Follow Me CAFÉ DISCUSSION GUIDE GENESIS 2:4B-25 Briefly discuss as a group various ways people work and take care of the creation in your context. As you As you gather, read the other side of discuss, jot down in this space ways you might deepen this page about the topic for today. this practice. Once gathered, spend a few minutes introducing everyone. Open the session by reading Psalm 65:9–13. Watch the YouTube video "One Earth— Environmental Short Film" (bit.ly/FMOneEarth, 4:27). As you watch, reflect on the repeated

affirmation expressed in Genesis that the creation is good.

Read "Summary of the Practice" and "Finding the Practice in the Bible" on the other side of this page. Now read Genesis 2:4b-25. Discuss:

- How do the ways humans are created differ between the first creation story (read in the first session) and this second version?
- Which translation of the Hebrew verb radah do you prefer: have dominion or take care and till? Why?
- How should understanding ourselves as created from soil and returning to soil affect how we treat the land?

Read "Finding the Practice Then and Now" on the other side of this page. Watch and discuss one or both of these YouTube videos:

SUMMARY OF THE PRACTICE

Our biblical ancestors, including Jesus, had no idea about climate change as we understand it today. Jesus did not address greenhouse-gas emissions in any of his sermons to be sure. Yet, as people who lived off the land in agricultural societies, they were aware of where their food came from and how to treat the land and other creatures in order to protect their own long-term survival and well-being.

In some translations of the Bible, the second creation story (Genesis 2:4b–25) has God say that humans should "have dominion" over the creatures of the earth. Unfortunately, *dominion* has too often been wrongly understood as *domination*, leading some to believe that humans can use every resource and creature for our own selfish interests. Our ancestors depended on the land and never dreamt of misusing the very thing that gave them life. The Hebrew verb is *radah* in Genesis 2:15 and a growing number of Bibles translate the verb to mean work and take care of the creation.

FINDING THE PRACTICE IN THE BIBLE

The book of Genesis contains two distinct creation accounts that came from two separate traditions. They were combined into one when the scriptural text was finally written down. Genesis 1:1–2:4a, which we discussed in the previous session, describes the divine work of creation in a poetic, lyrical way. Genesis 2:4b–25 is more of a narrative, in which God is personified, and the role of humanity is quite different. Instead of creating humans in God's image, as indicated in Genesis 1, this second account describes God creating the first person before any of the other creatures. "There was no one to till the ground," we are told in verse 5. God then reaches into the earth, picks up a handful of dirt, and creates the first human.

Made *from* the fertile soil, the first human is made *for* it; he is given the vocation to farm it. Consider the popular phrase said at many funerals as we bury the body: "Ashes to ashes, dust to dust." We are created from the earth's soil and, when we die, our bodies return to nourish the soil. Humanity is not separate from the rest of the natural world, but instead fully integrated in, and created from, the earth.

FINDING THE PRACTICE THEN AND NOW

- Koinonia Farm is a working farm and intentional living community in Americus, Georgia. Founded in 1942, it is a place where people connect to the land and their community. Inspired by the description of the earliest Christian communities described in the book of Acts, the founders of Koinonia envisioned creating a similar type of community that lived the same values.
