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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Dear Good Shepherd family,

As we enter a new calendar year together, I pause to reflect on how far we've come together. Five years ago, I was writing my first January newsletter article to you all. Four years ago, we were in the throes of the Covid-19 pandemic and endured many chilly morning worship services in our parking lot together. For the past three Januarys, we've been back indoors together and spent the month of January preparing for our congregational retreats—a feat that seemed impossible in January of 2021!

Of course, there have been many other events and milestones in our time together as pastor and people so far. My first January with you all was a time of excitement as we got to know each other. It was a time of learning for us all and it was a time filled with hope of possibilities—a hope that seemed to be dashed just a couple of months later when we were fated to endure Covid restrictions. The next few years were a time of rebuilding and maintaining a sense of normalcy and stability. We should give thanks for the ways that we have been able to be together and do ministry during this time. The blessing of sharing life, worship, and ministry together should never be taken for granted again.

All that being said, I believe we are at a crossroads as a congregation. We are keenly aware that we are not the same congregation we were five years ago; we are certainly not the same congregation we were fifteen or twenty years ago, and yet we continue in many ways to operate as if we were. Further, we are all aware of changes not only to our church, but to our culture at large—changes that were well underway in the years leading up to the pandemic, but changes which the pandemic accelerated. This includes things like a decrease in church affiliation and attendance, a higher reliance on technology, lessening social and personal connections, and changing priorities. In short, our congregation (like many congregations across many denominations) has continued to try to engage culture the same way we did twenty years ago and have observed diminishing returns on our investments. If good worship, engaging programs, and abundant activities were still sufficient to grow a congregation, we would be seeing the results. Instead, we've seen a decades-long gradual decline in growth. We are not unique in this regard. Other churches and indeed other civic organizations have experienced these shifts, as well.

We are at a crossroads. We can choose to stay on the same path and hope that the path we've been on will lead us where we hope to go despite all signs pointing to the contrary, or we can choose to make some changes. At our January council retreat, I will be addressing this topic with our new council. Together with our staff, the council and I will be working to blaze a new path forward for the congregation. We are blessed to have found some stability post-Covid. That is better than many congregations can say, but it is no longer sufficient. If we are content with standing still, we will fade into irrelevance.

What will this new path look like? It could mean some changes need to be made. We may have to let go of (Continued on page 3)

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some things that no longer bear fruit. The good news is we've already done some of this by choice or because Covid forced our hand, so we're not strangers to this sort of adaptive change. We may also have some exciting new opportunities—again, this has been the case already in our life together and I expect that to continue.

I will lead the council and congregation as we evaluate ways to be more intentional about our life and ministry together. I don't have all the answers, but some markers along such a path toward growth and renewal may look like a greater commitment to individual discipleship—following Jesus' ways and really practicing what we preach: they will know we are Christians because we actually follow and imitate Jesus. Such a new path may look like a greater sense of engagement with our neighbors: they will know we are Christians because we walk together with others hand-in-hand, knowing that we need others as much as they need us. It may look like growing even deeper in relationships not only with Christ and our neighbors, but with one another: they will know we are Christians by our love for one another.

Some of this may be "getting back to the basics" of our faith and life together—the church of yesteryear that many of us knew and loved thrived during a time when it enjoyed a place of priority and privilege in culture and in people's lives. Life and culture have changed and we no longer have those advantages that served the church of the 20th Century so well. Yet we do have one thing we've never lost: The presence and power of Christ in our midst. We are going to learn together what it means to follow Christ into new and abundant life this year and beyond. I ask for your prayers, your ideas and dreams, and your support as we take this journey together. I ask you to follow me as your leader during this exciting, but uncertain time. When you called me as pastor, you all sent a clear message: We're ready to move forward. When Covid struck, you sent a clear message: We need to hold together what we can. Now, by how you live and love, send a clear message: We're ready to move forward again.


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UNCLE DON

If you've ever been in church to hear a booming voice reading a lesson from the pulpit, you are familiar with someone who is a loyal, dedicated member of Good Shepherd and a faithful man of Christ, Don Caughman.

