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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

"For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us."

-Romans 12:4-6a

I never knew how important my right index finger was to me until my senior year of seminary. In the spring of that year I was playing softball with some seminary

classmates and their families. My father happened to be playing on the other team. I was in the field, playing third base. My dad was up at bat and hit a hard ground ball right to me. When I went to field the ball, it hit a rock and bounced up into my right index finger (my non-glove hand, of course.) I knew immediately from the cracking sound and the pain that my finger was broken. It was a struggle to do my normal activities for weeks thereafter.

Even preaching was difficult. I served as a supply preacher during that time and one Sunday the Gospel lesson was Jesus' raising Lazarus. In that story, Lazarus comes out with his body still wrapped in burial cloths. I could tell the congregation that day was listening to my reading of the gospel, but I could also tell they had an eye on my taped finger, trying to figure out what sort of object lesson I had planned. I had to explain that my taped finger was a coincidental injury and wasn't a sermon illustration.

I never realized how important that one small part of my body was until I couldn't use it. If you've ever been injured, you know first-hand how challenging it is to function without your members working properly. I wonder if Paul had this mental image in mind when he wrote to the church at Rome about the body of Christ and its members working together. A finger is small and unimpressive, but without it we can't easily type, point, dial a phone, write, or drive a car. The feet are often an afterthought until we find we can't easily get around without them. The eyes are taken for granted until they become clouded or a spec of dirt gets in one of them. The heart isn't normally visible, but without it we cannot live.

That is why Paul says we each have our own function and we belong to one another. We need not all do the same things or be the same. In fact, the body is better off for having specialized and diverse gifts and abilities. As we come up on the time of year for renewing our financial commitments to the church as well as offering our time and talents to the church, I urge you to prayerfully consider this passage from Romans. We need one another. Our church needs you. We need the unique gifts God has given you in order to make us whole. We belong to one another. As we enter this time of renewing our commitments, I encourage you to consider what God and the church can do with a bit more time, money, and service given by each of us. Sure, your \$5 more per month might not seem large. But imagine if 100 of our members or families gave \$5 more per month. That would be \$6,000 we could put toward new ministries or deeper investment in our current ministries.

Imagine if 100 of our members or families gave \$5 more per week. That would be \$26,000 next year we could invest into meaningful ministry. I spend more than that on coffee each week, so I know I can spare it.

If you commit to serving on altar guild or serving in our visitation ministry or setting up for meals or helping in the food pantry or building wheelchair ramps, that one act may seem small. But imagine what 100 of us giving 5 hours a month or 5 hours a week more to our ministry would mean to those whose lives are changed by it.

FELLOWSHIP CLASS DONATIONS

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

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LECTIONARY FOR OCTOBER 2025

<u>OCTOBER 5 – SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

A little faith goes a long way is Jesus' point in the gospel. A mustard seed's-worth of faith has miraculous potential. The patience, tenacity, and endurance required for the life of faith are the blessings received in holy baptism, holy communion, and the word read and proclaimed in this assembly. Anticipate them. Receive them with thanksgiving.

FIRST READING - Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

Injustice and violence in the time leading up to the Babylonian exile move this prophet to lament: How can a good and all-powerful God see evil in the world and seemingly remain indifferent? God answers by proclaiming that the righteous will live by faith.

PSALM – Psalm 37:1-9

Commit your way to the LORD; put your trust in the LORD. (Ps. 37:5)

SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 1:1-14

This letter written to Timothy is a personal message of encouragement. In the face of hardship and persecution, Timothy is reminded that his faith is a gift of God. He is encouraged to exercise that faith with the help of the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL - Luke 17:5-10

On the way to Jerusalem, Jesus instructs his followers about the power of faith and the duties of discipleship. He calls his disciples to adopt the attitude of servants whose actions are responses to their identity rather than works seeking reward.

<u>OCTOBER 12 – EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

It's a miracle! Multiple miracles! The waters of holy baptism have healed us. The body and blood of Jesus in holy communion have made us clean. We have died with Christ and been raised with him. For all this we have returned to offer thanks. From this place we are sent on our way rejoicing to share the good news.

FIRST READING - 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, a Syrian general, suffers from leprosy. In this passage Elisha miraculously cures his illness, but only after Naaman realizes, with the help of his servants, that he also needs healing for his pride. This foreign general then acknowledges the sovereignty of the God of Israel.

PSALM - Psalm 111

I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart. (Ps. 111:1)

SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Though Paul is chained as a prisoner, the word of God is never shackled or confined. Timothy is encouraged to proclaim that word of freedom in an honest and upright life as well as in his teaching and preaching.

GOSPEL - Luke 17:11-19

Jesus' mission includes making people clean again.
Unexpectedly, a Samaritan healed of leprosy becomes a
model for those who would praise and worship God and give
thanks for God's mercy.

<u>OCTOBER 19 – NINETEENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

Pray always. Do not lose heart. This is Christ's encouragement in the gospel today. Wrestle with the word. Remember your baptism again and again. Come regularly to Christ's table. Persistence in our every encounter with the divine will be blessed.

FIRST READING - Genesis 32:22-31

Returning to the home he had fled many years before after stealing his brother's birthright and his father's blessing, Jacob wrestles all night long with a divine adversary who ultimately blesses him and changes his name to "Israel," a name that means "he wrestles with God."

PSALM - Psalm 121

My help comes from the LORD, the maker of heaven and earth. (Ps. 121:2)

SECOND READING - 2 Timothy 3:17-4:5

The writer of this letter continues his instruction of Timothy, his younger colleague in ministry, by emphasizing the importance of faithful teaching despite opposition.

GOSPEL - Luke 18:1-8

Jesus tells a parable of an unjust judge who is worn down by a widow's pleas. Jesus is calling God's people to cry out for justice and deliverance. For if an unethical judge will ultimately grant the plea of a persistent widow, how much more will God respond to those who call.

OCTOBER 26 – REFORMATION SUNDAY

Genuine repentance and pretentious piety stand in stark contrast in the gospel and all around us. All creation stands in need of God's forgiveness. Keep the faith. God's people shall be accounted righteous for Jesus' sake. Our God is merciful to sinners. For this we worship and glorify God forever.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 14:7-10, 19-22

In a time of drought, the people pray for mercy, repenting of their sins and the sins of their ancestors. They appeal to God to remember the covenant, to show forth God's power, and to heal their land by sending life-giving rain.

PSALM - Psalm 84:1-7

Happy are the people whose strength is in you. (Ps. 84:5)

SECOND READING – 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

The conclusion of this letter to a young minister offers a final perspective on life from one who faced death. Though others let him down, Paul was sure of his faith in the Lord, who stood by him and lent him strength.

GOSPEL - Luke 18:9-14

The coming reign of God will involve unexpected reversals of fortune with judgment rooted in mercy. Jesus tells a parable in which the one who humbles himself is exalted and the one who exalts his own righteousness is humbled.
