In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:
'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight.
⁵ Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth,
⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.' " -Luke 3:1-6

One of the remarkable things about Luke's gospel is that the author goes to great lengths to "write an orderly account" of the story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. One of the hallmarks of Luke's gospel is the way he grounds the story in the religious and political happenings of the time.

In fact, it is in large part due to Luke's "orderly account" that we know the approximate date of Jesus' ministry. The 15th year of Tiberius' reign would have been 29 AD. Later in chapter 3, Luke tells us Jesus was "about 30 years old" when he began his ministry. That puts Jesus' birth around the year 1 BC or 1 AD, give or take a year or two. Obviously, this is why we mark our time with BC (Before Christ) and AD (Anno Domini—in the year of the Lord).

Notice that when Luke introduces John the Baptist, he begins by identifying some important religious and political figures. He mentions Tiberius Caesar, the most powerful and important person in the world at that time. Then he mentions several of Tiberius' underlings—Pilate, Herod Antipas, Philip, and Lysanius. These powerful men were the unquestioned rulers of the regions in which John and Jesus would do ministry. He then mentions Annas and Caiaphas as high priests. These two figures will, like Herod and Pilate, play an important role in Jesus' eventual trial and crucifixion. More to the point, however, they were the unquestioned religious authorities in the realm for most of the people to whom John and Jesus would minister.

It is against the backdrop of this political and religious regime that Luke then drops the surprising news: The word of God came and it came not to Herod or Pilate; not to Philip or Lysanius; not to Annas or Caiaphas; not even to Tiberius himself! The word of God came to John. And the word didn't come in Rome or Jerusalem or Galilee. It came in the wilderness.

This theme of God's work in unknown and unexpected places is one of the most surprising things about the gospel and it is also something that Luke really plays up and celebrates. Just as Jesus was born in an unexpected town at an unexpected time, so did the word of God come to an unexpected place and

time and through an unexpected person. God chose John, a relatively unknown figure, to bear the gospel message and prepare the way for Jesus. John came in the wilderness and began to baptize. And most shocking of all, crowds began to descend on the wilderness. People journeyed from miles around to the middle of nowhere beside the muddy Jordan river to hear the word of God through John. He was an unlikely prophet at an unlikely time.

I can't help but think that we are living in a time where folks are again hungry and thirsty for the word of God. They may look to many sources for a fulfilling word. It is easy, living in an election year in a politically tense time, to seek truth and hope from political sources. It is easy during an age of megachurches and televangelists to look for salvation and life among the wealthy and powerful preachers of our day and age. Your neighbors are eager for a word of hope; a word of peace; a word of life. They are desperate for a word from God.

And though they may look for such a word from a President or a President-elect, the truth is that the word of God they need to hear most is going to come from you. You, a relatively unknown person, in the grand scheme of things. You, living in a relatively modest place and situation. The word of God has come to you—that's why you're a part of this congregation and why you're reading this newsletter right now. And now, the word of God is working in and through you to share the gospel with all whom you meet.

Your words matter. Your actions matter. May all you say and do reflect the love of Christ for the world. May others hear and see the gospel through you. And may you, like John before you, be that voice of one crying out in the wilderness to make a way for Jesus in the lives of those whom you know and meet.

When Joe Biden is President and Donald Trump is President-elect; when Henry McMaster is Governor of South Carolina; when folks like Joel Osteen and Franklin Graham seem to be the loudest religious voices in our world, the word of God comes to you and comes through you to others. Prepare the way of the Lord and make his paths straight, that all may see the salvation of our God.

"Soul, Feel Your Worth"

One of our most beloved Christmas songs is, "O Holy Night" which is most well known as a solo and most appreciated when the soprano sings the high note near the end. The words come from a French poet, Placide Cappeau, and are part of the poem, "Minuit Chretiens," which means, "midnight Christians." It was set to music in 1847 by French composer, Adophe Adam, and translated into English by John Dwight in 1855.

While I have always enjoyed the famous refrain, "Fall on your knees," and the musical climax that concludes the refrain, what has spoken to my heart are the words of the first verse, "long lay the world in sin and error, pining (yearning) till he appeared and the **soul felt its worth.** A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices for yonder breaks a new and glorious morn." We talk about unwrapping presents every Christmas season and these words go a long way in unwrapping the entire salvation story, which is the greatest present in history. The story of Jesus' incarnation (becoming human) is a story of God's love for God's people, a story of hope and healing and a story that gives worth and value to our entire beings. **Soul, feel your worth!!**

For centuries the fracture of creation from creator, of God's people from God and of people in all times and places from one another had gone on without resolution or hope. Hundreds of pages in the Bible describe endless wars, destruction of all kinds, famines, idolatry and human behaviors that go against loving God and loving neighbor. In Ezekiel we read, "I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep and I will feed them with justice." In Jeremiah we read, "I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and write the law on their hearts and I will be their God and they shall be my people." And from Isaiah we hear, "For unto us a child is born, a son is given. His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace."

