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Dear Good Shepherd family,

I may have told some of you before that my childhood pastor often called the season after Pentecost "the long, green, growing season of the church." Green is indeed the liturgical color of this season and, ideally, it is a time of year where we grow deeper in our discipleship, closer to God and one another, and outwards to reach the world with the love of Christ.

Growth doesn't always come easily or painlessly. Some of us have experienced the aches and pains that come with age—both physical pain and emotional difficulty are a part of growth and aging at times. So it can be for our time of growth in the church year. We continue to study Jesus' difficult words and teachings during this time of year. I'm a bit envious of Pastor Ron Feltman, our guest preacher for Homecoming Sunday. He gets to preach on the parable of the lost sheep. This lovely text is sandwiched between two extremely difficult passages. First is Jesus' insistence that those who do not give up all their possessions cannot be his disciples. We'll look at this cheery passage on September 7. And then, on September 21, we get the most confounding of all of Jesus' parables—the parable of the dishonest manager. I trust you will come and join us for Homecoming and our 75th Anniversary celebration on September 14 and to hear Pastor Feltman encourage us with the words of the parable. Come also on September 7 and 21 to see what happens with those two difficult passages I mentioned. Go ahead and come on September 28, too, while you're at it.

As difficult as some of these lessons are, Jesus gives them to us to help us grow in our faith together. Even a seemingly "easy" passage like the parable of the lost sheep and lost coin, which we will hear on Homecoming Sunday, is not so easy as it may initially seem. Such a word from Jesus is profoundly good news when we are the lost sheep or the lost coin. But what about when we are but one of the 99 who get left in the wilderness while the shepherd seeks the lost one? What if we are one of the coins merely sitting around while the woman who lost one coin sweeps the house to find it? What about when the party and rejoicing seem to revolve around someone else instead of us?

That is the question that the third parable in this threefold lesson dares to ask. It is the parable of the lost son—what we often call the parable of the prodigal son. In that parable, the older brother who was always safe at home with the father refuses to celebrate that the lost one is found. He feels keenly what the 99 sheep in the wilderness or the 9 safe coins would likely have felt. How could the father lavish such love and concern on someone like that? What about me?

These parables—and all of Jesus' tough teachings this time of year—are invitations to growth. The challenge for us is to stretch ourselves to grow deeper roots of faith, stronger cores of compassion, and wider branches of love. Where we feel these lessons of Jesus pinching, stinging, or aching, may we push through the pain to find new layers of faith, strength, love, and mercy together.

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SOCIAL MINISTRY MONTHLY EMPHASIS

This clinic provides free quality health care to members of the community without health insurance who cannot afford their medical services. The clinic relies on monetary support from the local hospitals, foundations, businesses, churches, and individual donors. SOCIAL MINISTRY GIVING UPDATE

Thanks so much to our generous congregation for supporting outside organizations who work to serve others in need! The June Social Ministry monthly emphasis was Palmetto Place, and \$1,020.00 was contributed to help in their mission to provide a safe and supportive environment for children and teens who have faced abuse, abandonment, neglect and/or homelessness. In July, the monthly emphasis donations for the Big Red Barn Retreat totaled \$1,080.00 which will allow the organization to offer their free services to veterans, active-duty service members, and first responders. The Good Shepherd children collected \$500.00 during the June noisy offering. This money was sent to the SC synod and designated to be used toward a baby warmer for our companion synod in Tanzania. God bless you all as you continue to bless people in need with your financial support!





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FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

The Good Shepherd Food Pantry provided food in July for 31 families serving 103 individuals.





SUPPORTING OUR FOOD PANTRY CHANGE

At the July meeting of the Social Ministry Committee, there was discussion regarding the best use of food pantry funds from our congregation's loving support of this ministry. The result was that instead of allowing clients to only come to the food pantry once per month to receive a couple days of food supplies as has been the limit in the past, they are now allowed to come twice in a month if needed. This new guideline will be for a trial period of August through October, but of course the hope is that we will be able to serve the clients in this manner indefinitely. The Social Ministry Committee encourages the Good Shepherd congregation to please continue the support of the food pantry with your donations of food and money and to prayerfully consider increasing donations when need arises. We are very grateful always for your generosity in giving to those who require assistance with their basic needs.

