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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

The hymn "For All The Saints" often gets stuck in my head, and now that the season has arrived, it's finally the perfect time to sing it.

For all the saints who from their labors rest, who thee by faith before the world confessed, thy name, O Jesus, be forever blest. Alleluia! Alleluia! -William H. How

Certain hymns have that effect—they instantly connect us to a feeling or a moment. Like how "A Mighty Fortress" makes us think of the Reformation, or "Hark, The Herald Angels Sing!" instantly brings us to Christmas Eve. It's part of the beautiful mystery of our faith. Our worship engages all of our senses: the sound of a hymn, the cold touch of the baptismal waters, the taste of wine, the sight of the sanctuary. These are all ways God connects with us.

"For All The Saints," and All Saints' Day itself, powerfully connect us not only with God and with the members of Christ's body who are present with us today, but also with those faithful members who have gone before us.

Because Christ lives, we live—now and forever. We who are still living on earth are one in Christ with those who have died and find their rest in Christ. One day we will all be reunited because, for those who are in Christ, death is no longer the final word. We died to sin and death through our baptism and were raised to new life in Christ—a life that lasts. We give thanks for that gift of life this All Saint's Day.

We are one in Christ with all the great heroes of the faith—Peter, Mary Magdalene, Martin Luther, Mother Teresa. But we are also one with the saints we knew personally. When I hear this hymn, I think of my grandmother. I thank God for her quiet, strong, and faithful example.

The first All Saints' Day after she died in 2007, I felt empty and sad. Yet as the service unfolded—as we lit candles for the departed, sang "For All The Saints," and confessed our belief in the communion of saints—I realized for the first time that what we do in church is exactly what the heavenly multitude has been doing for all time: praising God.

Each time we gather for worship, we sing the unending hymn they sing:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord; God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory! Hosanna in the Highest!

We are joining a song that has been going on forever and will go on forever, shaking the very rafters of heaven in praise of our God, who defeated death and gives us life. That is a powerful truth.

This All Saints' Day and always, remember that all those whom we love who have died—parents, grandparents, children, friends, and all of God's beloved saints—find their rest in the same God who sustained them in this life and who sustains us in our life together.

That list of saints includes all those faithful souls who helped make Good Shepherd the amazing congregation that it is today. From the ones who built the foundation to the ones who worked quietly behind the scenes, this is a time to thank God for those faithful folks.

But that list of saints also includes YOU! As God continues to lead and guide us, you are one of those faithful souls God has called to trust, to love, and to follow. One day, future generations will look back on our life together and they will thank God—for all the saints.

Let us continue to live into this life together. Let's boldly approach the future, knowing that God is at the helm and that we have work to do—work to which we have been called and for which we have been gifted. Following the example of those faithful saints who have gone before us, let us labor together in this kingdom of God until we find rest in the one who holds us safely.

Join us each Wednesday in November from 4:00-5:00 pm for a community practice rooted in grace, gratitude, and gentle yoga. Grounding in Thanks-giving and in preparation for the reflective season of Advent, we will cultivate open hearts and calm minds.

We'll move mindfully and find stillness with each class offering chair yoga, breathwork, and meditation. GSLC member, Mary Aitchison (RYT-200) will guide these sessions in Classroom 1. All are welcome, no experience is needed.

I have received such lovely and thoughtful inquiries, so thought it helpful to share those insights here as well. This offering is free – it is free of cost and free of judgment. This is a supported chair yoga practice – we will remain seated throughout our time together, as even with this, there is opportunity to engage the whole body. There are well-documented physical and mental benefits to this type of practice – I ask you to honor your body, whatever your capability or experience. It is perfectly fine to join us, sitting in peace – sometimes that is where the greatest experience is attained. For me, it is heartening and very special to practice in community – I am continually inspired by our beautiful, kind, and supportive community, here, in Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

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LECTIONARY FOR NOVEMBER 2025

NOVEMBER 2 – ALL SAINTS SUNDAY

In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In holy communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. In worship today we give thanks for all the saints "who from their labors rest." In the same breath we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of Jesus in today's gospel. Sealed by the Spirit and sustained by the Savior's body and blood, we live with joy as God gives us breath, to the praise of God's glory.

FIRST READING - Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

The book of Daniel was written in the second century BCE, when the Syrian king Antiochus Epiphanes was severely persecuting the Jews. Daniel's vision of the four beasts proclaims that human kings will come and go, but the kingdom will ultimately belong to God and to God's people.

