SOCIAL MINISTRY GIVING UPDATE

The Social Ministry Committee expresses their appreciation and thanksgiving for the generosity of the Good Shepherd congregation. As a congregation we are very caring and giving. We have helped many people with our gifts.

Through our Monthly Emphasis program, the following organizations have received or will receive gifts:

In January and February, we sent \$1,050 to the **Woodyard Fund** to help supplement people who are unable to pay their heating expenses.

In March, the Lenten Self Denial giving helped **Homeless No More, Providence Home and the Women's Shelter**. Each organization received \$1,126.66 for their programs.

In April we assisted the **Tanzania Task Force**, a **South Carolina Synod** Committee, with a donation of \$750. The Task Force is fundraising to purchase farm equipment for the ladies of the South Western Diocese. This gift will purchase one of the tractor attachments.

In May we sponsored the **Big Red Barn Retreat** programs and services. This center offers programs to Warrior PATHH, for veterans, active-duty service members, and first responders to "Help Heroes Thrive" in the aftermath of their service.

June's Monthly Emphasis is for **Richland County's Project HOPE**. This program assists the elderly in our county. We are assisting them with the summer program to provide fans for heat relief during the hot summer days.

In addition to the monetary giving our committee has many service programs:

The **Food Pantry** collects non-perishable goods to serve the community with food scarcity problems. From January thru April this ministry has served 148 families or 494 individuals. Your donations are greatly appreciated. Donations may be given on Food Pantry Sunday by placing your non-perishable items in the shopping cart in the Narthex. Or you may donate anytime by placing your items in the boxes located near the Chapel area across from the church office door. Anne Rush is the Chair.

Meals on Wheels provides healthy hot lunches to needy people. Currently we have seven people on our route. We have a rotation of Good Shepherd Volunteers who run the routes. Don Caughman is the Chair.

Fun Fridays serves special needs adults with a meal and program on the second Friday of the even months. Volunteers cook the meals and assist with running the activities. Susan Sturkie is the chair.

Ramp Ministry provides disability access ramps for needy individuals. The builds usually occur on Saturday mornings. The group has built over 100 ramps. Currently there are three ramps in the queue. Mike Weaver and Rod Kent are the chairs.

Family Promise serves homeless families. Area churches help to provide meals and activities on a rotating basis. Jim Johnson is the Chair.

The children and youth Sunday School classes choose our **Noisy Offerings** recipients. These recipients usually involve children or animals. The March recipient was the **A.C. Flora Food Pantry** which received \$585.15.

The Noisy offering for this month will go to **Camp Cole**, a camping experience for children and adults with varied health or social issues. Watch for the children at the door with their buckets. Honestly, you cannot miss them.

NOISY OFFERING

The noisy offering donations for the month of June will go to Camp Cole. This is a ministry that was chosen by the Sunday School children. Camp Cole is a local camp in Eastover, South Carolina. The Sunday School children are hoping to help send a child to this camp. The camp has served over 1800 campers to date.



Camp Cole is named in memory of Cole Sawyer, an 11-year-old boy who lost his battle to cancer in 2004. During his battle, Cole and his family were inspired by a local camp that catered exclusively to children with cancer. Cole's experience at the camp made him forget about being sick and remember how to have fun—to laugh, play, and make new friends.

Camp Cole began their ministry in 2021. Their camp serves children and adults with illnesses, disabilities, and life challenges. Among their campers are children who have cancer, Down Syndrome, autism, sickle cell disease, children who are currently experiencing homelessness or are from low-income families, children who are deaf or hard of hearing and individuals experiencing many other life challenges.



Camp Cole exists because of the generosity of individuals, families, businesses, and foundations who understand what the gift of a camp experience can mean to a child, teenager, or adult facing an illness, disability, or life challenge. When every day can be a struggle, Camp Cole gives you a reason to smile. Help us help them!

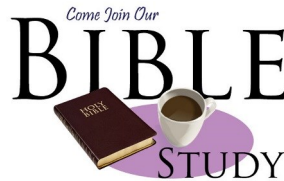

LECTIONARY FOR JUNE 2024

JUNE 2 – SECOND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Deuteronomy makes clear that sabbath-keeping is meant for the welfare of all. God delivered the Israelites out of slavery, so they should observe this freedom with a day of rest. No one should work seven days a week; even slaves and foreigners should be able to rest. Yet human beings can turn even the most liberating religious practice into a life-destroying rule. Jesus does not reject sabbath-keeping, but defends its original life-enhancing meaning. Our worship and our religious way of life are to lead to restoration: the hungry being fed and the sick being healed.

