there have been 87 pledges turned in totaling \$447,441 for the 2024 budget. It is normal to have pledges continue to come in throughout December and we are hopeful that we will meet our budget numbers from last year. We are continuing to encourage those who have not turned

in pledge cards to do so as part of their personal stewardship practice and for the purpose of completing our 2024 Parish Budget.

It is an honor and a joy to serve this church in the roles of Finance and Stewardship, and I want to thank you for your commitment to this beautiful space and the wonderful people whom it serves.