Don began his journey at Good Shepherd on December 8, 1974, recently celebrating his 50th anniversary at our church. Don grew up going to church, but as many people do, he drifted away when he reached college. When he was in his late 20's, a friend of his had their baby baptized at Good Shepherd, and Don was asked to be their sponsor. He decided to come back for another visit a couple of weeks later, and Pastor Clark contacted him later asking if he would be interested in transferring his membership to Good Shepherd. Don did so, but was not terribly involved in



the church at the beginning. Soon after he joined, Carol Mayfield, a devoted member of Good Shepherd, invited Don to Sunday School, which started a snowball effect that led to more and more involvement for him in the Good Shepherd congregation.

During the 1980s Don helped start a Clown Ministry. When Don first heard about Clown Ministry, he found it odd and questioned its efficacy. Upon further examination, he found that dressing up and miming stories and parables was a creative and effective way to spread the word of God. He, along with Nancy Hyatt and other members of the congregation, started the Clown Ministry at Good Shepherd, traveling to other churches to tell stories and teach others about the Bible. Don recalls having an especially fun time recreating the story of the Good Samaritan at a deaf church, saying "It was the most positive response that we had ever gotten."

Behind the scenes, many may not know all that Don has contributed through the years. The fresh coffee that's ready for everyone to enjoy on their stroll to Sunday School? Don takes care of that, and he also cleans the carafe each week. Many youth members of Good Shepherd through the years have enthusiastically checked their mailboxes at every holiday for cards from "Uncle Don," who has served as a Splash sponsor for many children upon their baptisms and continues leading them through their faith journeys for years beyond. Don has worked as a Sunday School teacher and youth leader for many years as well. Our mother, Stacy (Sox) Gross has fond memories of her time in Don's Sunday School classes, saying, "I remember as a teenager being so excited when it was time for Don to teach our classes. He always seemed to be able to relate to us and had a gift for making Scripture relatable to our lives."

Don believes that he has always been called to work with the youth, stating, "I do think that was a calling. I don't know why, and when you get called to things, when you think it's God calling, that's where you should be headed in your life." He says that he has always felt comfortable spending time with the youth, even when people thought he was crazy for volunteering to oversee 7th and 8th graders.

When asked about the changes in the church over time, Don talks about how people have become less


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involved as time has passed, whether their calendars are filled with other obligations or they have simply drifted away. However, he hopes that some of these members will find their way back to Good Shepherd and make it more of a focal point in their lives.

Don's presence and support has led many people through their faith journeys, and he has touched many hearts with his unwavering faith. Since we were babies, "Uncle Don" has been there to guide us through our faith journeys. He has been a constant source of support and encouragement for us in our lives in and outside church. How lucky is the Good Shepherd congregation to have a steadfast, faithful member to lead

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FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

The Good Shepherd Food Pantry provided food in November for 42 families serving 143 individuals.

The Good Shepherd Food Pantry provided food in December for 27 families serving 92 individuals.

Social Ministry Monthly Emphasis

The Woodyard Fund is the Social Ministry emphasis for January at Good Shepherd. A joint project of The State newspaper and The Salvation Army, the Woodyard Fund helps residents in crisis in Richland, Lexington, Newberry and Fairfield counties pay utilities bills. Applicants are vetted and must meet certain criteria to receive aid. Eligible households get vouchers redeemable at businesses that provide heating services. The Salvation Army reimburses the businesses for the voucher amounts. The fund dates to 1816, when the Ladies Benevolent Society provided firewood and coal to families in need in Columbia. In 1930, The State newspaper began publicizing the fund each winter. Good Shepherd has supported the fund for many years. For the last 2 years, we have donated over \$2,400 to the fund. If you'd like to support this effort, you may contribute any time during January by putting your donation in the offering plate on Sunday mornings, or by sending it to the church office. Checks should be made payable to Good Shepherd and designated for The Woodyard Fund.

NOVEMBER MONTHLY EMPHASIS UPDATE

The "Monthly Emphasis" for November was the Angel Food Pantry at the VA Dorn Medical Center. A generous donation of \$790 was received to help support the Food Pantry. Cathy Milejczak shopped for the food items to be donated with the help of JP, the grocery manager at Publix at Trenholm Plaza. The items were delivered to the VA's volunteer center and received by Shannon Stone, Voluntary Service Specialist with Veterans Health Administration. The donated items will serve veterans coming to the Dorn Center and the homeless veterans in the area. Shannon was very excited about the items we delivered as it included many of the favorites items the veterans like!