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LECTIONARY FOR SEPTEMBER 2025

<u>SEPTEMBER 7 – THIRTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

Called to contemplate the cost of discipleship, we might be helped by translating Paul's request to Philemon into our prayer of the day: Refresh my heart in Christ. Strengthened by the company and forgiveness of Christ in holy communion and recalling God's grace in remembrance of baptism, we can be strengthened in this hour to "choose life"—to choose life in God as our own.

FIRST READING - Deuteronomy 30:15-20

Moses speaks to the Israelites, who are about to enter the land promised to their ancestors. In this passage, he lays out the stark choice before them: choose life by loving and obeying the LORD; or choose death by following other gods.

PSALM - Psalm 1

They are like trees planted by streams of water. (Ps. 1:3) **SECOND READING – Philemon 1-21**

Onesimus, a new Christian and a man enslaved by Philemon, has helped Paul, who is in prison. Paul writes this letter to his friend Philemon to encourage him to receive Onesimus, upon his return, as a sibling in Christ.

GOSPEL - Luke 14:25-33

Jesus speaks frankly about the costs of discipleship. Those who follow him should know from the outset that completing the course of discipleship will finally mean renouncing all other allegiances.

<u>SEPTEMBER 14 – FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

The grumbling of the religious leaders in today's gospel is actually our holy hope: This Jesus welcomes sinners and eats with them. That our God seeks and saves the lost is not only a holy hope, it is our only hope. As the writer of 1 Timothy reminds us, "The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." Thanks be to God.

FIRST READING - Exodus 32:7-14

While Moses is on Mount Sinai, the people grow restless and make a golden calf to worship. Today's reading shows Moses as the mediator between an angry God and a sinful people. Moses reminds God that the Israelites are God's own people, and boldly asks for mercy for them.

PSALM - Psalm 51:1-10

Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love. (Ps. 51:1)

SECOND READING – 1 Timothy 1:12-17

The letters to Timothy and Titus are called the pastoral epistles because they contain advice especially intended for leaders in the church. Here the mercy shown to Paul, who once persecuted the church, is cited as evidence that even the most unworthy may become witnesses to the grace of God.

GOSPEL - Luke 15:1-10

Jesus tells two stories that suggest a curious connection between the lost being found and sinners repenting. God takes the initiative to find sinners, each of whom is so precious to God that their recovery brings joy in heaven.

<u>SEPTEMBER 21 – FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

As we are invited today to consider what it means to be managers (rather than owners) of all that we have, it is crucial to recognize that we are bought with a price. "Christ Jesus, himself human, . . . gave himself a ransom for all." Apart from the generosity of God we have nothing—we are nothing. By God's gracious favor we have everything we need.

FIRST READING - Amos 8:4-7

Amos was called by God to prophesy in the Northern Kingdom of Israel. Peace and prosperity in Israel led to corrupt business practices and oppression of the poor. The prophet declares that God will not tolerate such a situation.

PSALM - Psalm 113

The LORD lifts up the poor from the ashes. (Ps. 113:7)

SECOND READING – 1 Timothy 2:1-7

The pastoral epistles offer insight into how early Christians understood many practical matters, such as church administration and worship. The church's focused prayer for others is an expression of the single-minded passion God has toward us in Jesus.

GOSPEL - Luke 16:1-13

Jesus tells the curious story of a dishonest manager who cheats his employer and then is commended by him for having acted so shrewdly. Jesus wonders why his own followers are less creative and diligent in their stewardship given that they are managers of a far more valuable household.

<u>SEPTEMBER 28 – SIXTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> <u>PENTECOST</u>

Consideration of and care for those in need (especially those "at our gate," visible to us, of whom we are aware) is an essential component of good stewardship. It is in the sharing of wealth that we avoid the snare of wealth. It is the one whom death could not hold—who comes to us risen from the dead—who can free us from the death grip of greed.

FIRST READING - Amos 6:1a, 4-7

The prophet Amos announces that Israel's great wealth is a cause not for rejoicing but rather sorrow, because God's people have forgotten how to share their wealth with the poor. The wealthy will be the first to go into exile when judgment comes.

PSALM - Psalm 146

The LORD gives justice to those who are oppressed. (Ps. 146:7)

SECOND READING – 1 Timothy 6:6-19

Timothy is reminded of the confession he made at his baptism and of its implications for daily life. His priorities will be different from those of people who merely want to be rich.

GOSPEL – Luke 16:19-31

Jesus tells a parable in which the poor one is "lifted up" and the rich one is "sent away empty." Jesus makes it clear that this ethic of merciful reversal is not new but is as old as Moses and the prophets. PAGE 15 XLIX, ISSUE IX
