Dear friends,

The word "Gospel" comes from the Old English words, "gōd spell," which translate "good news." Yet long before Christianity ever made it to the Anglo-Saxons, the earliest Christians—including the Apostle Paul and the Gospel writers themselves—referred to the message about Jesus as the "good news" or "good message" (the word euangelion in Greek). And certainly the story of God becoming flesh and coming to live among us—to save us from our sins, reconcile us to God, and show us how to live—is good

news. Yet when we read the Gospels themselves, we may notice that Jesus says some things that don't sound particularly good at all. He instructs His disciples to hate members of their own families (Luke 14:26), to act as if they were slaves (Matthew 20:27), and to sell all their belongings and give to the poor (Luke 18:22). He restricts His mission (Matthew 10:6); He speaks of damnation (Matthew 8:12); and He even calls Jews the devil's children (John 8:44). It can be hard to know what to do with passages like this, and our natural tendency is to skip over them in favor of teachings that actually sound to us like good news.

I hope you'll join us for worship starting on June 16, as we embark on the first of two summer series, *Jesus Said What?* Drawing on the work of Jewish New Testament scholar Amy-Jill Levine, we'll explore how these difficult teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how they've been understood over time, and how we might find good news in them after all.

I also encourage you to join us for worship on June 9, as we celebrate the 40th anniversary of Reisterstown United Methodist Nursery School. We'll take the opportunity to give thanks for all that God has done through RUMNS over the past four decades, welcome back some alumni, and welcome a number of current RUMNS students to help lead us in worship. At the same time, we will also recognize our graduates—from our 4-year-old class to RUMC members earning advanced degrees. It will be a joy-filled service that you won't want to miss!

Set against a backdrop of the 1970's Baltimore music scene, this is the story of 23-year-old Margie Stevens as she pulls herself out of a spiraling, heartbreak-induced depression and begins a personal journey of

discovery.

Clarifying her own views on emerging feminism, social injustice, and personal spirituality-all while touring across the country as a singer in King Vido's Swing Band-Margie encounters sexist and moral challenges that cause her to question her future path. Will she redefine her personal values in order to break away from uncomfortable ways of thinking? Will she find the courage to conquer fears of intimidation from the band leader and others on the tour? Finally, will Margie learn to speak up for herself using her authentic voice?



What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.


