



YOUTH & CHILDREN COMMITTEE NEWS

Join us on Sunday, August 24, for a full morning of activities at Good Shepherd. We will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary for the morning worship service. Following worship, we will remain in the Sanctuary to kick off the start of another fall season with our Rally Day Celebration. After the Rally Day Celebration, all children age 3 years to 12th grade are invited to the Youth Room for lunch. We will have a lesson led by Pastor Andrew and a time for crafts. To hopefully end the hot days of summer, we will have our annual Summer Splash with our own wet and wild activities outside by the FAB. All the youth are welcome and encouraged to come and enjoy this kickoff to another exciting year.

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"For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." –Luke 14:11

Jesus uttered this wise saying about humility and exaltation during a meal at a Pharisee's house. While he was there, he noticed that people were jockeying for position at the table. In those days and in that culture, seats at a table were carefully

assigned or selected to reinforce the social pecking order.

When Jesus noticed that many of the guests at the meal were trying to get the best seats in the house to make themselves look more important, he said that instead, they should take the lowest place, trusting their host to raise them to greater honor. If they chose too high a place initially, Jesus pointed out, their host might have to move them down lower to make room for someone more important. And so, Jesus remarked, "all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." Talk about an awkward dinner party!

But wait, it gets more awkward! Jesus went on from this observation to critiquing the host's choice of guests, pointing out that the host should have invited "the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind." Again, it's hard for us to imagine how uncomfortable this would have been for the host and for those at the dinner.

What is Jesus' point in this teaching? Is it merely to provide etiquette advice to a first century Pharisee and his dinner guests? No, rather Jesus wants all who hear these words to be reminded of some important facts. By our own strength and merit, none of us are as good as we think we are. If we choose to exalt ourselves, we will inevitably be brought low. But it is in humbling ourselves that we see ourselves as we truly are—worthless by our own right, but precious and beloved in the eyes of God, our host.

Likewise, Jesus wants us to take his words to the host of the banquet to heart. If we use what we've been given only to enrich ourselves and garner favor from powerful and well-connected people, we miss the chance to do good to and for others who are also precious in the eyes of God.

Let us never forget that it is Jesus who humbled himself for our sake, taking on our likeness and living among us. It is he who humbled himself to the point of death on a cross for us. Now God has exalted him above all else. Let us continue to follow the way of Jesus, humbling ourselves and lifting up the lowly.

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



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LECTIONARY FOR AUGUST 2025

AUGUST 3 - EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today's texts offer instruction and encouragement for all who are occasionally overwhelmed by the "unhappy business" of life. Jesus urges us to take care and be on guard against all kinds of greed. We who have died with Christ in holy baptism have also been raised with him and are encouraged to elevate our thinking, seeking the "things that are above." To that end we seek the sustenance of the Lord's supper and the encouragement of God's word.

FIRST READING - Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14, 2:18-23

The teacher of wisdom who wrote Ecclesiastes sees that working for mere accumulation of wealth turns life into an empty game, a "vanity of vanities." Nevertheless, he asserts in the next verse, it is good to find enjoyment in one's work because such enjoyment is a gift from God.

PSALM - Psalm 49:1-12

My mouth shall speak of wisdom. (Ps. 49:3)

SECOND READING - Colossians 3:1-11

Life in Christ includes a radical reorientation of our values. Just as the newly baptized shed their old clothes and put on new garments, so Christians are called to let go of greed and take hold of a life shaped by God's love in Christ.

GOSPEL – Luke 12:13-21

In God's reign, the "rich will be sent away empty." Jesus uses a parable to warn against identifying the worth of one's life with the value of one's possessions rather than one's relationship with God.

<u>AUGUST 10 – NINTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Jesus says, "It is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." It is God's promise from the beginning—to Abraham, to the early church, and to the "little flock" of which we are a part in today's assembly. Faith, God's baptismal gift, trusts the promises of God. Have no fear.

FIRST READING - Genesis 15:1-6

God promises childless and aging Abram that a child of his own will be his heir and that his descendants will number as many as the stars. Abram trusts God's promise, and through this faith he is considered righteous. **PSALM – Psalm 33:12-22**

Let your lovingkindness be upon us, as we place our hope in you. (Ps. 33:22)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Abraham and Sarah exemplify the vision of faith that people of God enact in every age. Their hope and trust in God's promise allowed them to face an unknown future and to receive the promise of God.

GOSPEL - Luke 12:32-40

Jesus encourages disciples to invest their hearts and live fully into God's reign. Instead of facing life with fear, those who know God's generosity are always ready to receive from God and to give to others.

AUGUST 17 - TENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The word of God is a refining fire. Jesus is the great divide in human history. He invites our undivided attention and devotion. Today in worship we are surrounded by a great "cloud of witnesses." In the word and in holy communion we are invited yet again to look to Jesus, "the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 23:23-29

Because Jeremiah preaches the unpopular message of God's judgment, he suffers rejection. Today's reading

distinguishes between the true prophet, like Jeremiah, who speaks God's word, and the false prophet who misleads the people through dreams. One is like wheat; the other like worthless straw.

PSALM - Psalm 82

Arise, O God, and rule the earth. (Ps. 82:8)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 11:29—12:2

The author of Hebrews presents us with rich stories of faith. In a long list of biblical heroes, we find examples of trust in God that enabled them to face the trials of life faithfully. In addition to this "cloud of witnesses," we have Jesus, the perfect model of faithful endurance.

GOSPEL - Luke 12:49-56

Jesus delivers harsh words about the purifying and potentially divisive effects of obedience to God's call. The way of the cross often leads followers to encounter hostility and rejection, even from those they love.

AUGÚST 24 – ELEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Remember the sabbath day. Call the sabbath a delight. This is the Lord's day, and the Lord will do for us what the Lord does: feed us, forgive us, help and heal us. Rejoice at all the wonderful things God is doing.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 58:9b-14

God promises those who have returned from exile that where justice and mercy prevail, the ruins will be rebuilt and light will rise in the darkness. It is a day for new beginnings.

PSALM - Psalm 103:1-8

The LORD crowns you with mercy and steadfast love. (Ps. 103:4)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 12:18-29

Using images of Moses, the writer presents a striking vision of the new covenant of God made possible in Christ. There is no longer fear; only awe in the new promise in Christ into which we are invited.

GOSPEL – Luke 13:10-17

Jesus heals a woman on the sabbath, offering her a new beginning for her life. When challenged by a narrow reading of the sabbath command, Jesus responds by expanding "sabbath work" to include setting people free from bondage.

<u>AUGUST 31 – TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Invited and inviting—that is the nature of the church. By God's grace in holy baptism we have a place at Christ's banquet table. When, by the power of that same Spirit, humility and mutual love continue among us, the church can be more inviting still.

FIRST READING - Proverbs 25:6-7a

The book of Proverbs is part of a collection of writings known as wisdom literature. Wisdom literature gave directions to Israel's leaders and people for the conduct of daily life. Todav's reading is about humility.

PSALM - Psalm 112

The righteous are merciful and full of compassion. (Ps. 112:4)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16

The conclusion of the letter to the Hebrews contains suggestions for the conduct of a holy life, all of which are shaped by God's love toward us in Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL - Luke 14:1, 7-14

Jesus observes guests jockeying for position at the table. He uses the opportunity to teach his hearers to choose humility rather than self-exaltation. Jesus also makes an appeal for hosts to imitate God's gracious hospitality to those in need.
