

STATE OF THE CHURCH

President Jeff Maki summarized our top priorities for the upcoming year are to call a Lead Pastor and make sure our committees and finances meet the needs of the church. He noted that we have a very giving congregation, in time, money and talent! We have many committees and volunteers that make this church work. President Maki reflected back to 2022 - we provided funds for Afghan refugees and Lutheran World Relief for Ukraine. We had over \$60,000 in benevolence giving to these efforts. Also in 2022, we set up a committee for the 150th Anniversary, hired a new preschool director, continued many ministries including strong kid's ministries, the Scandinavian Food Fest, Befriender ministry, Columbarium Committee, HR, Endowment, Property Committee (new Security System) and many more.

As we discern our needs related to a future pastor, we will determine our vision and mission that will be used as input to the new pastor job description. Thank you to the Transition Team and those that attended the round table sessions to provide input. Once this process is complete, a Call Committee will be created to interview candidates and make recommendations to the Council and the Congregation. If you'd like to volunteer to join a committee, talk to anyone on the Church Council or the staff. We can help you find a place that suits your skills/interests.

Intentional Interim Pastor Update - Pastor Randy shared the importance of interim ministry being a time of intentional work to determine a vision. He shared the interim ministry timeline.

Adult Ministries Update - Pastor Kris Kurzejeski highlighted page seven of the Annual Report where the 2022 Adult ministry details can be found. If you have ideas for future adult ministries or bible studies, contact Pastor Kris.

Youth and Family Pastor Update - Pastor Ladd Sonnenberg introduced the Youth Ministry Team and highlighted 2022 programming including VBS participation and volunteers, Wednesday night classes, High School Youth Group, and upcoming Tanzania trip. He shared that the Creation Care Team was formed and are excited to support sustainability at Bethel!

Presentation of the New Church Council Candidates - Susan Richards introduced three new Church Council candidates: Nicole Lato, Kevin Carrier, and Lisa Wilt.

Proposed 2023 Budget and Ballot - Gwen Cossin reviewed the proposed 2023 budget.

Building Committee Update - Dawn Arnevik gave an update on the future building plans, no updates are expected until we have a new Senior Pastor.

Endowment Fund Update - Anne Wasmund gave an update on the status of this fund.

Benevolent Giving - Linda Williams-Tuenge gave an update. Benevolent giving was up; in 2022 benevolent giving totaled \$211,980.

Bethel Highlands Preschool - Missy Austreng shared details of accomplishments and 2023 goals including a new nature learning program where students will spend 30% of their day outside.

Results of Elections - Marshall Agrey shared the ballot results of a unanimous vote to accept new council members and unanimous vote to accept the 2023 budget.

Recognition of Service - Outgoing council members were recognized for their service: Linda Williams-Tuenge, Andrea Herzan, and Tim Rutten

A drawing was held for prizes.

FROM THE TREASURER - 2023 REPORT

Bethel continues to use six funds to account for its transactions:

- General Fund The main operating account for all regular giving and expenses
- fundraising for missions
- Preschool Fund Used exclusively for fees and expenses related to Bethel Highlands Preschool
- Wall, and Garden, located at the Highlands campus
- payments

Bethel prepares its financial statements on an accrual basis in order to appropriately match revenue and expenses. Reserve accounts are used to commit and identify funds designated for a specific purpose.

2023 Financial Statements

In 2023, the congregation once again showed their generosity in supporting the many ministries of Bethel through continued growth in offerings. Total offerings increased by 3% over 2022, which exceeded last year's growth of 2%. As a church council we want to extend our sincere gratitude for your continued financial support!

Bethel did realize an operating deficit in 2023 of \$58,900 (difference between operating income and operating expenses); however, this was less than the budgeted shortfall of \$97,000. While 2023 operational expenses did exceed offerings & programming income, the interest generated from our mutual funds of \$55,800 offset the majority of this deficit.

Bethel continues to operate without a mortgage, see improvements & growth for our memorial garden, benefit from special gifts out of the generosity of our Endowment and Women of Bethel, and fund needed maintenance, repairs and upgrades at both facilities.

Again, we are so grateful for your support in 2023 and look forward to the congregation's continued commitment in 2024.

Church Community Builder software is used to track member contributions. QuickBooks software is used for financial reporting purposes. Bethel maintains an "open book" policy relating to its finances such that any member is welcome to view financial detail upon request. Please feel free to contact me or members of Bethel's office staff.



