A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Some of my earliest memories of church involve singing the liturgy. I don't remember a time when I didn't know the words, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me," or "This is the feast of victory for our God," or "Alleluia, Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." If you're a long-time Lutheran like me or even if you're a new Lutheran and have been paying attention in worship, you likely just sang those words along with me in your head as you read them. We have a wonderful tradition in Lutheran worship of setting words of scripture to worshipful tunes.

The last song I mentioned above is one of our gospel acclamations. It comes from Simon Peter's words to Jesus in John chapter 6. When Jesus notices that many have abandoned him because his teachings are too difficult to follow, he asks Peter and the other 11, "You don't wish to go away, too, do you?" Simon Peter answers him, "Lord, to whom would we go? You have the words of eternal life!"

We read that phrase. We say it. We even sing it. But do we live it? There are many words we read, hear, and use in our lives. Many words in our public discourse right now are vitriolic and ugly words. Many words are not life-giving, they are life-taking and life-threatening. Many words are not words of eternal life, they are words of condemnation and death. I don't know about you, but I find it difficult sometimes to function, much less thrive, in an environment surrounded by so many distasteful and discouraging words. These words are on the news and on our streets. They are words foreign and domestic; words Republican and Democrat. Many voices from many places compete to reach our ears and our brains and our hearts.

To whom shall we go?

This season of Epiphany is called Epiphany because during this time we focus on ways that Jesus reveals himself to the world. Epiphany means appearance or manifestation. In short, this season we focus on how Jesus makes himself manifest to all of creation. Some weeks we focus on his ministry and miracles, but we also focus on his teachings and his words. Over the next few weeks we will focus on his words and see how they are a challenge in some ways, but also how they are words of eternal life.

Jesus gives us words that truly matter and words that call us beyond the petty discourse and hateful dialogue we often hear in the world. We will hear words like:

"Love your enemies; do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you; pray for those who mistreat you."

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God.
Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.
Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh."
"But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. Woe to you who are full now, for you will be hungry.
Woe to you who are laughing now, for you will mourn and weep."

You see, the words of Jesus are indeed words of eternal life. They are words that call us beyond the rancor and small-mindedness we so often see at work in the world. These words of Jesus call us to love, to bless, and to embrace one another and our neighbors with the same love Jesus has shown to us. So, if like me you shake your head at the vanity and violence we often see and hear around us, take heart and open your ears to hear and heed the words of Jesus—words of eternal life for us all. Let's listen and follow him together, showing the world that there is more to life than they often know or hear.





75TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION of CHARTER SIGNING

Sunday, February 9, 2025 9:30 a.m. – Worship service

After meeting in the home of Frank and Margaret Leaphart in late 1949, Good Shepherd Evangelical Lutheran Church was officially organized on February 5, 1950, with the signing of the charter by 65 members. Worship was held in the Carolina Children's Home Chapel.

We look forward to celebrating the 75th anniversary of this occasion on Sunday, February 9. ALL MEMBERS are encouraged to attend and invite family and friends to join us for this occasion. Light refreshments will be served immediately following the service.

Through a grant from the Good Shepherd Foundation, the 75th Anniversary Task Force is providing two items to commemorate this special time in the life of our congregation. A booklet has been compiled giving a brief history of Good Shepherd and a specially designed vinyl sticker. The booklet includes photographs taken by various members, with special attention and explanation of the stained glass windows. The stickers can be used to expose GSLC to the community, welcoming everyone to join with us. Social Ministry Monthly Emphasis

The Woodyard Fund will continue to be the Social Ministry emphasis at Good Shepherd for February. A joint project of The State newspaper and The Salvation Army, the Woodyard Fund helps residents in crisis in Richland, Lexington, Newberry and Fairfield counties pay utilities bills. Applicants are vetted and must meet certain criteria to receive aid. Eligible households get vouchers redeemable at businesses that provide heating services. The Salvation Army reimburses the businesses for the voucher amounts. The fund dates to 1816, when the Ladies Benevolent Society provided firewood and coal to families in need in Columbia. In 1930, The State newspaper began publicizing the fund each winter. Good Shepherd has supported the fund for many years. If you'd like to support this effort, you may contribute any time during February by putting your donation in the offering plate on Sunday mornings, or by sending it to the church office. Checks should be made payable to Good Shepherd and designated for The Woodyard Fund.

