A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



This month, as hard as it may be to believe, we enter into the Lenten season again. As we do so, I want us to focus yet again on our congregational theme: "Reach Out." Lent has traditionally been a time of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving (that is, reaching out). When Jesus addresses these three themes in the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 6, it is interesting to me that he says, "When you fast..." and "When you pray..." and "When you give alms..." He doesn't say, "If you choose to do these things, here's how you do them." Rather, he takes for granted that God's people are going to be about this work of fasting, prayer, and giving.

I don't know about you, but I have a hard time finding the time to do much of anything on top of my already busy schedule. Perhaps you can relate. We have more than enough to keep us busy, don't we? Whether it is work, school, family, friends, leisure activities, or other responsibilities, we hardly need MORE stuff to fill our time. Yet during Lent (and in our lives as disciples in general) there are many opportunities that come our way. God invites us not just to be part of "the club" called church; rather God invites us to live out the love we've been shown by helping others and by deepening our relationship with God. But where do we begin? I suppose we could start in those areas we might think of first—serving at a soup kitchen, donating food and clothing to those who are hungry and cold, or sponsoring a child in a developing nation. Those are all great ways to serve! But there are other ways to start that might be less intimidating. If you can barely find the time to rest, you don't necessarily have to put "building an orphanage" at the top of your discipleship to-do list.

Remember that Jesus is willing to start with you anywhere. He proved that by dying for us, as St. Paul reminds us, while we were still sinners. And now that same love that embraced you at your baptism despite yourself is holding your hand and leading you out into the world to love others with Christ's love. Even if you start small—helping a neighbor in need, showing kindness to those who are mistreated, or inviting a friend to come experience the love of God through this congregation. All of these are ways we can reach out.

In the same way, you need not fast for 40 days in order to deepen your relationship with God. If you want to do so, great! Yet don't discount the difference that small things can make in your relationship with God—set aside a few minutes a day to pray, read your Bible, or just sit in silence and listen to what God might be saying. Small changes in action can have a big effect on your life of faith.

This Lenten season you'll have plenty of opportunities knocking at your door to keep you busy all day, every day. Part of the call to follow Christ is to learn to reprioritize our lives so that they better reflect God's love at work in our lives. During this season of Lent, I challenge you to find one or two new ways you can love others (showing kindness, inviting others to worship, etc.) AND one or two new ways you can nurture your relationship with God (come to the Wednesday midweek meals and services, establish regular prayer/Bible study habits, etc.)

I challenge you in these ways to give God space to grow his life and love in your life. If you accept my challenge and find yourself changing, let me hear about it. I always love to celebrate God's awesome work in our lives! Peace be with you this Lenten season and always!

LENTEN SELF-DENIAL OFFERING FOR 2024

The recipients of this year's Lenten Self-Denial Offerings will be three local organizations that help individuals get back on their feet and become self-sufficient: Homeless No More, The Providence Home, and The Women's Shelter.

Homeless No More offers a spectrum of care – from emergency services to transitional and affordable housing – to keep families together and meet their needs at the right time with the right services. By providing the support to move each family toward a permanent, self-sufficient solution, they work to eradicate family homelessness and help parents and their children achieve lasting independence.

The Providence Home for Men is a Christ-based "place of new beginnings" for men. It offers a temporary home for men in life transitions or recovery. Providence's programs help men renew mind, spirit and body; seek reconciliation with family, friends and neighbors; and reintegrate fully into the community.

The Women's Shelter has been an integral part of the Columbia Community for over 30 years. As a part of the Providence Home Organization from 1976 until 1991, the shelter served homeless men, women, and children in the community. In 1991, The Women's Shelter formed a separate, private nonprofit organization from the Providence Home, in order to carry out a comprehensive ministry specific to homeless women. The changing needs of homeless women have required The Women's Shelter to adapt its programs over the years. They strive to offer more than a bed and something to eat as a means to provide lasting change in the lives of their residents. The Women's Shelter offers a variety of educational and support programs to women and families in need.