Dear Members and Friends of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, It is time for your congregation's annual meeting! This is a great opportunity to reflect on the past year of faithful ministry. Now is the time to ask the BIG questions! How were we faithful in in ministry? How were we faithful in participating in God's simple mission to love our neighbor? Now is the time to celebrate how God's Spirit has inspired your ministry! Give thanks to God and celebrate for the good that your congregation has accomplished!

Now is also the time to tell the truth about your ministry. How has your congregation fallen short and not been faithful to God's will? Lacked energy, a sense of purpose or mission? BOY SCOUT TROOP 140 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

On October 19, 2023 Scout Troop 140, co-sponsored by Bethel and Mt Zion Lutheran Churches, completed 94 years of continuous service to the youth of Hudson, while the Scouting of America celebrated their 113th year. Troop 140 currently has 7 youth registered as Scouts and 7 adult leaders registered for support. We currently have two youth registered in our new Cub Scout pack.

Troop 140 supports a year-round program which includes camping, service projects, council and district event participation, and a high adventure program all organized to allow Scouts to learn and grow in life skills and leadership, and have fun in the process. The Troop works to instill leadership skills, personal faith, self-esteem, service and respect for the community. These values, expressed in the Scout Oath and Law, are fundamental to this process: Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean and Reverent.

The Troop had six Scouts and three adult leaders attend the one week camp at Tomahawk Scout Camp. Scouts attended several sessions throughout the year to work on various merit badges. The Troop met 48 Monday evenings in 2023.

The Troop had its 57th annual Christmas wreath sale fund-raiser in November through December. Troop wreath sales typically finances most of its programs and activities for the year and allows the Scouts to earn their way to Camp and other activities. The Troop gave service to the Memorial Day Flag ceremony, the Great Bethel Get-together, Hudson Golden Rule Picnic. Additional community service was given through various projects and many individual Scout interests. We supported the Spirit of St Croix Art Festival, served hot chocolate and cookies at both the Light Up Hudson, and Santa and His Critters events. We have a great relationship with the Hudson Chamber of Commerce (HCOC) and we earn HCOC donations for our services as well as the opportunity to scout recruitment and earn tips. The Troop's trailer (parked outside of the Bethel Church) is used for hauling equipment and gear for camping and activities. It was purchased 22 years ago with some of the funds that the Scouts raised over the prior three years.

Some of Troop 140 adult Leaders are members the Northern Star Council President's Cabinet and one is a member of the Board of Directors. Registered adult leaders have met B.S.A. training requirements for leadership and youth protection. There are 4 assistant Scoutmasters. Longtime Scout leaders include Bethel members Charles Huntley, David Mienke, and Holly Tremble and Mt. Zion member Carl Meincke, who along with the Troop Committee also work with the youth. Troop 140 goals for 2024 are:

- Encourage Scouts to advance to Eagle Scout rank;
- Attend One week of Summer Camp, Scout District and Council sponsored events;
- Mentor Scouts through their next rank advancement;
- Provide Service to Bethel and Mt. Zion Churches and the Hudson area community;
- Register Scouts for our new Cub Scout Pack and continue Pack Monthly meetings.

Troop 140 has been part of Bethel and Mt Zion Lutheran Churches' service to youth for many years. In order to foster our partnership in service to Hudson area youth, Troop 140 requests that we are included as one of its' supported youth programs in any church public relations brochures and to work toward coordinating both troop and other church sponsored youth programs schedules to enable and encourage our youth to participate in both programs.

Troop 140 sincerely thanks Bethel and Mt. Zion Churches for their sponsorship of Troop 140 and to Bethel Church for the use of their facilities for its program.

Another great year of music-making took place at traditional services during 2023. Hymns for congregational singing were transposed so that the range of the melody would be comfortable for men's voices, something that is almost unheard of in other churches. There were five premiers of new musical compositions by Layton James, including choral, instrumental, and hymns, both tune and text. The Bethel Quartet, Megan Wagner, Margaret Jane Wray, Obed Floan, and Alex Ritchie performed twice a month, and also as soloists. A resurgent Bethel Chorale choir was formed, including high-school youth. Hymn-sings led by Tracey Jenkinson and Skip were popular as 'preludes' to services every other week. In addition to these resident groups, there were many guest artists. Among the vocalists were Amy Scheffer-Western and Jodi Mealey, Keegan Foster and Angela Grunstad.

