A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea, for they were fishers. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him.
Mark 1:16-20

I've always been fascinated by the story of Jesus calling the first disciples. Andrew, Peter, James, and John were busy with work, doing the only thing they'd ever known how to do. When Jesus called them to follow him, they didn't hesitate. Immediately, Mark tells us, they left their nets and their families and coworkers and followed him.

I often wonder about the weight of that decision: Did their families and coworkers resent their decision to get up and leave? Did they worry about how they would pay the bills or feed their families? Did people call them crazy? We don't know. What we do know is that their lives were changed by the powerful call of Jesus.

When I was in seminary, people would often ask, "Where will you serve as a pastor?" My answer was always, "Wherever the church needs me." That stunned many folks that I didn't get much of a choice in where I served. I certainly hoped to be in my home synod, a hope that up to this point in my life has been fulfilled. But I knew if a bishop called and said, "you're going away," I would go, trusting where God leads.

For the third time in my ministry, I have felt this call of the Spirit so strongly that I could not turn away from it. I'm certainly not an Apostle (even if my name is Andrew), but I feel the weight that those first followers of Jesus must have felt. It is heavy to leave you all. Saying farewell is difficult. Going to an uncertain place can be overwhelming.

At the same time, I trust the one who is leading. God has guided me through life to this point and God is faithful time and again. God faithfully led me to Good Shepherd and God faithfully led me each step of the way here. Now God is leading me to serve in a new place with new people. I step away from you all in faith that God is calling me to go. At the same time, I urge you all to follow where God is leading Good Shepherd. The love, the ministry, the worship, and the fellowship that Good Shepherd shares is something the whole world needs. It will no longer be my task to help this community listen to where God is calling you to go, but God is still calling and leading. Listen and follow Him even when things seem heavy and difficult. That is where the real life and the real ministry happen.

On the 16th of this month I will leave as your pastor, but you all are in my heart and in my prayers. And we remain one body in Christ no matter what. Trust in Him, lean on Him, and follow Him always.

A TIME OF TRANSITION

Dear Good Shepherd Family,

Like each of you I received the news today that Pastor Andrew has accepted a new Call to Joy Lutheran Church in Moore, SC. In a lifetime in ministry I have served with at least 35 pastors and deacons, dozens of lay staff, a seminary faculty and staff, a Board of Directors of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians and that organization's staff. Among all of these relationships I treasure the relatively short time I have worked with Pastor Andrew and consider this time in ministry a great blessing. My partnership with the remaining staff and all the leadership at Good Shepherd reminds me of the ongoing strength for ministry that we have.

With Deborah and Pastor Andrew both accepting new Calls we can certainly grieve the loss we are feeling but we need to remember that Jesus, who is calling them to new ministries, continues to call us to be the Church, to love God with heart, soul and being, and our neighbors as ourselves. Our Call as a Christian Community and individually is to remain faithful to this ministry and to remain committed to lives of worship and service. There is a tendency during pastoral vacancies for people to withdraw, take a "wait and see" attitude and lower both their expectations and energy in the ministries of the congregation.

I urge us all to do the opposite. Take the initiative and provide support to someone who is grieving, dealing with a difficult illness or is experiencing job loss. Seek ways to pick up the slack in ministries that need more help during this time. Pray for Pastor Andrew, Deborah and our church as we begin this transition. Remember every minute of every day that we are the church of Jesus Christ in this time and place at Good Shepherd. Sometimes a children's song can remind us of who we are better than some of the volumes of deep theological writings we have in our church library. **"I am the Church, you are the Church, we are the Church together. All who follow Jesus all around the world, yes, we're the Church together. Let's be the Church together. Now is the time."**

SOCIAL MINISTRY MONTHLY EMPHASIS

In June, our church's monthly social ministry emphasis for our congregational donations will be Project HOPE (Helping Our Precious Elderly). Project HOPE is a special mission of the Richland County Sheriff's Department servicing more than 600 elderly residents in Richland County. Retired law enforcement officers call and visit senior citizens and disabled citizens each month with volunteers making weekly calls to everyone. Some of the services they provide are home safety checks, helping with transportation needs, supplying the elderly with fans in the hot months, arranging specialized counseling, and training people to avoid being a victim of scams targeting the elderly. Sheriff Leon Lott has said "that we must care for and provide services and tools necessary to enhance our seniors' quality of life." To give your support to Project HOPE, you may contribute any time during the month by putting your donation in a pink envelope and placing it in the offering plate on Sunday mornings or by sending it to the church office. Checks should be made payable to Good Shepherd and designated for Project HOPE.

