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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

LOOKING BACK AT GOOD SHEPHERD

(Note: For the next year, each newsletter will highlight various aspects of the 75-year history of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, including reminiscences from members. Forest Acres was a vastly different place more than 75 years ago when the S.C. Lutheran Synod sent a young pastor to the growing area to work at developing a mission congregation.

That energetic, hard-working young pastor was Rev. Harold F. Park, and it wasn't long before he had gathered a group very interested in forming a new congregation.

The group held its first meeting August 9 at the home of Frank and Margaret Leaphart on Verner Street, not far from the current Good Shepherd campus.

Things moved quickly, and the fledgling congregation had its first worship service September 11, 1949, in the chapel at Carolina Children's Home

The proper beginning of any service is with silent prayer during the playing of the Prelude. Pray that our worship is acceptable to God and that our hearts are open to His message.

CORDIAL WELCOME is extended to all who are present. All are welcome guests in God's House. This is our first service together. We hope that you will find warm fellowship here, and that many Christian friendships will be made in this congregation.

USHERS TODAY - Earle M. Marsh, John W. Muller and W.H. Gilmore, Jr.

(then called Carolina Orphan Home). On Feb. 5, 1950, 65 confirmed adult members signed the charter making Good Shepherd a congregation of the S.C. Synod. There also were 22 child members. Pastor Park was called as pastor. (Another 22 adults signed the charter in succeeding months. A plaque with all 87 names is in the Narthex.)

Services continued at CCH for a year before the congregation was able to buy a three-acre tract with a large two-story home at Madison Rd. and Forest Drive. Madison continued to be an unpaved street until the mid '50s. The house was converted to space for worship and Sunday School, with the pastor living on the top floor for a while, with services beginning there September 9, 1951.

In 1955 the first sanctuary was built, and the first service was held there in March, 1956. That building now is the church office complex and chapel. The educational building was finished in 1960, and the FAB was built in 1980. As a result of continued congregational growth, the present sanctuary was built in 1992. This completed the Good Shepherd campus as we now know it.

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SHARING CHURCH MEMORIES

Although Harvey and Gloria Robinson and their sons Larry and Stan were not charter members, they joined Good Shepherd in late 1951 and were able to experience worship and Sunday School in the "White House" and in the original sanctuary. The Robinsons lived on Vallejo Circle not far from the church. The boys went to local schools, and Larry was in the first A.C. Flora graduating class in 1962.

Larry and his wife Mackey continue to be Good Shepherd members (with a break while they were living out of state for Larry's work). Stan and his wife Lyn continue to be members as well.

Larry shared with us a variety of printed materials from those years and looked back fondly on those early days. He recalls Sunday School in the White House with lots of kids from the neighborhood attending as well. "Julius Hair was a wonderful teacher," Larry remembers.

In his early teens, Larry spent a lot of time with Pastor Harold Park in confirmation classes, learning what it means to be a Lutheran Christian. "I really appreciated my time with Pastor Park," Larry said. He and five other young people were confirmed in 1958 and became adult members of the congregation. Stan was confirmed in 1960.

Pastor Park's first sermon in the first sanctuary in 1956 stands out for Larry. "I remember so well the Pastor compared the sanctuary to a ship. That really stuck in my mind." (Note: A boat is an ancient symbol for the church. Signifying a vessel of salvation, the boat was often used to portray the church. A picture of our first sanctuary taken during construction looks quite like an inverted ship.)

Larry has especially fond memories of Luther League (forerunner of Lutheran Church Youth) and his time as a Boy Scout. "We really enjoyed each other's company in League," he said. "That's where we had a lot of our social activities as well as growing in our faith." He remembers lots of dances and hayrides. "Those were a lot of fun. In fact, my first 'date' with Mackey was on a Luther League hayride!" (Larry and Mackey were married in 1967.)

His involvement in scouting was particularly important to him. Good Shepherd didn't have a scout troop so Larry was part of the troop at St. Martin's in the Fields Episcopal Church. In fact, he had a record of perfect attendance at scout meetings for seven years.

But his involvement at Good Shepherd was vital to his working toward a special scout honor, the Pro Deo et Patria (For God and Country) Award. The first of six requirements is "Christian service of at least 150 hours," and that's where Good Shepherd came in. "For a year, I helped Pastor Park in the church," he recalled. "I cleaned out bulletins, changed the numbers on the hymn board, and did whatever else he needed me to do. It was a really good experience." Larry received the award in August, 1958.



Larry and Mackey live in Northeast Richland not far from Spring Valley High School. Medical issues prevent him from getting out very much, but he loves contact with people. He'd no doubt enjoy hearing from members of the congregation that meant so much to him in his faith development.