There were many instrumentalists as well: violinists Mike Sobieski, Sarah Bertsch and Max Vitullo; cellists Daryl Skobba, Scott Lykins and Ken Miller, and violist Susan Janda. Wind players too: trumpeters Mel Olson and Chris Tank, hornist Denny McGinn, and trombonist Rich Gaynor, who played at Bethel three times in 2023. Then there were the five pairs of volunteer singers presenting Marty Haugen's "Holden Evening Prayer" during Lenten services. The guest artists appeared not only in worship, but in special events and "Senior Adult Luncheons".

The Women of Bethel again hosted the Scandinavian Food Fest in full force. Thank you everyone who made this a success. We cleared around \$16,700.00 this year. We distributed funds to various causes, more than we took in as we had extra monies in our fund.

Here is where we gave our monies to: Matt Aubart, Youth Program Equipment fund \$1100.00, Missy Austreng, BHP Teacher training \$1200.00, Sonja McGill Bethel Bells \$750.00, Pastor Kris/Koreen Theisen, \$2600.00 cocktail tables for Highlands, retreat fund and retreat musicians, Janet Wilson, Our Neighbors Place \$1500.00, \$500.00 GHM -to purchase misc. items needed for Hospice Kits, Bethel Quilters \$2000.00, Operation Help/Source \$1500.00, Hudson Area Senior Center \$500.00, Pastor Ladd \$2000.00 summer intern, Backpack Program \$1500.00, Turning Point \$1500.00, Grace Place \$1500.00, Vicki Datt \$500.00 spay/neuter clinic Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Hannah Cobian \$500.00 Bethel apparel for staff/volunteers, Carole DeJardin \$900.00 Advent Happenings for 2024, Pastor Ladd Youth scholarships \$2000.00, Tanzania \$2000.00. These grants total \$24,050.00.

The Bethel Quilters were able to donate 60 quilts to LWR along with 20 Fabric kits (Mary Gathering), 42 Personal Care kits (Dorcas Gathering) and 100 School kits (Ruth Gathering). The Naomi Gathering sent 100 Hospice kits plus \$1000 to purchase additional supplies and \$556.50 for shipping of those kits to GHM. Also, the Bethel Quilters gave 66 quilts to Operation Help, 12 quilts to Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and 2 guilts to BHP Auction 2024.

BETHEL ENDOWMENT FUND 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

The Endowment Committee's purpose is to fulfill the mission of Bethel by educating the congregation on how they can support this ministry, assisting donors in their giving, distribution of grant requests and administering fund procedures and policies of the Bethel Endowment Funds. The endowment funds are a permanent resource for sustaining the work of Bethel Lutheran Church.

Ten grants totaling \$12,100 were awarded from the Bethel Endowment Funds in 2023. Grant monies helped fund: Hudson Area Backpack Program, Operation Help, Our Neighbor's Place, Bethel Highlands Preschool, Bethel Women's Retreat, Bethel Lenten Special Musicians, Bethel Staff Appreciation Lunch, Bethel Pipe & Drape Backdrop, Bethel Global Leadership Summit, and Bethel Creation Care Team.

Bethel partners with Thrivent Charitable to manage the Endowment Funds. The Funds are divided into two categories - the Outreach Fund that supports those in need outside of Bethel Lutheran Church and the General Fund that supports the needs inside the Bethel community. As of the end of Q3 2023, the fund balances totaled: Outreach Fund: \$32,801.15 and General Fund: \$214,791.12. The amount available for grant distribution is based on the fund's 10-year average rate of return (4.9%).

Committee members include Pastor Kris Kurzejeski, Lois Durst (council representative), Anne Wasmund, Ron Johnson, Adam Wilt, Dave Benson, Gerald Bauer, and Galina Powers. ACTING CO-PASTORS 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

When we chose this scripture as our theme for the year, it spoke to us in more than one way. Certainly, we are always people who walk by faith, but that is especially true during times of transition when none of us know what lies ahead, and yet we must keep pressing forward, trusting that God will be with us in all times and places, during all changes and uncertainties. We want to thank you for trusting us to help guide Bethel through this long and trying process. It has been our humble privilege to walk beside you in ministry.

Although there is much we currently don't know, we do know that Bethel has continued to connect, grow, serve, celebrate, plan, strategize, vision, and work together in all things. This particular year has been one of celebration for us. It was Bethel's sesquicentennial – the 150th Anniversary of Bethel's formation as a church! A transitional task force was formed that studied Bethel's setting and needs, which led to the formation of a call committee, whose work continues to identify additional pastoral leadership for Bethel. Our staffing has remained relatively stable

and thirty-eight youth were confirmed this fall at Bethel.