FIRST READING – Deuteronomy 4:12-15

This portion of the Ten Commandments instructs the Israelites to keep the sabbath. The Israelites are to rest, and they are to allow their slaves, their livestock, and the foreigners living among them to do the same. They were once slaves, and so they are to treat their own slaves justly.

PSALM – Psalm 81:1-10

Raise a loud shout to the God of Jacob. (Ps. 81:1)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 4:5-12

When we carry out God's ministry we do so not for our glory but for the sake of Jesus Christ whom we proclaim as Lord. The power for ministry comes from God, not us, so that we persevere no matter what, trusting in God's power and promises at work through us.

GOSPEL – Mark 2:23–3:6

Jesus challenges the prevailing interpretation of what is lawful on the sabbath and tells his critics that the sabbath was made for humankind, not the other way around. Healing the man with the withered hand is work that cannot wait until the next day.

JUNE 9 – THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus makes this observation in light of charges that he is possessed. He is possessed, not by a demon, but by the Holy Spirit. We who have received the Holy Spirit through baptism have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection and knit together in the body of Christ. Those with whom we sing and pray this day are Jesus' family. With them we go forth in peace to do the will of God.

FIRST READING – Genesis 3:8-15

Immediately after Adam and Eve eat the forbidden fruit, they hide from God. Neither takes responsibility for their sin, instead blaming each other, the snake, and even God. The curse on the snake was understood as a messianic prophecy by the early church, who associated Eve's "offspring" with Christ.

PSALM – Psalm 130

Wait for the LORD, for with the LORD there is steadfast love. (Ps. 130:7)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 4:13–5:1

Life in the present is transitory and cannot compare with the eternal home God has prepared for us. So we do not despair no matter what life might bring because we know that as God raised Jesus from the dead, God promises to bring us into eternal life.

GOSPEL – Mark 3:20-35

In response to charges that he is possessed, Jesus wonders aloud how anyone who is demon-possessed can cast out demons. Those who do the will of God are possessed by the Holy Spirit, siblings of Christ.

JUNE 16 – FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

FIRST READING – Ezekiel 17:22-24

Tree imagery is used in a messianic prophecy to tell how the LORD will choose someone from Judah's royal family (the cedar tree) to reign over

all creation. This tree will be planted on Mount Zion, the location of the holy temple.

PSALM – Psalm 92:1-4, 12-15

The righteous shall spread abroad like a cedar of Lebanon. (Ps. 92:12)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 5:6-17

Paul encourages believers to live by faith and not by sight. We do not consider Jesus from a human perspective but through the eyes of faith, believing he died for all and was raised. All who are in Christ are now in God's new creation.

GOSPEL – Mark 4:26-34

Jesus frequently uses parables to teach ordinary people as they are able to hear and understand. Images of sowing and growing show the vitality of God's kingdom.

JUNE 23 – FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation! Now we are in the storm, the boat almost swamped; but Jesus is here now, and when we call him, he will calm the storm. Even the wind and waves listen to him as they would to their creator. We also listen to him and are called to believe in the power of God's word in him, a power greater than all that we fear.

FIRST READING – Job 38:1-11

At the end of the book of Job, after Job and his companions have argued about the cause of the great suffering Job endures, God finally speaks. These verses begin that speech, which is a grand vision of creation, describing God's ordering of the cosmos and inviting Job to marvel at its beauty.

PSALM – Psalm 107:1-3, 23-32

You stilled the storm and silenced the waves of the sea. (Ps. 107:29)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 6:1-13

Paul and his fellow workers experience great hardships and even rejection while carrying out their missionary work. Nevertheless, Paul continuously proclaims that God has not rejected us but is graciously working for our salvation.

GOSPEL – Mark 4:35-41

Jesus' calming of the storm on the sea reveals his power over evil, since the sea represents evil and chaos. The boat on the sea is a symbol of the church and invites us to trust God amid life's turbulence.

JUNE 30 – SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.

FIRST READING – Lamentations 3:22-33

The book of Lamentations is one of our most important sources of information about the fall of Jerusalem to the Babylonians in 587 BCE. Though the people admit that God's judgment was just, today's reading declares a fervent trust that God will not leave them forever.

PSALM – Psalm 30

I will exalt you, O LORD, because you have lifted me up. (Ps. 30:1)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

Paul encourages the Corinthians to honor their commitment to participate in the collection his churches are organizing for the Christians in Jerusalem. He presents Jesus as an example of selfless stewardship and reminds them that Christians have received abundantly so that they can share abundantly.

GOSPEL – Mark 5:21-43

Jairus, a respected leader, begs Jesus to heal his daughter. A woman with a hemorrhage was considered ritually unclean and treated as an outcast. Both Jairus and the unnamed woman come to Jesus in faith, believing in his power to heal and bring life out of death.
