

DISCUSSION GUIDE November 19, 2023

PRAYER & POWER

James 5:13–20	
1.	Read through James 5:13–20. Give attention to the ways in which one's needs (suffering, sickness, wandering, etc.) are met by a praying community? Discern why this is important and how you can help make this kind of community.
2.	James 5:17 offers a particular glimpse toward the Old Testament prophet Elijah. What are two descriptions of him found in this verse and how can those descriptions inform our life of prayer?
3.	The "suffering" mentioned in James 5:13 gives a nod to those oppressed by financial injustice (see James 5:1–12). It is evident the one suffering should pray, yet the implication is the community should also pray. What injustices do we observe within our broader community and how might we specifically pray about those things?
4.	. Many are either not aware of the truth or have wandered from it (see James 5:19). What can it look like for you to be one of those who "save a soul from death"? See 2 Corinthians 2:15–17.
