Excerpts from the February 2, 2025 Congregational Meeting

Call to order at 11:45 a.m. by Moderator Kathy Hull. David Bishop opened the meeting in prayer. A quorum of 19 was declared by Rebecca Rhodes, FCC Secretary. The minutes from the November 3, 2024 meeting were read. One correction was made. The minutes with the change were approved unanimously.

Minister's Report: Pastor Michael Ten Eyck thanked the Elders and congregation for stepping up during his health issues in 2024. Members were encouraged to join or begin a small group. The Education Ministry continues to take a look at Sunday School curriculum to make sure Orange meets our goals. The web hosting and financial software is being merged, so there may be some glitches along the way.

Christian Education: The word for 2025 is **Encounter**, to create moments of change in students when they need to be guided back towards God. Volunteers were thanked and are now given an opportunity to refresh and rejuvenate during a one-month break given to them quarterly.

CMF: Congratulations to Steve Tharp as 2024 Man of the Year. There will be a men's retreat in Springfield on March 15. It is also a goal of the group to pair a teen with an adult mentor.

CWF: The group would love to have new members and appreciate those who help with their activities including the Blood Drive and the bereavement dinners. More help is always appreciated.

Crossroads: Use continues to increase.

Property: The pew cushions are in dire need of replacement. If you see something around the properties that needs to be done, please let Pastor Michael know so it can be addressed.

Music: Pastor Michael Ten Eyck, Kathy Curfman and Kay Sealock oversee the music ministry. The 100th cantata will be held in 2025 and there is hope to do something special.

Stewardship Report: Average attendance for 2024 has risen to 250. \$389,290 of the \$542,507 budgeted, which is 71.76%, was spent in 2024. It was explained that administration expenses were under budget because of the lack of additional staff.

Goals for 2025:

- Increase church wide prayer initiatives/ Greater prayer response within services.
- Add more small groups and Bible studies.
- Building project.
- Revise our visitation follow-up ministries (cont.) and create visitation teams.
- Strengthen church community. Promote people to physically come together at dinners, activities and in worship.

• Strategize how to effectively engage the travel ball culture. We must be creative and pray about how to include those who are away because of Sunday activities.

Building Update: A project manager has been hired for our construction. Hamer Tate will be the safety officer. This plan is designed for future expansion but without adding the mechanical parts at this time. The current exposed stained-glass windows will need to be enhanced in order to be up to code. We should have bids for the foundation very soon. **The Plan Going Forward:** The permits and final bids are in the process of being acquired. The goal is for the building to begin in March of 2025 with it being completed by Christmas 2025. The building committee will continue to meet regularly. Jenny Tate asked that members make reservations for dinners in advance to help facilitate the purchase of food.

David Bishop made a motion, seconded by Joyce Lemons, to ratify the action of the board in 2024. Motion carried unanimously.

Adjourn: A motion was made by David Bishop and seconded by Rokettia Brokaw to adjourn. Motion carried. Pastor Michael Ten Eyck closed the meeting in prayer. Linda Belford, Recording Secretary

Dear Church Family,

It is hard to believe that we are already in the second month of 2025. As we enter February, the symbols of love are all around us. While many associate this time of year with chocolates and flowers, the true story of St. Valentine reminds us of a much deeper love—one that is rooted in commitment to God and His people.

St. Valentine was a priest in the early church who lived during a time when Christ-followers faced great persecution. Despite the dangers, he remained faithful in his commitment to the Lord and His church. One of the most well-known stories about St. Valentine is that he continued to perform Christian marriages in secret when the Roman Emperor had outlawed them. This was the origin of the association with love prevalent in this season. He believed in the power of godly commitment—not just in marriage, but also in gathering together as believers, even at great personal risk.

This example reminds us of the importance of staying committed to our faith and to one another. Hebrews 10:24-25 encourages us, saying, "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." Gathering together as a church strengthens our faith, encourages our hearts, and reminds us that we are not alone in our walk with Christ.

In today's world, it is easy to let distractions, busy schedules, and even discouragement keep us from fully committing to our church family. However, God calls us to be steadfast. "Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58). Just as St. Valentine remained firm in his faith despite opposition, we too are called to remain faithful in our commitment to Christ and to gather with fellow believers.

This month, let's remember and reflect on the courage of St. Valentine and the power of commitment. Whether through attending worship services, joining a Bible study or Sunday School class, or simply reaching out to encourage a fellow believer, let's prioritize staying connected in faith through our bonds of commitment to one another. May we be a church that loves deeply, gathers faithfully, and stands strong together in Christ.
