Dear RUMC Family,

For centuries, the Christian church has spent the forty days leading up to Easter in a time of spiritual preparation. This season, known as Lent, invites us to walk with Jesus through his final days on earth—examining our own lives in the process, and deepening our connection with God.

On **March 5**, we mark the start of this sacred journey with Ash Wednesday—a service of worship that calls us to confront our own frailty and acknowledge our need for God. We will gather in the sanctuary at **12:00 p.m.** and **7:00 p.m.**, with the 7:00 p.m. service being live-streamed for those who cannot attend in person. As we are marked with crosses of ash, we'll be reminded simultaneously that we are dust and to dust we shall return *and* our God gives grace in abundance.

Throughout Lent, we will also have the opportunity to deepen our experience of Christ's Passion through worship and an accompanying Lenten study, which will be based on Amy-Jill Levine's *Witness at the Cross: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Friday*. Together we will experience the Crucifixion from the perspective of those who witnessed it firsthand: Jesus' mother, Mary; the Beloved Disciple; the Roman soldiers; the two criminals crucified beside Jesus; and others who were present at that pivotal moment in history.

Each witness offers a unique perspective, and I pray that in contemplating their stories, we will experience the depth and power of the Cross in new ways. As we reflect on the words and actions of those who surrounded Jesus in His final hours, we will come away with a renewed understanding of His sacrifice and a greater appreciation of His resurrection. Trustees Update: RUMC Solar Project

In the December newsletter, Pastor Jen shared that our congregation is taking an important step in the stewardship of our resources by transitioning to solar as a renewable energy source. Here are some updates about the progress made to date toward the installation of our solar canopy:

- The contractor completed a GeoTech Report in December to determine the suitability of the soil for the vertical support columns for the solar canopy
- BGE completed a site visit in January to identify the proposed routing of the electrical utilities from the solar canopy and other solar equipment to the BGE interconnect location. We are now waiting for Interconnect permission from BGE.
- The design for the solar canopy has been completed, and the final location has been moved to the first double row of parking spots (the double row of parking spots closest to the cemetery). Originally the design was along the second double row of parking spots (closer to the dumpster). The solar canopy design was changed to take advantage of the shorter distance for the cable runs to the Fellowship Hall and the location



of the BGE interconnect location. The general location of the solar canopy is included.

- TerraSol Energies, our contractor, is in the process of applying for permits through Baltimore County.
- Items requiring long lead-time, such as the solar canopy steel, have been ordered.

In the next month or two, you may see some holes (approximately 8 holes) drilled along the centerline of the parking spots where the canopy will be installed.

The holes will be covered for safety. Also, as the steel for the canopy comes in, it will be stored on the parking lot in a manner to limit the impact to parking.

For those who missed the December newsletter, here are some quick FAQs:

Why did we choose a parking lot canopy vs. rooftop panels?

While our initial conversations were about the installation of rooftop panels, a review of the advantages and disadvantages led the Trustees and Church Council to support the installation of a canopy instead. A canopy will allow for easier maintenance and upgrades as solar technology changes in the coming decades. It will also offer shaded parking and the ability to provide electric car charging stations. Lastly, it means that we will not risk damage to our new sanctuary roof.

How will we pay for the project?

We are blessed to have the Turnbaugh Trust, a generous gift provided by J. Walter and Eleanor Turnbaugh. While the TTT cannot be used for the church's operating expenses, it can fund capital improvements such as this one, as well as projects that align with the mission of RUMC's library. By signing the contract and beginning the permitting process in 2024, we also received access to large state and federal subsidies to offset our cost. The canopy is projected to become cost-neutral in year eight, but funding from the TTT will make it possible for us to see savings in our monthly operating expenses as soon as the project is completed.

How much will we save with this transition to solar?

Initial projections suggest that we will save approximately \$28,000 per year in utility costs. However, the canopy design we have selected will provide more electric energy than our church currently uses. This offers exciting stewardship options going forward, including the potential to move away from gas for heating our buildings to a geothermal heating approach down the road. Ultimately, we could eliminate our dependence on non-renewable energy sources altogether.

FOOD PANTRY HOURS: The Food Pantry is only open on Saturday mornings from 8:30-11 am. No one is allowed in the Food Pantry. Volunteers will bring all the food out to the parking lot for clients. There will be no WaWa food available, however, Panera IS available, WaWa is NOT. At this time we are NOT accepting donations of clothing or household items.

Food pantry immediate needs: 18 oz jars of Peanut Butter and boxes of Mac and Cheese.

Drop off: Saturday mornings between 8:30am-11 am. Also, Sundays in the fellowship hall bin.




The RUMC Book Club will meet March 20th at 7pm in the Church Library.


