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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Dear Good Shepherd family,

We have started a five-week stretch that makes up one of the longest narrative threads in the lectionary cycle. For five weeks in a row, we will hear different portions of John's version of Jesus' feeding of the 5,000. Those who don't attend worship regularly may notice nothing unusual about this, but those who come each week will likely be a little weary of hearing this story week after week. After all, how much can one say about bread?

But we must bear in mind, this is not a story about ordinary bread. This is a story about Jesus, the bread of life that has come down from heaven! This story—the feeding of the 5,000—is so important, in fact, it is the only miracle story reported in all four gospels. Our focus on John's version of the story over the next month will give us an opportunity to appreciate what makes his version so unique. In John's version, the act isn't called a miracle. Rather, it is called a sign. A miracle is simply a wondrous occurrence. A sign, on the other hand, points beyond itself to a deeper truth. In John's gospel, the miracle of abundant loaves and fish isn't the main point. The miraculous abundance points to a deeper truth: In Jesus, God's abundance is made manifest to the whole world. After all, in John's version, Jesus even says, "I am the bread of life." It's not the physical loaves that matter, it's the true bread from heaven who matters.

So how much can one say about bread? My sarcastic answer is "come each Sunday over the next month and you'll find out!" But my serious answer is this: "One can never say too much about the true bread from heaven—Jesus Christ." In all seriousness, *do* come over the next month. Come and hear about the bread that has come down from heaven to give us life. Come and receive that bread as we share worship and the communion meal together. As St. Augustine used to say to his congregation before the communion meal: "Behold what you are; become what you receive." In the meal we share, we are made into the body of Christ for the sake of the world. So come, eat, and live.



COME AND SEE SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS THE CHOSEN

For the fall Sunday School season beginning
September 15, the Come and See Sunday School
class will begin an interactive Bible Study of
Season 1 of the popular streaming television
series *The Chosen*. The study will be based on the
official study guide entitled *What Does It Mean to Be Chosen?* coauthored by Amanda and David
Jenkins, creators of *The Chosen* series. You can

The Chosen is a unique historical drama series based on the earthly ministry of Jesus with a special focus on select characters and their personal interactions with Jesus and with each other.

This will be a 9-week study beginning with an Introduction to introduce the main characters and to review Old Testament Messianic prophesies and then 8 weeks to parallel each episode of season 1. If the class chooses, we will continue the study of the next 3 seasons to include all 32 episodes. The class discussion will be facilitated by Mark Lovern and Bruce Shealy.

Participants are asked to view each episode prior to the group discussion. Episodes are available on streaming TV via *The Chosen* app. Episodes also can be viewed on a PC or smartphone by searching for *The Chosen*.

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LECTIONARY FOR AUGUST 2024

AUGUST 4 – ELEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Apparently not satisfied by Jesus' feeding of thousands, some who were there press him for a sign of his power; perhaps it is daily manna they want. As always in John's gospel when people want a sign, Jesus offers himself. He is the bread come from heaven to give life to the world. He calls us to come to him and believe in him, and through that relationship to know the one who sent him.

FIRST READING - Exodus 16:2-4, 9-15

A food crisis becomes a faith crisis for the Israelites in the wilderness. The hungry people forget God's saving work in the exodus, and they wish for the food they had in Egypt.

Nevertheless, God miraculously meets their needs, with manna for bread and quail for meat.

PSALM - Psalm 78:23-29

God rained down manna from heaven; so mortals ate the bread of angels. (Ps. 78:24, 25)

SECOND READING – Ephesians 4:1-16

Christians share fundamental unity and diversity. Our unity consists in the one body, one Spirit, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God. Our diversity is expressed in various forms of ministry whose goal is equipping the saints and building up Christ's one body.

GOSPEL - John 6:24-35

Many of the five thousand people Jesus fed in the wilderness continued to follow him throughout the countryside. Jesus challenges them to consider the real nature of their quest.

