A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Good Shepherd family,

It is that time of year for me to remind you once again that Easter is not just a day on the calendar for us. It is a season of 50 days. More than that, Easter is our way of life. We are people of the Resurrection and we live out this Easter life together as God's people.

In the coming weeks we will hear about how the first disciples in the early church

discerned Christ's presence with them. On the second Sunday in Easter we heard about the disciples gathered on Easter evening behind locked doors when Jesus appeared in their midst. Thomas, who was not with them that night, got a chance to hear about Jesus' resurrection from the others, but did not believe them. It was through Jesus' presence as well as through the disciples' patience with Thomas that Thomas came to believe.

In the coming weeks we will reflect on other ways the early church came to know Jesus' presence with them after the Resurrection. In John 21, it is through a great catch of fish and a shared meal that Jesus was made known to them. In Luke 24 on the road to Emmaus, it is through the breaking of the bread and the opening of the scriptures that they came to know the risen Christ.

Later in the Easter season we will reflect back over Jesus' words spoken to the disciples during his ministry, as well. It is there that we find his promises that he is the Good Shepherd as well as his command that we love one another as he has loved us.

It is for us as today as it was for the early church: Christ's presence is best discerned in community, gathered around the Word and Sacraments. As we gather for baptisms, to share Holy Communion, and to open and study and live out the Scriptures, we experience Christ in our midst. As we live out this Easter season and this Resurrection life together, let's continue to gather and experience Christ's presence with us.

GOOD SHEPHERD WORKDAY MARCH 22, 2025



Reflecting On Good Shepherd's Saints Earl Olson and Julius Hair – Models of the Godly Life

Looking back on our 75 years as a congregation gives us a chance to reflect on how we started, who our founders were, how our physical plant has grown, how we've been the feet and hands of Christ during all this time, and all the things we've dealt with over the years to make us an integral part of the community. Things didn't just happen; they came about because of the dedication and commitment of so many individuals who now rest from their labors and are saints in God's Kingdom.

In the next few issues of the newsletter we'll be highlighting the stories of some of those many Good Shepherd saints.

In this issue we are featuring two men who would have celebrated birthdays in April. Earl Olson would have been 107 on April 6, and Julius Hair would have been 105 on April 20 Both were excellent models of the Godly life. When something needed to be done, they did it. And they did it without fanfare. Both were products of the Great Depression and grew into adulthood during World War II. We would think of them now as part of the "Greatest Generation." As each neared the ends of their earthly lives some eight years ago, it almost went without saying that each would have been in the sanctuary every week for Sunday worship. When Earl was growing up in small-town Iowa in the 1920s and 30s, he was greatly impressed by seeing his doctor father and housewife mother always doing things for other people. "My father would drop whatever he was doing to go help anybody who needed him," Earl would recall. It was a lesson well learned. As Earl reached his 90s, he commented that "more than anything else" he would "rather see what I can do to help somebody." A Model of the Godly life. Those who knew him during his many years at Good Shepherd can attest to that. Whether it was doing various jobs around the church, woodworking projects, delivering Meals On Wheels (into his mid 90s!), being a "handyman" for those who needed his help, giving others the produce from his garden,

or making dollhouses for family and friends, there seemed to be no end to Earl's quiet, low-key willingness to do things for others.

The strong Norwegian and Swedish immigrant influence in the area of Iowa where he grew up meant there was no shortage of Lutheran churches. His family attended a Norwegian Evangelical Church congregation, where the Norwegian language was still used.....as the Swedish Lutheran Church did with its language. "Our church was a lot like the Catholic Church," he recalled. "We had confession every Saturday. No confession on Saturday; no communion on Sunday!"

Earl earned a degree in chemical engineering in August, 1941, from the University of Iowa. He soon accepted a position with Tennessee Eastman in Kingsport, TN. In January, 1942, he met his future wife Margaret. They were married in October, 1942, and were together 57 years before her death in 1999. During World War II, Earl worked in the ordnance plant at Tennessee Eastman. At the time of their marriage, Margaret also was working there. "She could get only a half day off," Earl said, "so we got married in the evening at the parsonage of the Lutheran church we were attending, and she had to go back to work the next day!"

After five children and almost a quarter century living in Kingsport, Earl accepted a transfer to supervise the opening of the new Carolina Eastman facility south of Columbia. The family moved into a home on Florawood, between Good Shepherd and A.C. Flora High School. They joined the conveniently located

Good Shepherd and soon became very active members.

In addition to all the "help" projects he did over the years at Good Shepherd, he served numerous terms on church council, was part of four call committees (which resulted in calls to pastors Larry Long, Hank Moody, George Sims and Ron Feltman.) After many years at Good Shepherd, Earl said he had always been impressed by "the nice people at Good Shepherd. There have been lots of wonderful people." And that would include Earl Olson.... A Model of the Godly life. Earl died Nov. 17, 2016, at age 98.

While Earl Olson was growing up half-way across the country in Iowa, Julius Hair was growing up in the Eau Claire area of Columbia. He was one of triplet boys and also had a sister and two other brothers. A lifelong Lutheran, he was baptized at Reformation and confirmed at Ascension. At Columbia High School, he met Jean Catoe and they "were sweethearts." After graduation, he began working for P. Lorillard Tobacco Co. and eventually he and Jean became engaged.

But World War II intervened. He was drafted into the army in 1943 and eventually spent two years in the South Pacific. As a platoon sergeant, he was part of the invasions of islands held by the Japanese. Like many veterans, Julius didn't care to talk much about his wartime experiences, but history tells us there was fierce fighting on those islands, and many young men lost their lives. Noting the difficulty of losing the young men in his platoon, Julius said "it always seemed that the nice guys were the ones who were killed." He was sent to Japan when the war ended and there he saw the "unbelievable" destruction caused by the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. "The only thing left was just an occasional piece of twisted metal sticking up."