MORE JUSTICE – NEHEMIAH ACTION UPDATE

Over 600 people participated in the MORE Justice Nehemiah Action on April 27. Public officials present included members of Columbia City Council, Richland County Council, and the SC House.

- Richland County Council members Donald Weaver and Paul Livingston both committed to support a recommendation to fund a Housing Trust Fund with a dedicated source of revenue targeting those in Richland County at or below 50% AMI.
- Columbia City Council Members Tyler Bailey and Will Brennan, and Ayesha Driggers, Director of the City's Office of Business Opportunities, confirmed that the Mobile Market plans to continue and is working to restructure the locations as they expand outside of the city of Columbia.
- Representative Carla Schuessler reported the bill to seal eviction records had passed the House. On May 13, House bill 4270 received final passage. Eviction records will be removed after 7 years.

Good Shepherd had ten members at the Nehemiah Action. The MORE Justice Team thanks all who contributed your ideas and financial support this year.

LECTIONARY FOR JUNE 2026

JUNE 7 – SECOND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Though Jesus was a devout Jew who practiced his faith, he was criticized for eating with tax collectors and sinners—the religiously nonobservant. Jesus criticizes the self-righteous and reminds us that mercy is to be at the heart of our religious practices. God continues to be made known in those on the margins of society, like Matthew the tax collector and the hemorrhaging woman. As we gather each Lord's day we receive the healing that makes us well and sends us forth to be signs of God's mercy for the world.

FIRST READING – Hosea 5:15-15—6:6

Because the people have trusted in military powers and not God, God decides to withdraw from the scene until Israel acknowledges its guilt and seeks God's face. The response of the people does not acknowledge this guilt and is as fickle as fog or dew burned away quickly by the sun. God desires loyalty rather than words or meaningless deeds.

PSALM – Psalm 50:7-15

Call upon me in the day of trouble, says your God. (Ps. 50:15)

SECOND READING – Romans 4:13-25

Paul presents Abraham as a living model of right relationships. For Abraham and for us, a right relationship with God involves trusting that God's promises will be fulfilled because God makes the dead alive and calls into existence what otherwise does not exist.

GOSPEL – Matthew 9:9-13, 18-26

Jesus demonstrates God's mercy and power, accepting the unacceptable and curing the incurable. Even the dead receive new life.

JUNE 14 – THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

FIRST READING – Exodus 19:2-9a

At Sinai God assured Israel, "You shall be my treasured possession," and commissioned them to serve as mediating priests for the nations. The people commit themselves completely to God's will.

PSALM – Psalm 100

We are God's people and the sheep of God's pasture. (Ps. 100:3)

SECOND READING – Romans 5:1-8

We are no longer God's enemies but have peace with God because we were brought into a right relationship with God through Christ's death.

GOSPEL – Matthew 9:35—10:8-23

The mission of Jesus' followers is to continue the mission of Jesus himself. Here, he instructs his first disciples as to how they might proclaim the gospel through their words and deeds.

JUNE 21 – FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads.

Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 20:7-13

Jeremiah accuses God of forcing him into a ministry that brings him only contempt and persecution. Yet Jeremiah is confident that God will be a strong protector against his enemies and commits his life into God's hands.

PSALM – Psalm 69:7-18

Answer me, O LORD, for your love is kind. (Ps. 69:16)

SECOND READING – Romans 6:1b-11

In baptism we were incorporated into the reality of Christ's death and resurrection. We have been made new in Christ through his death and resurrection to live freed from sin.

GOSPEL – Matthew 10:24-39

Jesus warns his disciples that their ministry in his name will meet with opposition. However, he assures them that they need not fear for the truth will come to light. Life is found in Christ.

JUNE 28 – FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. In today's gospel, Christ promises that the disciple who gives a cup of cold water to the little ones serves Christ himself. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 28:5-9

Through a symbolic action Jeremiah insisted that Judah and all the surrounding nations should submit to the king of Babylon (Jer. 27). Hananiah contradicted the word of Jeremiah, who in reply insisted that Hananiah's rosy prediction should not be believed until it came true. God confirmed the word of Jeremiah and sentenced the false prophet Hananiah to death (vv. 16-17).

PSALM – Psalm 89:1-4, 15-18

Your love, O LORD, forever will I sing. (Ps. 89:1)

SECOND READING – Romans 6:12-23

Sin is an enslaving power which motivates us to live self-serving, disobedient lives. Sin's final payoff is death. We, however, have been set free from sin's slavery to live obediently under God's grace, whose end is the free gift of eternal life.

GOSPEL – Matthew 10:40-42

When Jesus sends his disciples out as missionaries, he warns them of persecution and hardships they will face. He also promises to reward any who aid his followers and support their ministry.