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THE 'WHITE HOUSE'



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LECTIONARY FOR NOVEMBER 2024

November 3 - All Saints Sunday

Of all three years of the lectionary cycle, this year's All Saints readings have the most tears. Isaiah and Revelation look forward to the day when God will wipe away all tears; in John's gospel, Jesus weeps along with Mary and all the gathered mourners before he demonstrates his power over death. On All Saints Day we celebrate the victory won for all the faithful dead, but we grieve for our beloved dead as well, knowing that God honors our tears. We bring our grief to the table and find there a foretaste of Isaiah's feast to come.

First Reading - Isaiah 25:6-9

Isaiah sees a vision of the end of days, when God will gather all people on God's holy mountain and will prepare for them a rich feast. At this banquet God will wipe the tears from all eyes. And there will be no more sorrow, for God will destroy death itself.

Psalm - Psalm 24

They shall receive blessing from the God of their salvation. (Ps. 24:5)

Second Reading - Revelation 21:1-6a

Here is a vision of the new heaven and new earth in which God resides fully with God's people so that mourning, despair, and pain have been eradicated. These renewing words from the God who spans all of time are trustworthy and true.

Gospel - John 11:32-44

Through the raising of Lazarus, Jesus offers the world a vision of the life to come, when death and weeping will be no more.

November 10 - Twenty-fifth Sunday After Pentecost

Widows are visible everywhere in today's readings. Jesus denounces those scribes who pray impressive prayers but devour widows' houses. He commends the poor widow who in his view gave far more than the major donors. Jesus doesn't see her simply as an object of compassion or charity. She, like the widow of Zarephath who shares her last bit of food with Elijah, does something of great importance.

First Reading - 1 Kings 17:8-16

This chapter begins the story of Elijah. God sends a drought on Israel because of the sins of King Ahab. This passage depicts God's saving acts not only on behalf of Elijah, but also on behalf of those who are associated with the prophet, even a foreigner, the widow of Zarephath.

Psalm - Psalm 146

The LORD lifts up those who are bowed down. (Ps. 146:8) Second Reading – Hebrews 9:24-28

The letter to the Hebrews describes Christ as a high priest

who offers himself as a sacrifice for our sin. Christ does not die again and again each year. He died once, is alive with God, and will reveal himself on the last day.

Gospel - Mark 12:38-44

After engaging in a series of public arguments with religious leaders in the temple, Jesus contrasts the proud and oppressive ways of those leaders with the sacrificial humility and poverty of the widow.

November 17 - Twenty-six Sunday After Pentecost

November begins with All Saints Day and ends in or near Advent, when we anticipate Christ's coming again. It is fitting, then, that the readings today tell of the final resurrection and the end time. In the turmoil of hope, fear, and disbelief that these predictions provoke in us. Hebrews sounds a note of confident trust. Christ makes a way for us where there is no way, and we walk it confidently, our hearts and bodies washed in baptismal water, trusting the one who has promised forgiveness. The more we see the last day approaching, the more important it is to meet together to provoke one another to love.

First Reading - Daniel 12:1-3

The book of Daniel is an example of apocalyptic literature, which is full of strange visions and symbolism. Arising during times of great persecution, apocalyptic literature is concerned with God's revelation about the end time and the coming kingdom of God, when God will vindicate the righteous who have been persecuted.

Psalm - Psalm 16

My heart is glad and my spirit rejoices; my body shall rest in hope. (Ps. 16:9)

Second Reading – Hebrews 10:11-25

Images of worship and sacrifice are used throughout Hebrews to highlight what Christ has uniquely accomplished through his death. Because we have received forgiveness through Christ's death, we live with sincere hearts by trusting in God's promises and encouraging love and good works from each other.

Gospel - Mark 13:1-8

In the last week of his life, Jesus warned his disciples concerning trials that were to come upon them and upon the world. He exhorts the listener: Do not be alarmed.

November 24 - Christ the King

Even after Israel had experienced the vagaries of kings, the people still longed for a true king to set things right. He would have the king's title of Anointed One (Messiah); he would be the "one like a human being" (Son of Man) given dominion in Daniel's vision. Jesus is given these titles, even though he is nothing like an earthly king. His authority comes from the truth to which he bears witness, and those who recognize the truth voluntarily listen to him. We look forward to the day he is given dominion, knowing his victory will be the nonviolent victory of love.

First Reading - Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14

To the community for whom this passage was written, it seemed as though the oppression they were experiencing would never end. Daniel's message is: It shall end. The Ancient One, who is judge, will call all nations to account and will give dominion to "one like a human being," the Messiah.

Psalm - Psalm 93

Ever since the world began, your throne has been established. (Ps. 93:2)

Second Reading – Revelation 1:4b-8

The book of Revelation begins by celebrating the Almighty God, who spans all of time. Similarly, Jesus is celebrated as the firstborn from the dead who rules over the world's rulers. He is the one whose return we eagerly await.

Gospel - John 18:33-37

In John's gospel, the story of Jesus and Pilate presents two different ways of exercising power: through force or with love. PAGE 19 XLVIII, ISSUE XI


