

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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear ones of Good Shepherd,



As we continue through the Lenten season, I want to turn our attention toward Holy Week. When I was growing up at St. John's Lutheran Church in Spartanburg our pastor at that time held services each and every night of Holy Week! We had Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday vespers services. Then we had Maundy Thursday and Good Friday evening worship. Amazingly, many folks showed up each night! Can you imagine that happening today? Well, rest easy because we're not having all of those services here this year.

We will, of course, gather as usual on Sunday, March 24 for Palm/Passion Sunday. Until the middle of the 20th Century, these were two separate services. The 5th Sunday in Lent was Passion Sunday and the 6th Sunday was Palm Sunday. Now that we have grouped them into one service, this Sunday has two very distinctive themes. We begin the service with a procession of palms and gladly shout "Hosanna," which means, "Save us!" Just as Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem gave way to his suffering and death, our joyful entrance into worship quickly gives way to the somber reading of the passion story—the suffering and death of Jesus. This radical shift in tone helps us come to grips with both extremes of our human nature. Those who welcomed Jesus also turned against him. We who praise him also fall short, yet he loves us nonetheless.

Our Holy Week will continue with the observance of Maundy Thursday on March 28. The term "Maundy" comes from the Latin phrase *mandatum novum*, meaning new commandment. Maundy Thursday has several facets for us to ponder. We are, of course, reminded of Jesus' new commandment that we love one another as he has loved us. We also focus on the Lord's Supper and on Jesus' washing of the disciples' feet. This is a day to reflect on the amazing love Jesus has for us that we are called to share with others. We end the service on Maundy Thursday by stripping the sanctuary bare. This somber ritual is always a meaningful experience.

Good Friday, held this year on March 29, is the only day on the church calendar when the church refrains from celebrating Holy Communion. The altar and worship space is stark and bare as we focus on Jesus' all-sufficient sacrifice and death. The cross of Christ takes central focus on this day. The bleakness and solemnity of this service makes for an amazing contrast with the bright radiance of Easter.

Although we don't have an Easter Vigil service on Saturday here at Good Shepherd, that is also a very meaningful service practiced in many congregations. At this service the community gathers outdoors around a bonfire to hear the story of salvation history from scripture. Perhaps some year we will organize such a service here and experience this ancient tradition together.

For now, however, I invite you to make Holy Week a part of your plan this year. It is always a shame to me that some folks come to worship on Palm Sunday to hear shouts of *Hosanna* and come to worship on

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Easter to hear *he is risen*, but never get to experience the story of Jesus' suffering and death that makes Easter morning possible. If you've never come to worship on Thursday and Friday of Holy Week, make this the year that you do so. I assure you that it will be time well-spent and will help you better appreciate your faith and God's love for you. I'll see you in worship!

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GSLC FOUNDATION SUPPORTS LOCAL SERVICES

Your GSLC Foundation awarded 16 grants in 2023 totaling \$46,000. (See complete list in the 2023 Annual Report.) Here is an update on three projects serving people in our community.



South Carolina Lutheran Retreat Centers received \$3,000 for furniture and equipment for the new swimming pool at Camp Kinard in Batesburg-Leesville. The pool has been dedicated and is ready for the many adults and youth who visit Camp Kinard for retreats and conferences and day outings.



Lutheran Services Carolinas operates a day services center for youth in Department of Social Services care. Located next door to Reformation Lutheran Church, the Center provides a safe environment for youth who don't have a place to stay during the day. There were 187 admissions from July to December 2023. With the \$3,000 grant from GSLC, Lutheran Services Carolinas purchased two arcade machines and art supplies. They also took the youth on outings to Eudora Farms, Riverbanks Zoo, the SC State Fair, SC State Museum, and Drew Wellness Center.





Gamecock Lutheran, a campus ministry based at USC, received a \$3,000 grant for support of its Sunday evening programs. About 30 students gather for discussion with Pastor Jesse, fellowship and pizza on Sunday evenings when school is in session.



GSLC Foundation Application Process

The Foundation aims to support more local services for diverse needs. If you're involved with an organization that serves community needs, consider sending them a grant application and offering to serve as the congregational shepherd for their proposed project. Here are the steps:

- Application form may be downloaded from Good Shepherd web site: www.gslc.com/giving/good-shepherd-foundation/. Paper copies are also on the table outside church office.
- Organization completes the application, and the congregational shepherd signs the application to affirm his/her support of the project.
- Application deadline is May 1, 2024.
- Foundation will meet in early May to select applications for award.

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LENTEN SELF-DENIAL OFFERING FOR 2024

The recipients of this year's Lenten Self-Denial Offerings will be three local organizations that help individuals get back on their feet and become self-sufficient: Homeless No More, The Providence Home, and The Women's Shelter.

Homeless No More offers a spectrum of care – from emergency services to transitional and affordable housing – to keep families together and meet their needs at the right time with the right services. By providing the support to move each family toward a permanent, self-sufficient solution, they work to eradicate family homelessness and help parents and their children achieve lasting independence.

The Providence Home for Men is a Christ-based "place of new beginnings" for men. It offers a temporary home for men in life transitions or recovery. Providence's programs help men renew mind, spirit and body; seek reconciliation with family, friends and neighbors; and reintegrate fully into the community.