PSALM - Psalm 149

Sing the LORD's praise in the assembly of the faithful. (Ps. 149:1) **SECOND READING – Ephesians 1:11-23**

After giving thanks for the faith of the Ephesians, the writer of this letter prays that they might understand the wisdom, hope, and power of God that is embodied in Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL - Luke 6:20-31

In echoes of the prophet Isaiah and Mary's song of praise, Jesus reveals surprising things about who enjoys blessing and who endures woe. He invites his disciples to shower radical love, blessing, forgiveness, generosity, and trust even on enemies and outsiders.

<u>NOVEMBER 9 – TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY AFTER</u> <u>PENTECOST</u>

We worship on the first day of the week because Jesus was raised on that day. Every Sunday is a little Easter. This Sunday feels more like Easter than many as the appointed texts celebrate the reality of the resurrection. Live it up this Lord's day. Our God is the God of the living.

FIRST READING - Job 19:23-27a

Job suffers the loss of children, wealth, and health. Accused by his companions of wrongdoing, he knows himself to be innocent. Here, in the midst of his suffering, Job clings to the radical hope that his vindicator, his redeemer, lives; and that one day he himself will see God.

PSALM - Psalm 17:1-9

Keep me as the apple of your eye; hide me under the shadow of your wings. (Ps. 17:8)

SECOND READING – 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

This portion of the letter provides encouragement for the church at Thessalonica during a time of confusion and opposition, as some allowed their concern over Jesus' imminent return to divert them from the central teachings of the gospel.

GOSPEL – Luke 20:27-38

Some Sadducees, who do not believe in the resurrection of the dead, try to trap Jesus. They formulate the convoluted case of a serial widow who marries a succession of seven brothers. Jesus responds by teaching about God to whom all are alive and in whom all relationships are fulfilled.

<u>NOVEMBER 16 – TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY AFTER</u> PENTECOST

The end is near. There is no doubt about it. The warnings are dire. The tone of today's texts is ominous. But the baptized know how to live in the meantime. The baptized are strengthened for the living of these days in word and sacrament. The baptized rally around the invitation of the apostle: "Do not be weary in doing what is right."

FIRST READING - Malachi 4:1-2a

Malachi, whose name means "my messenger," warns that "the day is coming." On that day, the evil will be destroyed like stubble

in a fire, but the "sun of righteousness" will shine on those who honor God.

PSALM - Psalm 98

In righteousness will the LORD judge the world. (Ps. 98:9)

SECOND READING - 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Some members of the Thessalonian community, because of their belief in the nearness of Christ's return, had ceased to work, living off the generosity of other members of the community. The writer of this letter warns them bluntly that if they want to eat, they need to work

GOSPEL - Luke 21:5-19

As history moves toward God's fulfillment there will be frightening signs and events. Before the end, believers will draw strength from their relationship to God and will be given the words they need to testify and to endure without fear.

NOVEMBER 23 - CHRIST THE KING

Jeremiah's promise of the execution of "justice and righteousness in the land" finds ironic fulfillment in the execution of Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. It appears utterly contradictory that a king should be crucified with a criminal. This victory appears for all the world as humiliating defeat. Yet through the gate of death Jesus opens the door to paradise.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 23:1-6

Today's reading builds on the common, ancient Near Eastern metaphor of the king as shepherd. Judah's unjust rulers have caused their people, their "flock," to be scattered. Nevertheless, God will raise up a new and righteous shepherd who will rule a restored Judah.

PSALM - Psalm 46

I will be exalted among the nations. (Ps. 46:10)

SECOND READING – Colossians 1:11-20

An early Christian hymn praises the mystery of the political, personal, and mystical Christ, the one who was present at creation and is eternally reigning with God.

GOSPEL – Luke 23:33-43

Amid scoffing and slander from those who sarcastically call him Messiah and king, Jesus reveals that to be Messiah and king is to give one's life for others. Here he uses his power to welcome a despised sinner to paradise but puts his own death into God's hands.

NOVEMBER 30 – FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthen our faith in the promises of God.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace. Divine decisions will make war obsolete, and the worshiping community responds: "Let us walk in the light of that Lord now!"

PSALM - Psalm 122

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD." (Ps. 122:1)

SECOND READING - Romans 13:11-14

Paul compares the advent of Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

GOSPEL - Matthew 24:36-44

Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.