LECTIONARY FOR FEBRUARY 2025

FEBRUARY 2 – FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

The glory of God is often revealed when and where it is least expected. God uses our lips to declare that glory, inexperienced and hesitant though they may be. God uses our love to demonstrate that glory and so urges us to exercise it. God uses Jesus of Nazareth, water and the word, bread and wine, to reveal God's glory where and when God chooses. Take heed, lest the glory of God slip through our midst unnoticed.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 1:4-10

God calls Jeremiah to be a prophet and consecrates him in the womb. Jeremiah's task is to preach God's word amid the difficult political realities of his time, before the Babylonian exile. He is to make God known not only to Judah, but also to the nation

PSALM - Psalm 71:1-6

From my mother's womb you have been my strength. (Ps. 71:6)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Christians in Corinth prided themselves on their spiritual gifts. Paul reminds them that God gives us many gifts through the Holy Spirit, but the purpose behind all of them is love, the kind of love that God showed us in Jesus Christ

GOSPEL - Luke 4:21-30

People in Jesus' hometown are initially pleased when he says that God will free the oppressed. Their pleasure turns to rage when he reminds them that God's prophetic mission typically pushes beyond human boundaries so that mercy and healing are extended to those regarded as outsiders.

FEBRUARY 9 - FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

The fifth Sunday after Epiphany continues to highlight unlikely instruments and circumstances appointed to reveal God's glory. "Who will go for us?" God asks. A person of unclean lips, a former persecutor of the church of God, and three fishermen who couldn't catch a thing. More surprising still, perhaps, is that we are also called.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 6:1-13

Through a vision in the temple, the eighth-century prophet Isaiah is called by God to announce judgment against Israel. Aware of his sinfulness and shortcomings, Isaiah is initially hesitant. But when God calls, Isaiah responds, "Here am I; send me!"

PSALM - Psalm 138

I will bow down toward your holy temple. (Ps. 138:2)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Paul delivers in a nutshell the story of the gospel that was given to him. In the lineage of the Christian faith, we have received the good news of God's love from generations of believers before us, and we continue to tell this story to the world.

GOSPEL - Luke 5:1-11

Jesus' teaching of God's word has begun to draw great crowds. For Simon, James, and John, Jesus' teaching inspires hospitality, then obedience, and then risk. After Jesus' creative power is revealed, fear and amazement leads these three fishermen to leave everything behind to become apostles.

FEBRUARY 16 - SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

Blessings and curses abound on the sixth Sunday after Epiphany. We would do well to listen closely to whom the "blessed ares" and the "woe tos" are directed and to find our place in the crowd among those who desire to touch Jesus. The risen Christ stands among us in the mystery of the holy supper with an invitation to live in him, and offers power to heal us all.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 17:5-10

These verses compose a poem that is part of a larger collection of wisdom sayings that contrast two ways of life. Life with God brings blessing; the power and vitality of God is active in our life. Life without God brings a curse, the power of death.

PSALM - Psalm 1

They are like trees planted by streams of water. (Ps. 1:3)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:12-20

For Paul, the resurrection of Christ is the basis for Christian hope. Because Christ has been raised, those who are in Christ know that they too will be raised to a new life beyond death.

GOSPEL - Luke 4:21-30

After choosing his twelve apostles, Jesus teaches a crowd of followers about the nature and demands of discipleship. He begins his great sermon with surprising statements about who is truly blessed in the eyes of God.

FEBRUARY 23 – SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

Mercy. Mercy. Mercy. Joseph lives it in Egypt. Jesus preaches it in the gospel. The Spirit guides us into merciful lives with the power of forgiveness to reconcile what is fractured and divided. Such merciful living is the baptismal blessing of having put on Christ. It is the gift of the lifegiving Spirit. It is a reflection of God's glory revealed in Christ.

FIRST READING - Genesis 45:3-11, 15

Many years after being sold into slavery by his jealous brothers, Joseph reveals himself to them. Now the second-in-command in Egypt, Joseph reassures his brothers that God has used their evil intentions for good to preserve life during a devastating famine, and Joseph forgives them.

PSALM - Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40

The lowly shall possess the land; they will delight in abundance of peace. (Ps. 37:11)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

In the Apostles' Creed, we speak of the "resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting." Using the metaphor of a planted seed and the story of Adam, Paul preaches passionately about the mystery of following Christ's perfect life into eternity

GOSPEL - Luke 6:27-38

Jesus continues to address a crowd of his disciples. He invites his followers to shower radical love, blessing, forgiveness, generosity, and trust even on enemies and outsiders. Living in harmony with God's intent brings the reward of overflowing blessing