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LECTIONARY FOR JANUARY 2025

January 5 - Second Sunday of Christmas

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

First Reading - Jeremiah 31:7-14

God promises to bring Israel back to its land from the most remote parts of exile. In Zion Israel will rejoice over God's gift of food and livestock. Young women will express their joy in dancing; God will give gladness instead of sorrow.

Psalm - Psalm 147:12-20

Worship the LORD, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion. (Ps. 147:12)

Second Reading - Ephesians 1:3-14

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made know as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

Gospel - John 1:1-18

John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

January 12 - Baptism of Our Lord

Today's festival rejoices in God's blessings. We recall and celebrate our adoption as God's children, the gift of the Holy Spirit, and the promised company of almighty God when we "pass through the waters . . . the rivers . . . fire." On this day the heavens open again for this assembly, and we receive the gift of God's Beloved, Jesus, in bread and wine.

First Reading - Isaiah 43:1-7

Near the end of Israel's exile in Babylon, God promises to bring the people home. They need no longer be afraid, because the one who formed, created, and called them by name now redeems them from all their enemies. God declares them precious and honored, and God loves them.

Psalm - Psalm 23

The voice of the Lord is upon the waters. (Ps. 29:3)

Second Reading – Acts 8:14-17

Peter and John are sent to support the new Christians in Samaria, a group that was recently baptized after hearing the good news of Christ through the preaching of Philip. Here the Samaritans receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in the laying on of hands.

Gospel - Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

The reading opens with questions about the identity of the Messiah. John the Baptist insists that he is not the Messiah; instead he points ahead to one who is coming. And whether the voice of God was heard by all or only by Jesus, God settles the matter: Jesus is God's beloved Son.

January 19 – Second Sunday after Epiphany

The Sundays after Epiphany continue to celebrate the revelation of God's glory to us as it was made known to the magi and to those on Jordan's banks at Jesus' baptism—today using wedding imagery. Our God rejoices over God's people as those being married rejoice over one another. By the power of the Spirit there are gifts galore for everyone. In Christ Jesus the best wine is saved for last. Taste and see.

First Reading – Isaiah 62:1-5

The people's return to Judah after the exile was marred by economic and political troubles. Nevertheless, the prophet declares, Jerusalem and Judah will be restored. God will rejoice over Jerusalem as a bridegroom rejoices over the bride, and the people are called to the celebration.

Psalm - Psalm 36:5-10

We feast upon the abundance of your house, O Lord. (Ps. 36:8)

Second Reading - 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

The congregation at Corinth experienced division as people were comparing their spiritual gifts, thinking some to be superior to others. Paul invites this fractured community to trust that God's Holy Spirit has gifted them all perfectly for their mission together.

Gospel - John 2:1-11

Turning water to wine at the wedding at Cana is described as the first of Jesus' signs. Through many such epiphanies, Jesus reveals that he bears God's creative power and joyful presence into the world.

January 26 - Third Sunday after Epiphany

God's glory is revealed in the reading of scripture. People stand at attention. People weep. People prostrate themselves in prayer. The unity of the church is another reflection of God's glory. Most gloriously, the promises of God are fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. Gather round. Listen up. Glimpse the glory of God.

First Reading - Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

The exiles have returned and rebuilt Jerusalem. Now Ezra, the priest, reads the law of Moses to them in the public square. When they hear it, they weep for their sins and for the long years in exile, but Ezra reminds them that "the joy of the LORD is your strength."

Psalm – Psalm 19

The teaching of the LORD revives the soul. (Ps. 19:7)

Second Reading – 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

The apostle and pastor Paul uses the metaphor of the human body to describe how intimately connected we are in the church. For this struggling congregation in Corinth, Paul delivers a vital message of unity that is a mark of the church today.

Gospel - Luke 4:14-21

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits his hometown of Nazareth. In the words of Isaiah, he states and claims his identity, purpose, and mission.