Traditionally during Lent we give up material things to focus our attention on God's spiritual gifts and to provide aid to the poor. You will be receiving a special offering envelope in the mail so you can make daily offerings throughout the Lenten season. You are invited to return your offering envelope during Holy Week. Our Lenten Offerings go to local charities that assist homeless individuals and families: Homeless No More, Providence Home for Men, and The Women's Shelter.

ORDER EASTER LILIES BY MARCH 13



LECTIONARY FOR FEBRUARY 2024

FEBRUARY 4 – FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

In Isaiah the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars also strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and service (*diakonia*). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up and healed to serve. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.

FIRST READING – Isaiah 40:21-31

The Judeans in exile have a good reason to be hopeful: the one who will bring them to freedom is the God who created the world, the God who subdues the rulers of the earth and gives strength to those who are weary.

PSALM – Psalm 147:1-11, 20c

The LORD heals the brokenhearted. (Ps. 147:3) **SECOND READING – 1 Corinthians 9:16-23**

God entrusted Paul with the responsibility of bringing the gospel to diverse people. Hence the focus of Paul's ministry is not his own rights or privileges as an apostle but the privilege of serving God by freely sharing the good news of Christ with others.

GOSPEL – Mark 1:29-39

Everywhere Jesus goes, many people expect him to set them free from oppression. Everywhere he goes, he heals people and sets them free. Disease, devils, and death are running for their lives. The forces that diminish human life are rendered powerless by Jesus.

FEBRUARY 11 – TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD

The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

FIRST READING – 2 Kings 2:1-12

Today's reading centers on the transfer of power and authority from the prophet Elijah to Elisha. Their travels, which retrace the path of Joshua back to Moab (the place where Moses died) and the parting of the waters, demonstrate that Elisha and Elijah are legitimate successors of the great prophet Moses.

PSALM – Psalm 50:1-6

Out of Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth in glory. (Ps. 50:2)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

The spotlight of Christian ministry is not on the people who carry out ministry but on the Lord Jesus Christ. Just as God made light shine at creation, God makes the light of Jesus Christ shine in our lives through Christian ministry. **GOSPEL – Mark 9:2-9**

Mark's gospel presents the transfiguration as a preview of what would become apparent to Jesus' followers after he rose from the dead. Confused disciples are given a vision of

God's glory manifest in the beloved Son.

FEBRUARY 18 – FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world. **FIRST READING – Genesis 9:8-17**

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, God destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first

creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures. **PSALM – Psalm 25:1-10**

Your paths, O Lord, are steadfast love and

faithfulness. (Ps. 25:10)

SECOND READING – 1 Peter 3:18-22

As God acted through Christ's suffering and death to bring us to God, so God acts through baptism to save us from a sinful existence. This spiritual cleansing marks our new life in Christ. **GOSPEL – Mark 1:9-15**

The Spirit that comes upon Jesus at his baptism sustains him when he is tested by Satan so that he might proclaim the good news of God's reign.

FEBRUARY 25 - SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

FIRST READING - Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

As with Noah, God makes an everlasting covenant with Abraham and Sarah. God promises this old couple that they will be the ancestors of nations, though they have no child together. God will miraculously bring forth new life from Sarah's womb. The name changes emphasize the firmness of God's promise.

PSALM – Psalm 22:23-31

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD. (Ps. 22:27)

SECOND READING – Romans 4:13-25

Paul presents Abraham as the example for how a person comes into a right relationship with God not through works of the law but through faith. Though Abraham and Sarah were far too old for bearing children, Abraham trusted that God would accomplish what God had promised to accomplish.

GOSPEL – Mark 8:31-38

After Peter confesses his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, Jesus tells his disciples for the first time what is to come. Peter's response indicates that he does not yet understand the way of the cross that Jesus will travel.


