I subscribe to Kate Bowler's weekly newsletter, and recently she's written a lot about her study of cultural myths—what people believe about themselves, and how those beliefs can be a help or hindrance to their goals... especially when it comes to change. She points out that we humans love a good transformation story. Whether it's Saul to Paul, or Peter-the-fisherman to Peter-the-head-of-the-church, we latch onto stories that suggest change is instantaneous and profound... leading us to believe that we are always just one podcast, one supplement, or one sleep modification away from being the people we want to be.

She asks the question, "Are we the captains of our fate, one new habit away from turning it all around? Or are we just along for the ride, hoping not to fall off the edge?" (Bowler, 2025). It's a tension that has ancient roots: the Stoics (3rd C. BCE to 2nd C. CE) believed we could will ourselves to be better—master our emotions and prune our desires. By the 4th century, St. Augustine declared that we need divine grace to change at all—a phenomenon that "God works in us, without us."

As United Methodists, our beliefs about transformation fall somewhere in between. We call it "sanctification" and see it as a gradual process that happens over time—a partnership between us and God's Spirit working in us. Podcasts may inspire us, supplements may give us more energy,

and good sleep may give us more bandwidth to confront the challenges of the day, but true, lasting change is rarely dramatic. It most often happens through small, faithful, repetitive acts— a combination of our efforts and God's gracious help.

So this fall, rather than aspiring to a total life-makeover or a habit overhaul, what is one small, faithful thing that you could undertake? What one thing feels possible given the reality of this present time? Maybe it's a daily walk, or a shared meal. A prayer said not for results, but simply for connection with God. Done over time with the help of God's Spirit, that same Holy Spirit works a change in us that may not make the news, but is deeply holy.

As we enter September—and a new school and ministry year—may each of us discover God's presence in the very human yet holy process of *becoming*.

A zany case of mistaken identity allows a lonely old man one last chance to be part of a family.


"Would you mind terribly, old boy, if I borrowed the rest of your life? I promise I'll take excellent care of it."










Create a simple and meaningful prayer box your family can use to share requests and pray together all week long.


What you need:

- Scissors & tape
- Markers or cravons
- Stickers and other craft material (optional)
- Pens or pencils
- Index cards or small pieces of



What you do:

- 1. Wrap the shoebox like a gift, wrapping the lid separately so it can be opened.
- 2. As a family, decorate the box with drawings, favorite Bible verses, photos, or stickers.
- 3. Place the box somewhere central, like the kitchen or living room.
- 4. Keep index cards and pens nearby. When someone has a prayer request, they can write or draw it and drop it in.
- 5. Throughout the week, take turns praying over the requests as a family, or have a parent lead prayer time.

Travel to Turkey, Greece, and Italy with Dr. Michael Gorman April 6 - 19, 2026



From April 6 (Easter Monday) to Sunday, April 19, 2026, Dr. Gorman will once again lead an educational pilgrimage to Turkey, Greece, and Italy to visit places where Paul, John, and other early Christians lived and ministered. E.I. students, alums, and friends are invited to consider going.



Our itinerary includes: Smyrna, Pergamum, Ephesus, Laodicea, Colossae, Hierapolis, and Istanbul in Turkey; Philippi, Thessaloniki, Corinth, Cenchreae, Isthmia, and Athens in Greece; and Pompeii in Italy.



The attached <u>itinerary</u>, <u>reservation form</u>, and <u>brochure</u> provide details on the program, costs, and so on. The price is almost exactly the same as the cost of the last (2024) trip, adjusted for inflation. Once you have committed to going, you need to send a \$20 check to Dr. Gorman to hold your place. The \$500 deposit is due December 11, and the balance on January 30, 2026.

The trip alone is not a course for academic credit. Students who wish to enroll for academic credit should contact Dr. Gorman. Tuition is discounted by 1/3.


