A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Where do we go from here?

That's the question that every congregation is wrestling with today. We are living in a world that seems to be increasingly post-modern, post-Covid, and post-Christian. It can feel like we are destined to fade into irrelevance.

The good news is that in every age, God has called the church to be renewed and to reimagine what we are called to do and be. Jesus himself came into the world during

what must have seemed a hopeless time: Rome ruled the world; it had been ages since any prophets had spoken, and God's promises seemed far from being fulfilled. Yet Jesus came and changed the world, working with the few who were ready to begin something new. He taught that one cannot put new wine into old wineskins; the wineskins may burst and the wine spills. He knew that many were not ready to make the changes necessary to embrace his gospel message. But he didn't let that resistance stop the mission at hand.

That messianic age must have seemed so short for the first disciples. They had Jesus with them for three years of ministry and then he was gone—raised from the dead and ascended. They were then left with the guidance of the Holy Spirit to figure out how to be the church and spread the gospel. It wasn't easy or obvious, but they began a church that has lasted for 2,000 years and counting and has been handed down to us.

Many church strategies and plans are based on following the maps and using the tools we used in the past few decades. Maybe these sound familiar: Have activities and programs for each age group, attract lots of young families and children, hire a big staff, build a top-notch facility, and have a bus or a fleet of buses to transport people to exciting places for fun activities. These models and strategies served the church well during much of the mid to late 20th century. Good Shepherd's past includes many of these things.

So why aren't these same strategies working for us anymore? Because there has been a huge cultural paradigm shift. The factors that helped the church grow and thrive 50 years ago don't exist anymore. What can we do about this? We must make a shift in our thinking and strategizing. The 20th century church was successful precisely because it was often able to make this shift. Folks in culture and society needed a sense of duty, belonging, activity, and stability in their lives in particular ways. That's why in this era clubs, civic organizations, and churches thrived. Churches that thrived then were churches that modernized to meet the needs of the community.

Now, many churches that struggle are churches that have not yet modernized again to meet the current needs of the community. This trend is nothing new. Martin Luther's Reformation, aside from being an effort to reduce corruption, was in large part an adaptation to a new and modern era happening in Europe at that time. We can see this pattern play out throughout history. The world changes and the church adapts and finds its calling to serve and love the world as it exists in each era.

To that end, I suggest we look to the first century church for some ideas and inspiration. That may sound strange, but in many ways our world today resembles the age in which the church was initially started. The apostles had to take the message of Jesus to a world either ambivalent or hostile to that message. They had to meet the needs of suffering folks with the love and care of Christ. They had to use modern methods and technology—Roman roads, the Greek language, which was the world-wide language of commerce at that time, modern sailing ships, and so on. But they also gathered around simple elements that everyone


needs: bread and wine and water. And using these tools, both simple and modern, they reshaped the world with a radical message of God's love and grace. We can do the same in our world today, but we must be willing to reimagine and engage the world in a new way.

The first phase of this visioning and revitalization of our congregation will start with prayer and study. Join me each week as we read through the book of Acts and study the strategies the early church used and how we can adapt these to our own day and age.

Study sessions will begin Tuesday, April 8 at our normal Bible study times: 11:30 AM on Tuesdays and 8:00 AM via Zoom on Wednesdays. I will also make a weekly study snippet available via email each week, so look for that in your inbox.

God is calling us to grow into the future God has for us. Join me on this journey.

SOCIAL MINISTRY MONTHLY EMPHASIS






We continue to celebrate our 75th anniversary year, reminiscing and sharing memories of Good Shepherd's history.

LECTIONARY FOR APRIL 2025

<u>APRIL 6 – FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT</u>

Our God makes all things new. In the first reading God promises it. In the gospel Mary anticipates it, anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume in preparation for the day of his burial. In the second reading Paul recalls his transformation from the persecutor Saul into an apostle. In baptism, God's new person (you!) rises daily from the deadly mire of trespasses and sins.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 43:16-21

The prophet declares that long ago God performed mighty deeds and delivered Israel from Egyptian bondage through the waters of the sea. Now, God is about to do a new thing, bringing the exiles out of Babylon and through the wilderness in a new Exodus.

