#### **Committee Projects:**

- Food Pantry Anne Rush reported that the food pantry served 26 families including 98 individuals in February. The year-to-date totals served are 54 families and 191 individuals. The food pantry volunteers were very appreciative of the large amount of canned good donations received from the Burgers and Bingo Parish Life event.
- Meals on Wheels Don Caughman reported that there are 11 clients on GSLC's route with the same dependable and consistent volunteers as in the past. There was some discussion regarding the fact that while the clients certainly need the food provided, some are also just as much, if not more, in need of the human interaction.
- Fun Fridays In Susan Sturkie's absence, other volunteers offered that the February event on Valentine's Day had gone well.
- Ramp Ministry No report provided in the absence of Rod Kent. However, it is evident that work continues because of supplies that have been purchased.
- Family Promise Jim Johnson reported that GSLC along with partner congregations Eastminster Presbyterian and Ebenezer Lutheran will provide meals in April with Jim handling a meal on April 29. There will also be a bowling event in West Columbia around that same time which allows time to connect with the families. The 2025 Night of Promise Gala will be held on April 10<sup>th</sup> from 6:30-10:30 at the Columbia Convention Center and is a formal attire event including both a silent and live auction with speaker Craig Melvin. GSLC has been given 4 free tickets thanks to our generous grant to Family Promise from the Good Shepherd Foundation. Family Promise serves 3 to 4 families at a time with transitional housing and works with 30-40 families with advice on how to stay in their homes.
- More Justice Pastor Andrew Isenhower reported that the Executive Director of More Justice in Columbia, Lizzy Van Harn, attended a joint WELCA circle meeting recently and will also be the April POGS speaker. The annual large-gathering Nehemiah Action Assembly will be held on Monday, May 12, 2025, at a location yet to be determined.
- A.C. Flora Pastor Andrew Isenhower reported that the GSLC Foundation directed in excess funds from the grant for A. C. Flora backpacks to the A.C. Flora Food Pantry with the donation delivered in-person by Michelle Isenhower.

# **ACTION - Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Social Ministry Committee**

Date: March 19, 2025

#### **Actions Taken:**

Jim Johnson forwarded information from Ebenezer Lutheran Church about an urgent funding need for Lutheran Services Carolinas (LCS) refugee program. Recently, the federal government stopped the resettlement of legal refugees despite a long history of bi-partisan support for this issue. LSC's concern is that the refugee families who have already come to the United States will be adversely affected by the government's actions.

The chair emailed all committee members on 3/16/25 regarding this issue and to ask if the committee wanted to consider changing our monthly emphasis schedule to include LCS. Kerry Stubbs made a motion to change the monthly emphasis schedule to April – LCS, May – Palmetto Place, June – Project HOPE, and July – Big Red Barn. Suzanne Sanders seconded.

Email discussion began, and Don Caughman made a motion to amend the original motion so that Project HOPE would be in May due to the sheriff's office needing the funds to purchase fans for warm weather sooner, and Palmetto Place would be for June. Suzanne Sanders seconded the motion to amend. After allowing time for discussion, the vote to amend the original motion was 10 Yes votes and 0 No votes out of 15 committee members excluding the chair. The amendment was approved.

More time was allowed for discussion, and then the final vote was taken resulting in 9 Yes votes and 0 No votes with voting ending on 3/19/25. The motion was approved to change the monthly emphasis to the following.

April – Lutheran Services Carolinas May – Project HOPE June – Palmetto Place

July – Big Red Barn