As our Advent preparation leads us to the Christmas story and Jesus' birth we discover "God with us" in Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection. Our hope is restored, our dignity and value are affirmed and we are set free to fully love God and neighbor. Celebrate the season knowing that "when he appeared, **the soul felt its worth.**" A blessed Advent and Christmas season to all!!

EARLINE SUYDAM: 70 YEARS OF 'LOVE' AT GOOD SHEPHERD



When Earline Suydam says, "I Love You," she really means it!

During her nearly 70 years as a Good Shepherd member, she has given that sincere greeting to untold numbers of people. As she often puts it, "How will they know it if I don't tell them?"

Earline and her late husband Henry joined Good Shepherd in May,1955, when the congregation was meeting in the "White House on the Hill." So, she has been a first-hand observer of Good Shepherd's campus growth to the old sanctuary (now the office complex), the educational building, the FAB and the current sanctuary.

During all those years, the importance of her church has remained the same. "My friends, my family, my church all mean the world to me," she says. "The church has always given something to me."

And Earline has certainly given a lot to the church. As Good Shepherd's oldest member at age 98 plus, she is a wonderful example of faithfulness...a model of the Godly life. Virtually every Sunday, she can be seen on her usual pew just in front of the pulpit. "When we moved to the sanctuary (in 1992), I picked out a pew close to the pulpit so I'd be able to hear the pastor when I got old," she laughs. She rarely misses a service and Sunday School, so when she isn't there, people get concerned.

On a recent Sunday afternoon, Earline had a visit from two of our active teenage members, Savannah (17) and Blake (14) Gross. Both were baptized and confirmed at Good Shepherd. It was a wonderful sharing opportunity for different generations to get to know each other better. Savannah and Blake went away knowing much more about one of our most faithful members, and as Earline said, "I now have two more friends." And of course she told them several times, "I love you!"

Ever the gracious hostess, Earline had to offer food to her visitors. She brought out ice cream, cookies, cheese and crackers, and candy. Asked to give a one word description of their new friend, Savannah said "Vivacious." For Blake, "Impressive" came to mind. Both very fitting words for Earline.

During the visit, Earline shared her life story in capsule form. A lifelong Lutheran, she grew up in Chapin, one of nine children. Church and Sunday School attendance were a weekly routine. "We just didn't miss," she said.

She and Henry married in 1948. He was a Methodist. "I was willing to be a Methodist, but I really wanted to



stay a Lutheran," she recalled. For a number of years, they drove up to Chapin each weekend to visit her family and to attend Mt. Horeb Lutheran Church!

Good Shepherd's first pastor, Harold Park, was a native of Chapin. Earline's family was friends with his family. Earline's mother told Pastor Park she knew where he could find some new members. He reached out to Earline and Henry, and soon they became Good Shepherd members. Their son Rusty was one of the first babies to

be baptized in the old sanctuary. All three Suydams were very active members. At various times Henry and Earline taught Sunday School. Rusty was an acolyte and crucifer. Church was an integral part of their lives.

Earline helped start the 3K program at Timmerman School and taught there for 25 years. For many years she was a fixture in children's Sunday School at Good Shepherd. She has had the opportunity to get to know all the pastors who've served at Good Shepherd. "I've loved all my pastors," she says. "They all had their strengths. And I knew I could call on them if I needed them."



For many years Earline served as a greeter before service, and she says she'd like to see us start that again as a way to help the pastor. Of

course, she can be found between worship and Sunday School virtually every week chatting with friends, greeting visitors, checking on people...telling people she loves them...and meaning it!



There have been some challenging periods for her, and her faith and positive spirit have been a big support for her. A particularly difficult time was a nine-month period from April 2011 to January 2012. Her only child Rusty died from ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease), husband Henry died in October, brother-in-law Fred Klein died in November, and older sister Sara Klein died in January. "I found myself at one point sitting in my chair getting depressed," she said. "I told myself 'Earline, you can sit there feeling sorry for yourself, or you can get up and do something.' I decided to get up and do something."


Her faithfulness and positive attitude continue to be a great example for the rest of us. And how fortunate we are to see her in church virtually every week...and to hear he heartfelt "I love you." As she puts it, "As long as these old legs will take me, I'll be there!"

Sometimes the best measure of a person is what others say about her. Here are some thoughts from a couple of Good Shepherd members.

Ben Haigh: Does she realize the positive impact she has had on so many over the years and the number of lives she has touched that she has never met? I can think of several ways she has influenced my behavior out in the community just by actions I have witnessed from her at Good Shepherd. The genuine happiness she has when she greets you like it's what she has looked forward to all day. Or the attention she gives when you talk about something that may be trivial to most (It's the main reason she's the last to arrive in Sunday School class!). She just has an authentic love for all she encounters and it helps me try to be a better person to others.



