<u>INSTRUCTIONS</u> On Nov 26 and Dec 3, the sanctuary Christmas tree will be decorated with color-coded tags. Find a tag (or tags) with a gift you are willing to purchase, take it off the tree, fill out the bottom section, detach, and place in the basket at the table. Please write legibly so we can track down gifts if needed!

Please return wrapped gift(s) with tag—or unwrapped school donations—no later than Sunday, December 10th to the annex. NOTE: If your gift includes several items, it's very helpful to put all pieces/items in one box or gift bag and attach the tag to the outside of the box/bag.

Monetary donations in offering are also appreciated. Please mark your check or envelope "Adopt-A-Family". The funds will be used first for presents that are not returned, then for gift cards for groceries.

Excerpts from November 14, 2023 Church Board Meeting

Call to order 5:59PM by Moderator Brad Losch. N.D. Harrison gave the opening devotion and prayer. Minutes from the October 10, 2023, meeting were approved by general consensus.

Wayne and Cindy Chamberlain gave a presentation and discussed their recent mission trip to Poland and Ukraine. They discussed their experience while there, provided pictures, and told stories of the families, children, and other missionaries they met while there.

Ministers report was attached.

Michelle Hart submitted a report and Rebecca Rhodes presented information from the report. The total transfer to the building fund in October was \$8,605. Total Funds Available for Construction/Renovation \$1,552,803.80; Total Funds including remaining pledges \$1,605,167.38. YTD Receipts \$414,640.50; YTD Budgeted \$428,220. Average worship attendance through October 31: 244. Leecia Carnes moved to approve the Treasurer's Report and Brandi Pennock seconded. Passed unanimously.

Pastor Michael stated the attendance for our youth at the Soak Service on November 12 was really great. Leecia Carnes pointed out that when she attended two recent 10:30AM services, she was amazed to see how much attendance has grown amongst the youth and that high schoolers are pulling up to church with a carload of other high schoolers.

Kayla stated everything is going well, and she is busy with preparations for Christmas.

Pastor Michael added that the walk-in cooler leak is significant, and needs addressed quickly.

Leecia Carnes informed everyone that some of the outreach ministry will meet Thursday, November 16 in the front room of Cross-roads to work on the tags for our Christmas tree if anyone is interested in helping.

Brad Losch provided a building team update. He stated the southwest exit is now fixed and looks good. The team will take a brief break through the holidays and then get back into working on the project in January.

It was brought up that there are two school events on December 12, 2023, which is the next board meeting. N.D. Harrison made a motion to change the start time of that meeting to 5:00PM instead of 6:00PM. Leecia Carnes seconded the motion. It passed unanimously.

With Helen Earls getting ready to move, the church needed to replace our representative for Unmet Needs. Julie Boren is agreeable to being the new representative. Pastor Michael made a motion to approve Julie Boren as the Unmet Needs representative. N.D. Harrison seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Finally, Pastor Michael updated everyone for Christmas Services. Christmas Eve is on Sunday this year. There will be a regular Sunday morning service at 9:00AM. That will be the only service in the morning. If groups want to have Sunday School too then they can. He stated there will also be the Christmas Eve nighttime service starting at 9:00PM.

The Motion to Adjourn was made by Leecia Carnes and seconded by Brandi Pennock. The motion passed unanimously, and the meeting adjourned at 6:40PM.

The Christmas Tree

It was wonderful to have our kids home for Thanksgiving break. Our quiet house was once again bustling with activity and merriment as we celebrated the long weekend together. Much like she did during her childhood, our youngest was asking daily if we could put up the Christmas tree and the accompanying decorations. Much like years earlier, I responded to her incessant requests with a smirking obtuseness. Near the end of the break, I finally relented to her petitions for festive expression and I left for work.

When I returned home at lunch, the house had been transformed. I examined the tree in all of its glory. It was a menagerie of ornaments that had been both created and acquired over the years, but several of them I had no recollection of. In particular, was a glass whale ornament. I inquired of my wife as to its origin but she was at a loss as well. We both assumed it had been purchased or gifted as a reminder of a vacation to the ocean at some point. Because I had not regularly rehearsed its special nature nor shared it with my family, its meaning and significance had been lost and forgotten.

It got me wondering, how many items or traditions in our church are like that mysterious whale ornament? How many are observed but not understood?

How will the next generation know if we do not share?

One of the beautiful things about the Jewish faith is the instruction to teach the next generation the things of God. The entire book of Deuteronomy is a retelling of the law of Moses and the deeds of God.

Deuteronomy 6:1-7 "Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the rules—that the Lord your God commanded me to teach you, that you may do them in the land to which you are going over, to possess it, 2 that you may fear the Lord your God, you and your son and your son's son, by keeping all his statutes and his commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that your days may be long. 3 Hear therefore, O Israel, and be careful to do them, that it may go well with you, and that you may multiply greatly, as the Lord, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a land flowing with milk and honey.

4 "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. 5 You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. 6 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. 7 You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. ESV

As we enter Advent, I encourage you to take time this year to make some efforts to explain the whys behind so many of the things we do. Those relational connections are invaluable to the continuation of the faith.
