The last few years have been challenging. As I reflect back on our four years together so far as pastor and people, I think this word "challenge" applies in several ways. First, I had the challenge of beginning a new call. New names and faces to learn, a new congregational culture to absorb, and so on. You all had the challenge of getting to know a new pastor, as well. Just four short months into our time together, the challenge of Covid hit. That challenge has certainly dominated much of our life together up to this point. This year has been refreshing in that the challenges we are facing currently are mainly intellectual in nature. We have been challenged

this year in Bible study and in our lectionary. First, those of us participating in Bible study have been wading our way through Revelation. This is not an easy slog, but it is important to study this difficult and often misused book together. Likewise, in our worship service we've experienced lots of difficult topics. I must admit, I've always found Year A of the Lectionary cycle the most difficult to preach and teach on because we focus mainly on Matthew's gospel. I find Matthew to be the most difficult gospel for me personally. Something about Matthew's laser-sharp focus on righteousness really challenges me. The parables of Jesus we've been considering lately have been particularly taxing, yet rewarding to study.

So I have good news and better news. The good news is we are finishing up Lectionary Year A this month. The better news is we end with three very challenging parables of Jesus! Are we surprised that this challenging year would end any other way?

First, on November 12, we will hear Jesus' parable of the wise and foolish virgins. Some brought enough oil to make their lamps last all night; others did not come prepared and ended up left out in the cold. This harsh parable can, at first glance, discourage generosity and sharing. Yet Jesus' main point, as we will see, is about the need to be prepared and ready whenever the kingdom comes among us.

On November 19 we will consider another parable—this time, one that ends with "weeping and gnashing of teeth." Brace yourselves for this one. This is the parable of the talents. A man goes on a journey and leaves his slaves in charge of his property. Two slaves invest their talents, making a healthy profit to pass on to the master. The third, however, buries his talent and returns it in the same condition he received it. For this seemingly faithful service, he gets stripped of what he has and thrown out to weep and gnash his teeth in the outer darkness. This is one of the most challenging parables and will be great food for thought for us to work on together on the 19th.

And finally, in our last Sunday of the liturgical year on November 26 we will consider another humdinger of a parable: The parable of the sheep and the goats. There are indeed high stakes in this parable: the righteous sheep will enter eternal life; the unrighteous goats will go into eternal punishment according to Jesus. I hope I'm a sheep, how about you?

I can't think of a more challenging, yet more rewarding way to close out this church year together. The term "challenging" can be a negative thing—it can mean tough, taxing, or exhausting. On the other hand, "challenging" can have more positive meanings—it can mean interesting, stimulating, and thought-provoking. I pray we will always find Jesus' words not just difficult, but also invigorating. May his difficult words work in us to produce the response of discipleship. May the study and worship we do together equip us for the life of faith to which we are called. I'll see you in church this month!




LEST WE FORGET...

JOINT SUPPER CLUB WILL MEET IN DECEMBER!!!



LECTIONARY FOR NOVEMBER 2023

November 5 - All Saints Sunday

All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

First Reading - Revelation 7:9-17

The book of Revelation is written to seven churches in western Asia Minor during a time of great oppression. Today's reading is a response to the question asked in 6:17: "Who is able to stand?" The writer gives the faithful the assurance of God's protection and a vision of victory.

Psalm - Psalm 34:1-10, 22

Fear the LORD, you saints of the LORD; for those who fear the LORD lack nothing. (Ps. 34:9)

Second Reading - 1 John 3:1-3

A saint is one who has been set apart by God for God's purposes. God, out of divine love, set us apart to be the children of God. Our holy hope is that we shall see God as God really is.

Gospel – Matthew 5:1-12

In the Beatitudes, Jesus provides a unique description of those who are blessed with God's favor. His teaching is surprising and shocking to those who seek wealth, fame, and control over others.

November 12 - 24th Sunday After Pentecost

Today the prophet Amos calls for justice to roll down like waters. Paul urges us to encourage one another with the promised coming of the Lord. Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Surrounded by the faithful of every time and place, we celebrate Christ's coming in our midst in the word of life and the feast of victory—the marriage feast of the lamb.

First Reading - Amos 5:18-24

In the days of Amos, people thought that the day of the LORD would be a time of great victory, but Amos announced that it would be a day of darkness, not light. He said liturgy is no substitute for obedience. The LORD demands justice and righteousness in the community.

Psalm - Psalm 70

You are my helper and my deliverer; O LORD, do not tarry. (Ps. 70:5)

Second Reading - 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Some of the Thessalonians are worried that dead Christians will be excluded from the resurrection to eternal life when Christ comes again. Paul reassures them with the word of hope that all Christians, living or dead, will be raised into everlasting life with Christ.

Gospel - Matthew 25:1-13

Jesus tells a parable about his own second coming, emphasizing the need for readiness at all times.

November 19 - 25th Sunday After Pentecost

Our readings during November speak of the end times. Zephaniah proclaims that the coming day of the LORD will be filled with wrath and distress. Paul says it will come like a thief in the night and urges us to be awake and sober. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. In a world filled with violence and despair, we gather around signs of hope—word, water, bread, and wine—eager to welcome the good news of Christ's coming among us.

First Reading - Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

Zephaniah (like the prophet Amos in last week's first reading) presents the day of the LORD as one of judgment and wrath. Descriptions of the last day in the New Testament include details taken from Old Testament accounts of the day of the LORD.

Psalm - Psalm 90:1-8 [9-11] 12

So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. (Ps. 90:12)

Second Reading – 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Though we do not know and cannot calculate the day of Christ's return, we live faithfully in the here and now as we anticipate the day when we will be given eternal salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel – Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus tells a parable about his second coming, indicating that it is not sufficient merely to maintain things as they are. Those who await his return should make good use of the gifts that God has provided them.

November 26 – 26th Sunday After Pentecost

On this final Sunday of the church year our gospel is Jesus' great story of judgment. In the end, the faithful are those who served Christ by ministering to those who are poor, hungry, naked, sick, or estranged. In the first reading God is the shepherd who seeks the lost, weak, and injured and feeds them with justice. We gather this day to celebrate the reign of Christ and his victory over death, yet we await the consummation of all things yet to come. Acknowledging Christ as our merciful ruler, we go forth that his reign may be known in our loving words and deeds.

First Reading - Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Because Israel's kings proved to be bad shepherds, Ezekiel declares that the LORD will assume the role of shepherd in Israel. The LORD will also set over them a shepherd-messiah, "my servant David," who will feed and care for the people.

Psalm - Psalm 95:1-7a

We are the people of God's pasture and the sheep of God's hand. (Ps. 95:7)

Second Reading - Ephesians 1:15-23

In this passage, God is praised for revealing ultimate divine power in raising Jesus from the dead. The resurrected, exalted Christ is Lord of both the church and the entire universe, now and in the age to come.

Gospel - Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus compares himself to a king who moves among his subjects to see how he is treated: what is done for the least of those who belong to his family is truly done for him. PAGE 15 XLVII, ISSUE XI