After discharge from the army, he came back to Columbia and returned to P. Lorillard. And on July 14, 1946, he and Jean were married, eventually spending more than 61 years together before her death in 2008. He later began working in the Climate Control Division of the Singer Co., spending nearly 30 years as a sales rep throughout the Southeast before retiring.

When the Hairs moved into their home on Edgehill Road in Forest Acres in 1949 near where Good Shepherd now stands, they were "out in the country." Julius recalled that they "still had dirt streets." Eventually they joined the new Good Shepherd Lutheran Church being formed, and on Feb. 5, 1950, Julius, Jean and their young daughter Linda (now Sloan) became charter members of Good Shepherd. They would have two more daughters, Judy (who with husband Minot Stanton are still Good Shepherd members), and Suzy (Myer), who lives in Charlotte.

Julius and Jean were staunch South Carolina Gamecock supporters, and all three daughters and their husbands are USC graduates. For many years, the Hairs attended both home and away football games and could be seen at basketball and baseball games as well.

From the first days of Good Shepherd, the Hairs were a very active family. Teaching Sunday School, serving on Council, chairing committees, participating in men's group, et al, were all part of Julius' service to the congregation. The two youngest daughters were baptized at Good Shepherd, and all three daughters were confirmed there.

Later in his life, macular degeneration caused Julius to lose most of his eyesight and he had to give up driving. But Jean became his driver, and they continued regular church attendance. After her death, family friends provided transportation to church, which he attended regularly until his death in 2017 at age 96.

In looking back over a long life well-lived, Julius said he had always been motivated by the words of the Golden Rule: "I've always believed you should do unto others as you'd have them do unto you." Both Julius and Earl were the personification of the sentiment in those words. They truly were Models of the Godly life.

LECTIONARY FOR MAY 2025

<u>MAY 4 – THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER</u>

The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to others.

FIRST READING – Acts 9:1-20

Saul (later called Paul) was an ardent persecutor of all who followed the Way of Christ. This reading recounts the story of his transformation beginning with an encounter with Jesus Christ on the way to Damascus.

PSALM – Psalm 30

You have turned my wailing into dancing. (Ps. 30:11) **SECOND READING – Revelation 5:11-14**

The vision of John recorded in Revelation offers a glimpse of cosmic worship around the throne. At its center is "the Lamb who was slain."

GOSPEL – John 21:1-19

The risen Christ appears again to his disciples by the sea where they were first called. After echoes of the fishing and feeding miracles, he gives a final reminder of the cost of a disciple's love and obedience.

MAY 11 — FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The gift of new life, of eternal life, is the gift of the risen Christ. It is the promise of Jesus. It was true for Dorcas in Joppa. It was true for those "who have come out of the great ordeal" in the Revelation vision. It is true for us and for all the baptized: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

FIRST READING - Acts 9:36-43

Dorcas was a faithful and devoted woman of charity in the community of Joppa. Her kindness and her work with clothing were well-known, especially to the widows in town. When she fell ill and died, Peter raised her back to life through the power of prayer.

PSALM – Psalm 23

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not be in want. (Ps. 23:1)

SECOND READING – Revelation 7:9-17

Christ is the shepherd who leads his faithful to springs of the water of life. Christ is also the lamb who vanquishes sin and suffering.

GOSPEL – John 10:22-30

Jesus responds to questions about his identity with the remarkable claim that he and the Father are one.

Those who understand this are his sheep; they hear his voice, follow, and will never be snatched from his hand.

MAY 18 - FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Easter initiates a new day. It anticipates a new heaven and a new earth. The risen Christ is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made new people of us. Today Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light—through the lens of love.

FIRST READING – Acts 11:1-18

In defense of his earlier baptism of non-Jewish believers, Peter demonstrates to the members of the Jerusalem church that God's intention to love Gentiles as well as Jews is revealed in Jesus' testimony. In this way the mission to the Gentiles is officially authorized.

PSALM – Psalm 148

The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13)

SECOND READING – Revelation 21:1-6

John's vision shows us that in the resurrection the new age has dawned; God dwells with us already. Yet we wait for the time when the tears that cloud our vision will be wiped away. Then we will see the new heaven, new earth, and new Jerusalem.

GOSPEL – John 13:31-35

After washing the disciples' feet, predicting his betrayal, and then revealing his betrayer, Jesus speaks of his glorification on the cross. This deep complicated love of Jesus, even to death on the cross, will be the distinctive mark of Jesus' community.

MAY 25 - SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. Jesus provides visions of peace that surpasses human understanding and power beyond human imagination.

FIRST READING – Acts 16:9-15

A vision compels Paul to move his ministry into Greece. There he meets Lydia, an important person in the business community, whose heart has been opened by God to receive the gospel. Her conversion and baptism provide the impetus for the founding of the church at Philippi.

PSALM – Psalm 67

Let the nations be glad and sing for joy. (Ps. 67:4) **SECOND READING – Revelation 21:10, 22 — 22:5** John's vision of a new Jerusalem coming out of heaven provides continuity with God's past actions. Yet in this new city, God's presence replaces the temple, and the glory of God and the Lamb supplants sun and moon.

GOSPEL – John 14:23-29

As Jesus talks of returning to the Father, he promises to send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will teach Jesus' followers and remind them of all that Jesus taught. Even more, those in whom God makes a home will experience a peace that overcomes fear.