PSALM – Psalm 126

Those who sowed with tears will reap with songs of joy. (Ps. 126:5)

SECOND READING – Philippians 3:4b-14

Writing to Christians in Philippi, Paul admits that his heritage and reputation could give him more reason than most people to place confidence in his spiritual pedigree. But the overwhelming grace of God in Jesus calls Paul to a new set of values.

GOSPEL - John 12:1-8

Judas willfully misinterprets as waste Mary's extravagant act of anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume. Jesus recognizes that her lavish gift is both an expression of love and an anticipation of his burial.

APRIL 13 - PALM SUNDAY

Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced; instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 50:4-9a

This text, the third of the four Servant Songs in Isaiah, speaks of the servant's obedience amid persecution. Though the servant has been variously understood as the prophet himself or a remnant of faithful Israel, Christians have often recognized the figure of Christ in these poems.

PSALM – Psalm 31:9-16

Into your hands, O LORD, I commend my spirit. (Ps. 31:5) **SECOND READING – Philippians 2:5-11**

Paul quotes from an early Christian hymn that describes Jesus' humble obedience in his incarnation as a human being, even to death, and his exaltation and glory as Lord of all.

GOSPEL - Luke 22:14-23:56

Through the teachings and events of the passion story we see and hear the great contradictions that characterize the coming of God's reign. The leader serves the followers, proud Peter is revealed in his cowardice, and Jesus—the innocent bringer of life—is arrested, beaten, executed, and buried.

<u> APRIL 20 – EASTER DAY</u>

"The last enemy to be destroyed is death," Paul writes. Today Christ is risen, and we gather together with astonishment and joy. Christ is risen, and we have been set free from the bonds of death. Christ is risen, and we are forgiven. Christ is risen, and with the women at the tomb and Peter, we are amazed. Let us rejoice: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

FIRST READING – Acts 10:34-43

Peter's sermon, delivered at the home of Cornelius, a Roman army officer, is a summary of the essential message of Christianity: Everyone who believes in Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection fulfilled the words of the prophets, receives forgiveness of sins through his name.

PSALM – Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24

This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Ps. 118:24)

SECOND READING – 1 Corinthians 15:19-26

Paul describes the consequences of the resurrection, including the promise of new life in Christ to a world that has been in bondage to death. He celebrates the destruction of evil and the establishment of God's victorious rule over all. **GOSPEL – Luke 24:1-12**

Evidently expecting to find Jesus' corpse, some of the women among his followers go to the tomb with embalming spices. After a perplexing encounter with the empty tomb and angelic visitors, the women become the first to proclaim the amazing news of resurrection.

APRIL 27 - SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

In spite of all we have heard and all we have seen, it is often hard to believe. Because it is hard to believe, we will invest ourselves in the Easter mystery for fifty days (a week of weeks). Because it is hard to believe, John the evangelist will provide sign after sign celebrating Jesus' victory over death. Because it is hard to believe, the risen Jesus will return to us again and again in the mystery of holy communion, inviting us to touch and taste his presence, and offering us his peace.

FIRST READING - Acts 5:27-32

Peter has been arrested for proclaiming the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection. His response to the charges of the high priest summarizes the early church's proclamation of forgiveness of sin through repentance.

PSALM – Psalm 118:14-29

You are my God, and I will exalt you. (Ps. 118:28) SECOND READING – Revelation 1:4-8

The book of Revelation recounts a mystical vision of the risen Christ experienced by a Christian prophet named John. Here he describes Christ as a timeless redeemer, the beginning, present, and end of all time.

GOSPEL - John 20:19-31

The unprecedented events of the day of resurrection continue as the risen Jesus appears to his fearful disciples. A week later, after Thomas worships Jesus, Jesus pronounces that the blessings of the resurrection are also for those who "have not seen and yet believe."