Alice Buckner: When Charles and I joined GSLC in 2010, Earline consistently warmly welcomed us, every Sunday. Hers was the first name we knew, even though we thought her name was Pearline! She was so warm and welcoming, something we will never forget. Been in love with her ever since.



Good Shepherd Lutheran Church 75 Years Walking in the Spirit Congregational Retreat



LECTIONARY FOR DECEMBER 2024

December 1 – First Sunday of Advent

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Jesus' contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Man." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of Christ in word and supper.

First Reading – Jeremiah 33:14-16

In the Old Testament, "righteousness" often has to do with being faithful in relationship. God acts righteously both in punishing Israel for its sin and in having mercy. In today's reading, Jerusalem's future name—"The LORD is our righteousness"—proclaims that God is even now working salvation for Israel.

Psalm – Psalm 25:1-10

To you, O LORD, I lift up my soul. (Ps. 25:1)

Second Reading – 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13

Upon Timothy's report from the congregation at Thessalonica, Paul is exuberant with gratitude for them. In this passage from his letter, Paul voices overflowing thanks, joy, and blessings for the people of this growing church.

Gospel - Luke 21:25-36

God will fulfill God's purposes and, already, hidden signs of that fulfillment abound. On that great day there will be dismay, perplexity, confusion, and terror, but God's people shall be given strength to stand boldly and receive God's promised redemption.

December 8 – Second Sunday of Advent

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Christ as forerunner of the LORD of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of Jesus and assist all people in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

First Reading – Malachi 3:1-4

God announces a covenant with Israel. A messenger like Malachi (his name means "my messenger") will prepare the way for the coming of the Lord by purifying and refining God's people, as silver and gold are refined.

Psalm - Luke 1:68-79

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us. (Lk. 1:78)

Second Reading – Philippians 1:3-11

The apostle Paul was the pastor of many new churches. He writes in this letter about his joy to be in partnership with the Christians of Philippi. Listen to how tender-hearted Paul, sometimes a stern preacher, is with his friends as he encourages them to grow in love and knowledge.

Gospel – Luke 3:1-6

John the Baptist is a herald of Jesus, whose way is prepared by "repentance for the forgiveness of sins." As we hear the careful record of human leaders, we sense the spectrum of political and religious authority that will be challenged by this coming Lord. December 15 – Third Sunday of Advent

Christ's presence in our midst in the wonder of the holv supper is cause for singing. The nearness of the God in prayer, in every circumstance, is cause for rejoicing. The coming of one "more powerful" than John, even with a winnowing fork in hand, is good news-and cause for exultation-for us who are being saved. Great joy is the tone for the third Sunday of Advent.

First Reading – Zephaniah 3:14-20

The prophet Zephaniah's message is mostly one of judgment for sin. This reading, however, which comes from the conclusion of the

book, prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation is at hand.

Psalm – Isaiah 12:2-6

In your midst is the Holy One of Israel. (Is. 12:6)

Second Reading – Philippians 4:4-7

Despite being in prison, Paul is remarkably upbeat as he writes this letter. Here, he urges his friends in Philippi to trust God with all their worries and concerns with the hope that they will experience God's joy and peace.

Gospel – Luke 3:7-18

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one who is coming. John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity.

December 22 – Fourth Sunday of Advent

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion-with high

First Reading - Micah 5:2-5a

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

Psalm – Luke 1:46b-55

You, Lord, have lifted up the lowly. (Lk. 1:52)

Second Reading – Hebrews 10:5-10

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

Gospel – Luke 1:39-55

Elizabeth, John's mother, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, are two women filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. In Elizabeth's inspired greeting and Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things.

December 29 – First Sunday of Christmas

On the first Sunday of Christmas we find the boy Samuel and the boy Jesus, both in the temple, both growing in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and humankind. We too have returned to the house of God "to sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God," who has gifted us with a savior. As the festival continues, "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." It is Christmas, still.

First Reading - 1 Samuel 2:18-20, 26

Having dedicated her son Samuel to God's service, Hannah visits him every year when she and her husband Elkanah come to the temple to offer sacrifices. God grants Hannah more children, and Samuel himself gains favor in the sight of all.

Psalm – Psalm 148

The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13) Second Reading – Colossians 3:12-17

Just as newly baptized Christians in the early church were clothed with new garments upon arising from the baptismal waters, so all who have received God's gift of life in Jesus Christ are covered with the character of Christ.

Gospel – Luke 2:41-52

Jesus grew up in a family that went to the Passover festival each year. It was in this environment of faithful adherence to the law that Jesus grew into spiritual maturity and an understanding of his identity and mission.
