WEARY WORLD, REJOICE: LONGING Isaiah 7:14

1. Read Isaiah 7:1–17. What is the text talking about? What is the "sign" spoken of and why does it matter? See Matthew 1:18–25 for additional insight.

2. Carefully read through Romans 8:16–19. Describe the "longing" that is addressed within these verses. How does this motivate us to help others with the "sufferings of this present time"?

3. Immanuel, as referenced in Isaiah 7:14 and Matthew 1:23, means "God with us." How can you use this statement to share the good news that Jesus will rescue "people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21)?

4. In Isaiah 7:1–17 a handful of nations are mentioned. Also, the genealogy found in Matthew 1, leading up to Matthew's declaration that Jesus is the promised "Immanuel" (Matthew 1:23), includes a variety of nationalities. What do these things say about God's interest in all peoples? How can we help the nations represented within our own cities experience Immanuel?