Service is at the heart of who we are as a congregation. Bethel embarked on a mission trip to Tanzania this year. Ten people from Bethel joined Pastor Ladd as connections were made, bonds were formed, and ministry was shared with our partner congregation overseas. We continue to host the Home Meal twice a month at our downtown location and actively engage with mission partners locally, nationally, and globally.

This year we hosted our annual women's retreat for 107 women at our Bethel Highlands location. This continues to be an amazing outreach and uplifting inspiration for women from Bethel and beyond to grow in faith and connect with others.

Perhaps one of the reasons Bethel has been able to remain faithfully grounded during a transitional period has to do with our grounding in the Bible, which helps us grow in faith and knowledge of the Lord. Through numerous Bible Studies, to Biblically based preaching, and children and youth programming that aims for educational and experiential growth, Bethel has remained true to what is most important in all times and places finding our center and our value in the Creator of all life and love.

BETHEL PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

COMMITTEE, 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

As our Bethel Highlands facility ages, we are having increased issues with equipment wearing out resulting in many failures or repair needs. One of the largest projects was reroofing both facilities after the 2022 hailstorm. Fortunately, the cost was covered by insurance. Below is a listing of some of the projects and repairs done this year.

• Reroof both campuses and dealt with insurance coverage - Cost was approximately \$500,000 which was covered by insurance.

 Sold the blue bus and are using our second van and rent more if needed.

• Updated the A/V system in the Highlands Children's Theater as the existing system failed.

• Highlands fire alarm system – Replaced the fire alarm system panel that was defective and added some better grounding for surge protection.

• Highlands fire protection sprinkler system – This has been another major issue this year. The sprinkler piping has developed leaks from corrosion and resulted in damaged equipment. Insurance has covered the damaged equipment, but we still had to replace the sprinkler piping in the sanctuary. We still have some leaks in other areas that will be addressed in 2024, plus adding a nitrogen purge system to prevent future corrosion of piping.

• On a rotational basis of replacing chairs Downtown.

• Handicap bars added in Downtown bathroom by the kitchen.

 Gas stove replacement at Highlands prework – Working on replacing the gas stoves with electric stoves. There is a problem with the pilot lights in that they stop working after 5+ years in addition to they use a lot of natural gas. This will end up being an energy saving project.

 Continue to define storage needs for a new storage facility.

• New copier was leased for the Downtown offices.

• HVAC motor repair at Highlands – Will be a continuing issue as the HVAC units age and fail including heat exchanger failures, motor failures, and other issues resulting in eventual need to replace some of these units. • Restroom fans tied to light switch at Highlands – This is another energy saving program so the bathroom fans only run when there is someone in there and not 24/7.

• Define and quotes for new lift for Highlands – The current lift is difficult to use and takes up a lot of space in the storage area. Will purchase a replacement one and sell the current one when funds are available. Shades at Highlands - Defining needs and getting quotes to replace. Some of the current shades in the sanctuary have stopped working and replacement parts are not available. Defining actual needs for shades and will be getting quotes for new shade systems in 2024.

• Painted Highlands preschool rooms – Painted four classrooms and added shelving to two storage rooms.

• Lawn care vendor selection and monitored.

• A/V issues at Highlands – Continued issues with failures of A/V equipment in addition to upgrade needs at Highlands. Equipment is on order for replacement in early 2024. Evaluating future needs for this area of worship support. Had failures and had to find work-arounds. • Highlands maintenance contract vendor evaluation – Currently have Ahern as our maintenance contractor. Have had issues with them and are working these issues out.

 Lawn sprinkler maintenance and future needs – Highlands lawn sprinklers need work and are looking at vendors to do the work. Looking at needs of Downtown lawn sprinklers, evaluating if needed, as 2023 was a dry year and we did not use the system and the lawn was fine. • Mowed Highlands outlying areas twice – We mow the outlying areas to prevent the grassy areas from becoming overgrown with invasive species.

• Janitorial staff evaluation – Evaluated existing staff and contract janitorial support and are leaving as is.

• Mulched the Highlands preschool playground.

 Changed insurance companies and did insurance evaluation - Past insurance company is dropping all coverages in the Hudson area, so we had to find another insurance company which resulted in an evaluation of current insurance coverage and deductibles.

• WiFi system evaluation for both campuses – Current systems at both campuses are a result of add-ons as time went on. Need to reconfigure both campuses to insure better WiFi coverage throughout the facilities.

- A/V system maintenance/evaluation at Highlands
- HVAC systems as they fail at Highlands
- Shades evaluation and operation at Highlands
- Parking lot repair at Highlands