The Women's Shelter has been an integral part of the Columbia Community for over 30 years. As a part of the Providence Home Organization from 1976 until 1991, the shelter served homeless men, women, and children in the community. In 1991, The Women's Shelter formed a separate, private nonprofit organization from the Providence Home, in order to carry out a comprehensive ministry specific to homeless women. The changing needs of homeless women have required The Women's Shelter to adapt its programs over the years. They strive to offer more than a bed and something to eat as a means to provide lasting change in the lives of their residents. The Women's Shelter offers a variety of educational and support programs to women and families in need.

Traditionally during Lent we give up material things to focus our attention on God's spiritual gifts and to provide aid to the poor. You will be receiving a special offering envelope in the mail so you can make daily offerings throughout the Lenten season. You are invited to return your offering envelope during Holy Week. Our Lenten Offerings go to local charities that assist homeless individuals and families: Homeless No More, Providence Home for Men, and The Women's Shelter.



FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

The GSLC Food Pantry provided food to 33 families in January serving 114 individuals.

- Pastor Andrew can be listed as Good Shepherd's point of contact.

CALLED CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SCHEDULED FOR MARCH 10

On Sunday, March 10, immediately following the 9:30 a.m. worship service there will be a Called Congregational Meeting. The purpose of this meeting is to approve a motion from Congregation Council to replace the roof on the Fellowship Activities Building (FAB) at a cost of \$28,000. Burgin Roofing will be the contractor for this project. Good Shepherd has used Burgin in the past for our roofing needs. They have immediately and professionally responded to any and all roofing issues for our Educational Building and FAB. Their bid includes using the highest quality underlayment material and shingles.



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LECTIONARY FOR MARCH 2024

MARCH 3 - THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The commandments begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods. The Ten Commandments are essential to our baptismal call: centered first in God's liberating love, we strive to live out justice and mercy in our communities and the world.

FIRST READING - Exodus 20:1-17

After escaping from slavery, the Israelites come to Mount Sinai, where God teaches them how to live in community. The Ten Commandments proclaim that God alone is worthy of worship. Flowing from God, the life of the community flourishes when based on honesty, trust, fidelity, and respect for life, family, and property.

PSALM - Psalm 19

The commandment of the LORD gives light to the eyes. (Ps. 19:8)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The word of the cross is pure foolishness and nonsense to the world because it claims that God is mostly revealed in weakness, humiliation, and death. But through such divine foolishness and weakness, God is working to save us. The center of Paul's preaching is Christ crucified.

GOSPEL - John 2:13-22

Jesus attacks the commercialization of religion by driving merchants out of the temple. When challenged, he responds mysteriously, with the first prediction of his own death and resurrection. In the midst of a seemingly stable religious center, Jesus suggests that the center itself has changed.

MARCH 10 - FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

FIRST READING - Numbers 21:4-9

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

PSALM - Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

You deliver your people from their distress. (Ps. 107:19)

SECOND READING - Ephesians 2:1-10

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus. We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith. Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

GOSPEL - John 3:14-21

To explain the salvation of God to the religious leader, Nicodemus, Jesus refers to the scripture passage quoted in today's first reading. Just as those who looked upon the bronze serpent were healed, so people will be saved when they behold Christ lifted up on the cross.

MARCH 17 - FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 31:31-34

The Judeans in Babylon blamed their exile on their ancestors, who had broken the covenant established at Sinai. Here the prophet looks to a day when God will make a new covenant with the people. There will be no need to teach the law, because God will write it on their hearts.

PSALM - Psalm 51:1-12

Create in me a clean heart, O God. (Ps. 51:10)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 5:5-10

Using priestly imagery and references to the Old Testament, the author explains how Christ lived in trusting obedience to God, and so God has made Christ the source of our eternal salvation.

GOSPEL - John 12:20-33

Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time to celebrate the Passover festival. Here Jesus' words about seeds planted in the ground turn the disaster of his death into the promise of a harvest in which everyone will be gathered.

MARCH 24 - PALM SUNDAY

This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 50:4-9a

The image of the servant of God is one of the notable motifs in the book of Isaiah. Today's reading describes the mission of the servant, whom early Christians associated with Jesus. Like Jesus, the servant does not strike back at his detractors but trusts in God's steadfast love.

PSALM - Psalm 31:9-16

Into your hands, O LORD, I commend my spirit. (Ps. 31:5)

SECOND READING - Philippians 2:5-11

Christ did not act to attain status and glory but was obedient to God even to the point of death. Following Christ's example, we do not seek personal status or glory but care for others as God cared for us in Christ's death.

GOSPEL – Mark 14:1—15:47

The passion story in Mark's gospel presents Jesus as one who dies abandoned by all. He shows himself to be the true Son of God by giving his life for those who have forsaken him.

MARCH 31 - RESURRECTION OF OUR LORD:EASTER DAY

Christ is risen! Jesus is alive, and God has swallowed up death forever. With Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, we may feel astonished and confused, unsure of what to make of the empty tomb. But this is why we gather: to proclaim, witness, praise, and affirm the liberating reality of Christ's death and resurrection. In word and feast, we celebrate God's unending love, and depart to share this good news with all the world. Alleluia!

FIRST READING - Acts 10:34-43

Peter crosses the immense religious and social boundary that separates Jews from Gentiles in order to proclaim the good news of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, so that God's forgiveness in Jesus' name would reach out to all people.

PSALM - Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24

This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Ps. 118:24)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

The core of the Christian faith and Paul's preaching is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As the crucified and risen Christ appeared to the earliest of his followers, so we experience the presence of the Risen One in the preaching of this faith.

GOSPEL – Mark 16:1-8

The resurrection of Jesus is announced, and the response is one of terror and amazement.