<u> AUGUST 11 – TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Jesus says that the bread he gives for the life of the world is his flesh, and whoever eats this bread has eternal life now and will be raised on the last day. In Ephesians Paul tells us what this life Jesus gives us looks like, this life we live as those marked with the seal of the Holy Spirit in baptism. We live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us. The whole purpose of life is giving yourself for the other.

FIRST READING - 1 Kings 19:4-8

First Kings chapter 18 describes the contest between Elijah and the prophets of Baal. The contest proves that the LORD is God, and afterward Elijah orders the killing of the Baal prophets. Angered by the deaths of her prophets, Queen Jezebel threatens to kill Elijah. This reading finds Elijah fleeing, fatigued, and in utter despair.

PSALM - Psalm 34:1-8

Taste and see that the LORD is good. (Ps. 34:8)

SECOND READING - Ephesians 4:25-5:2

Christians are called to be imitators of God. This does not mean Christians are perfect. Rather, the Spirit is at work in our lives so that our actions and attitudes genuinely reflect the love and forgiveness we have received through Christ and his death.

GOSPEL - John 6:35, 41-51

After feeding more than five thousand people in the wilderness, Jesus teaches them regarding the true significance of this remarkable sign.

AUGUST 18 – THIRTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Wisdom prepares a feast, sets her table, and invites all to come and eat her bread and drink her wine. The first chapter of John's gospel owes much to the biblical tradition that imagined Wisdom as existing before anything was created and having a role in the work of creation. Christ, the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:24), today invites us to eat his flesh and drink his blood. John's gospel includes no account of the institution of the Lord's supper, but here we can't help hearing Jesus' words as an invitation to the meal of bread and wine we share.

FIRST READING - Proverbs 9:1-6

Wisdom is portrayed as a woman who invites people to partake of her banquet. Just as ordinary food is necessary for physical life, Wisdom's food—insight and understanding—is necessary for fullness of life with God. Partaking of Wisdom's banquet is the way to life.

PSALM - Psalm 34:9-14

Those who seek the LORD lack nothing that is good. (Ps. 34:10)

SECOND READING – Ephesians 5:15-20

True wisdom integrates our new reality in Christ with our Christian fellowship and daily conduct. Because we are filled with the Spirit, Christians regularly rejoice together, give thanks to God for one another, and care for one another. In this way we revere our Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL – John 6:51-58

In John's gospel, the feeding of the five thousand leads to extended teaching in which Jesus identifies himself as the true "bread of life." Finally, in these verses, he makes a connection that would not be understood until after his death, in light of the church's celebration of holy communion.

AUGUST 25 – FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

In today's gospel many people take offense at Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh and drink his blood; even many of Jesus' disciples peel off. This is the backdrop in John's gospel for Peter's confession of faith. "To whom can we go?" asks Peter, in words we sometimes sing just before the gospel is read. "You have the words of eternal life." In order to take such a stand, as Peter and Joshua did, Paul tells us to arm ourselves with the word of God. We pray in the Spirit that we might be bold ambassadors of the gospel.

FIRST READING - Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18

In the Near East, covenant means "agreement" or "alliance." It describes relationships and is the primary word used to characterize the relationship between God and Israel. By delivering Israel, God has already begun the relationship. Joshua calls upon the people to respond.

PSALM - Psalm 34:15-22

The eyes of the LORD are upon the righteous. (Ps. 34:15)

SECOND READING - Ephesians 6:10-20

Like a general giving a rousing speech to troops before battle, this letter closes by calling on Christians to be equipped for spiritual warfare against evil. The full armor of God includes truth, righteousness, peace, faith, the gift of salvation, and the word of God inspired by the Spirit.

GOSPEL - John 6:56-69

The "hard saying" that offends Jesus' disciples is his claim that his followers must eat his flesh and drink his blood. The followers who return to their old lives know something about how odd this sounds. Simon Peter, on the other hand, knows something about the scarcity of living, gracious words. He asks the most important question: "To whom shall we go?"


